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CRUISIN' TO THE CAPE

Welcome to the 2021 Baja Ha-Ha 'Meet the Fleet' guide.

Please understand there are going to be many inaccuracies in the guide because there will have been many changes in crew and even boats between the time the guide was published and the November 1 start of the rally. We appreciate your understanding.

Many of the mistakes in this publication will probably be the fault of the Grand Poobah, although in some cases he was given incorrect, vague, confusing or contradictory information. He did his best with what he had to work with and appreciates your understanding.

In some cases, the Poobah paraphrased words to sentences in the interest of clarity and frivolity. In all cases, the Poobah did his best to adhere to the author's intent.

CODE:

* Each asterisk means there is a 'kid' onboard. We define a 'kid' as someone chronologically, not just emotionally, 16 years or younger.

(W) Stands for white sails only, as opposed to sailing with a spinnaker or gen-

Years, such as (2013) indicate at least the minimum number of times the skipper or crew has done a Ha-Ha.

Cities. In cases where two cities are listed, the first is the boat's homeport, the second is where the owner(s) receives mail and most likely lives or used to live.

Triggers. When the words 'wife', 'husband', 'spouse', 'children', and such are used in this guide, they are terms of endearment and respect, not ownership or lesser status.

If the male's name appears first, it's because that's how it appeared in the registration form. In cases where only the man's name was given, the Poobah, whenever it seemed called for, added the name of the wife/partner/significant other. More than a few of you guys 'owe' him.

Ages. The Poobah publishes the age of the men when available, but doesn't publish the age of women unless they are 35 or younger. This is sexist, of course, but the Poobah did it out of respect for women who are sometimes sensitive about their age.

Abricot V / Ullman Sails — Beneteau 62 **Rolando Gutierrez and Chuck Skewes** La Paz, BCS, Mexico (2013, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019)

Rolando, 65, is an engineer, while Chuck, 57, is the owner/operator of the Ullman Sails loft in San Diego. Their crew will be Michael Borak, 35, a sailmaker; Roy Rard, 66, a retired friend; and Brenda Zielinski, a trainer.

While this is Rolando's first Ha-Ha, of female, who less than two months be-Chuck has done many, in addition to many races to Mexico and Hawaii. As in vears past. Chuck will have the Ullman Sails team doing basic sail repairs during the stops in Turtle Bay and Bahia Santa Maria. But once again, the loft floor will be on the foredeck of the Ha-Ha mothership

Adios — Columbia 43 Craig Shaw and Neonta Bell

Portland, Oregon (Seven Ha-Ha's)

Craig, 67, a longtime member of the Portland YC, is a rigger. In 2012 he appeared on the cover of Latitude 38 while hanging from the top of Ha-Ha mothership Profligate's 90-ft mast.

Craig's parents bought Adios new in 1983, and he bought her from them 10 years later. Craig's parents did the '98 Pacific Cup to Hawaii on their Hunter 54, and the Ha-Ha in '12. "The latter was the most memorable Ha-Ha of all," says Craig, "as mom and dad were 81 and 86 at the time!"

"In '14 I Bashed back to Portland for a fresh water rinse — and a new engine, new keel bolts, new steering cables, new batteries, a new custom fuel tank, etc. She's like knew except she needs a paint job. But it's now way past my time to head south again.

"I met my girl Neonta, who owns a Laser, last November when she was houseboat sitting on the Columbia River. Her house on the North Santiam River had burned the previous September in the Beachie Creek fire. She is more than excited to do the Ha-Ha and spend the winter in Mexico. Although our dream destination would be Tahiti and the South Pacific, we'll Bash back to Portland in the

*Aeolus — Excess 15 49-ft Cat (W) **Marilyn Collins** Los Angeles / Phoenix

What kind of 80-year-old female who hasn't ever sailed before declares, "I've had enough of Covid, let's go buy a brand new boat and do the Ha-Ha.'

That would be the Marilyn Collins kind

fore the start of the Ha-Ha bought one of the first updated 49-ft Excess catamarans. Doña de Mallorca's kind of gal.

Marilyn's son, F. Scott Collins, 60, who is retired from sales and was a navigator in the navy, will be the captain. A sailor since the '80s, he's owned six monohulls between 26 and 45 feet.

Other family members along for the adventure will be daughter-in-law Alicia O'Reilly, an artist; and grandson Kurrent Collins, 6. The other crewmember will be Renee Kahon, who is in the film industry.

The Collins family now owns their dream boat, and Tahiti would be their dream destination. F. Scott, who goes by the curious nickname of John Friendly, likes sticky pudding for dessert. His sailing hero is the late Steve Trager, someone the Poobah is unfortunately not familiar with.

Aloha — Amel Super Maramu 53 Steve and Liz Davis Honolulu, Hawaii

Steve, 65, a retired airline pilot, and Liz, a Registered Nurse, will be sailing south with Cheryl Wolf, Liz's sister, a business consultant.

Steve started sailing as a teenager in Hawaii, but his cruising dreams were nipped in the bud when the banks decided that an 18-year-old surfer dude who wanted to go cruising on a 31-ft Taiwan-built beauty wasn't a particularly good loan risk.

A wife, baby, and 12 years later, Steve bought his first boat, a Ranger 29. Since then he's owned a Hobie Cat, a sportfishing boat, a Pacific Seacraft 25, a DownEast 38, a Hallberg-Rassy 42, and the Super Maramu. His boats have been berthed in places as diverse as Saudi Arabia, Guatemala, Annapolis. St. Augustine, Alameda, and Honolulu.

Liz started sailing in '97 when she fell for Steve, the sexy pilot docked across from her liveaboard trawler in San Leandro. Twenty-four years, seven boats, 19 countries, and 20,000 cruising miles later, she reckons she picked the right guy.

The couple started full-time cruising in 2015, heading from the Chesapeake to the Caribbean, where they met Ha-Ha entrants Ben and Gayle of Gayle Force. Their longest passage so far has been 5.200 nautical miles from Panama to Hawaii, the last 1,100 miles of which required tiller steering because of a failure in the rack and pinion steering.

Crew Chervl is a veteran of Aloha's 2020 cruising season in Prince William Sound, 2018 in Hawaii, and a terrible adventure in Martinique in 2016. Breaking her wrist meant she got to spend Christmas Day in the hospital at Fort-de-France.

Andiamo — Union 36 Corey Rose Westport, WA

Corey, 59, is a retired process implementor. He will be sailing south with Valerie Karsch, retired from business operations; and Jake Collachio, 45, who is not retired from some unspecified occupation.

"I have been sailing the Columbia River for over 30 years," says Corey. "I'd never owned a boat before *Andiamo*, but had worked my way through four boats with my brother. I've owned my classic 1984 Bob Perry design for four years.

In addition to all his years sailing the Columbia River, Corey made a crossing to Hawaii — in January.

After the Ha-Ha, he plans to "sail and enjoy life." The owner of his dream boat, Corey says his dream destination is "the next one".

Corey is the only member of the Ha-Ha fleet to specify cream puffs as his dessert of choice. If he's not careful, Cream Puff could become his Ha-Ha nickname.

Anna Maria — Island Packet 420 (W) Matthew and Merja Clegg San Diego / Los Angeles

Matthew, a software engineer, will be doublehanding with his wife Merja, a physician.

After learning to sail at the UC San Diego Aquatic Center, Matthew graduated to ASA courses and then a few charters in the British Virgins. He bought his boat in Charleston, South Carolina, at which time his first mate was a medical student at St. George's University in Grenada. "So I sailed the boat down there and spent several years in the Caribbean. It was during that time my children developed a passionate dislike for sailing."

"I work as a software engineer for one of the big tech companies," says Matthew, "and the silver lining of the pandemic is my employer realized I don't have to work at the office. So I plan to be working from my boat while sailing around the world. I'm just waiting for Elon Musk to send me a Starlink terminal.

"There is always a bigger, better and faster boat, but I would love to have something that was completely electric.

"My all-time favorite islands are the Exumas in the Bahamas, but my all-time favorite anchorage is the Tobago Keys in the Grenadines."

The Grand Poobah's big question is whether or not Merja can practice medicine from a boat while sailing around the world.



Argo, Douglas and son Stephen

Argo — Thorpe Seeop 59 Douglas Thorpe Huntington Harbor / Mesa, Arizona

Douglas, 63, who manufactures drones, launched *Argo*, which he co-designed, earlier this year.

He'll be sailing south with three crew: Kevin McCorkle, 35, a serial entrepreneur who is sometimes in cahoots on enterprises with Thorpe; Zachery Lippert, 22, a drone/ROV operator, who is Thorpe's grandson; and Stephen Castro, 26, who is engaged in "international business", and who is Douglas' son. *Argo* is the only boat in the Ha-Ha fleet that was finished from a hull that had been languishing in the Arizona desert for 40 years.


"Argo will be engaged with educators around the world supporting STEAM: science, technology, arts and mathematics, as an open resource for learning, conservation, and virtual experiences," says Douglas.

The owner has been sailing for 50 years and has been a liveaboard for five years. He previously worked at MacGregor, Ericson, and Lancer boat companies, and managed the sailboat division of Tollycraft when they built the Bill Garden-designed Fast Passage 39s.

"Just glass it," is his favorite expression, and no doubt comes from the boatbuilding world.

Thorpe's sailing heroes include legendary singlehanders, Francis Stokes and Sir Francis Chichester.

Thorpe was named The King of Drones' by the University of California, Irvine, where he was an engineering major. He was on his way to school there as a freshman when he was the first person to come upon a plane that had crashed in a field and killed everyone aboard. It changed his life. Since then he's developed and manufactured more than 30 remotely operated flying machines, weighing from five to 1,600 pounds, used by everyone from the military to gold prospectors.



Aria's Song, Carolyn and Richard

Aria's Song — Lagoon 400 S2 Richard and Carolyn Doherty Porter Ranch / Channel Islands

Richard, 56, an engineer, will be sailing with wife Carolyn, likely the only animal trainer in the Ha-Ha, and two crew. One of the crew will be Kelly Dorsey, a female marketing rep.

"We've been sailing all over the warm water areas of the world, but this catamaran is the first boat we've owned," says Richard. "We've enjoyed her for six years on the lovely California coast, but it's time to move on. We're not sure in which direction we'll head after the Ha-Ha, but likely toward Panama.

"Our dream destination would be the Maldives, but jeez, they are a long way away. We've very happy with our cat, but if we had to choose, we'd probably go with a mega yacht."

Quiz time: How many catamarans have Lagoon built? And how many were 400 S2s?


Since 1984, Lagoon has built 5,800 catamarans. If tied up beam to beam, they would reach the sun and back. Of the 5,800, just under 600 were 400S2s.

***Arkouda — Privilege 49 Mark and Carli McKinney Ensenada / San Jose (2019)

Mark, 53, is in software sales, while Carli is in management. They will be Ha-Ha-ing south with their three children: Thaddeus, 9; and seven-year-old boy twins, Kai and Luca. Also aboard will be Jeffery Cathers, 58, a captain and master mariner; and his wife, Sheryl Cathers, an artist and art teacher.

The McKinney's dream destination is San Francisco. What?! But only after sailing around the world. *Arkouda* has already been around once under the guidance of Sean and Cynthia Phalen, who reportedly left the boat in fabulous shape.

Having long bashed around in the ocean between Monterey and Drake's Bay, Mark and Carli are looking to sailing downwind in warm water with their kids. And with the "gregarious and notorious" Jeffery and Sheryl, who are both ex-





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tremely experienced mariners and social extremists. They are charged with safety first and laughter a close second.

La Cruz near Puerto Vallarta is the family's first post Ha-Ha destination, where they plan to join other cruising families "in the world of adventure, home-schooling and sailing." There are few better places than Marina Riviera Nayarit, as Catalina Liana has a nearly non-stop year-round program of activities for cruising kids. Among them are kids' camp-outs, which give cruising parents a rare opportunity to try to remember what sex is like.

The whole McKinney family loves chocolate — except for Thad, who rejects it. Kai writes left-handed but plays the ukulele right-handed. Luca writes right, but kicks left.

Arkouda is the Great Bear in Greek mythology, Protector of the Universe.

Aurora — Cape George 36 Todd Blanchard and Ann Case San Diego / Gig Harbor, WA

Todd, 57, a software engineer, and Ann, a paralegal, will be doublehanding the classic 24-year-old Cecil Lange design.

"Michiganers, we were introduced to boats more or less at birth on the Great Lakes. *Aurora*, which at 24 is undergoing a refit, is our first and hopefully last boat. Previously we just hitched rides on other peoples' boats.

"I acquired *Aurora* in 2001 and my first mate Ann in 2009," says Todd. "I feel it's important to find your boat before your woman, so the boat has seniority. Too many male friends tell me, "I'd like to get a boat but my wife won't let me."

There will be a new event in this year's Ha-Ha; the tar and fathering of Todd by the women in the fleet.

Aurora had almost been finished by the original owner when Todd bought her. Ann and he have been rebuilding the interior since they sailed her down to San Diego 10 years ago. The Ha-Ha is giving them the all-important deadline to cross the border.

"Our trip down from the Northwest was the shakedown for *Aurora*," says Todd, "and our relationship. Ann loved the passages, so we've been working toward retiring as cruisers."

The couple like to move each year. Their latest place was at Rosarito Beach in northern Baja. After a cold winter, they decided a Ha-Ha taking them to warmer La Paz would be the ticket for this year.

If there's no chocolate in it," they proclaim, "it's not dessert."

Aurora — Jeanneau 53 (W) Michael Lewis and Lois Mandel San Diego / Coronado

Michael, 68, is retired from the Air Force and was the owner of Coastal Pool & Spa. His wife Lois is retired from escrow management and being a San Diego County Administrative Analyst. The couple will have three crew: Michelle Shirley, 33, a bartender/assistant manager; and Michael and Mary Law, who they found at the *Latitude 38* Crew List Party.

Michael has been sailing for 53 years, during which time he's owned five boats. He and Lois have owned *Aurora* for just nine months, and declare, "She's a beauty!" His longest passages are San Diego to Barra de Navidad, which is over 1,000 miles, and San Diego to San Francisco, which was shorter but uphill.

Aurora is the couple's dream boat, while their dream destination is the South Pacific. Popeye, the pugnacious, wisecracking cartoon sailor who possesses superhuman strength after ingesting an always handy can of spinach, is their sailing hero. The couple enjoy pecan pie for dessert.



Aventura

Aventura — Camper-Nicholson 35 (W) Robert Fyfe Richmond

Robert, 50, a harbor owner, will be doing his first Ha-Ha. Destry Lewis, 54, a builder, will be his crew on this classic Camper-Nicholson design.

Over 200 of the 'Nic 35s' were built by one of the oldest boatbuilding companies in the world. Despite being a 'pure' cruising boat and only having 27 feet of waterline, her PHRF rating is only six seconds slower than an Ericson 35.

In 47 years of sailing, Robert has only owned one boat, *Aventura*, which he purchased after 44 years of sailing on other peoples' boats.

Greece is his dream sailing destination. He knows it well, having already been sailing there three times.

'Fyfe', as he's known, has many sailing heroes, with the original singlehanded solo circumnavigator Joshua Slocum being at the top.

Robert is a right-handed ice cream lover who wouldn't mind having a modern 44 to 47-ft cutter.

Aventurera — Island Packet 36 (W) Mike Colburn and Steve Smigay San Diego / Phoenix

Mike, 47, a retired engineer, and Steve, his stepson, also a retired engineer, will be doublehanding their 11-year-old boat. As you read through the *Meet the Fleet* guide, you'll be astonished at how many Ha-Ha boat owners and crew are engineers of one type or the other.

Both Mike and Steve are Navy vets who love the sea. Their longest passage on this boat is three days. Mike is a lefty.

The Aventurera co-owners report they've been sailing for about 10 years and have owned three boats. They've owned the Island Packet for six months, although their dream boat is Jeff Bezos new half-billiondollar megayacht.

The great Jeanne Socrates, who has spent her golden years gaining and regaining the title of the oldest person to singlehand non-stop around the world, is their sailing hero, while chocolate mousse is what makes them salivate after dinner.

Following the Ha-Ha, the two will continue on to Puerto Vallarta, although New Zealand would be their dream destination.

Avocet — Caliber 40LRC Issac Ohana Palo Alto (2017)

Issac, a 55-year-old executive, will be sailing south with Erez Ben-Eshay, a sailing instructor, and one other crew.

"I have been sailing since 2005 and have owned my current boat since 2013," reports Issac. "I did the 2017 Baja Ha-Ha, then visited Puerto Vallarta, Mazatlan, and San Jose del Cabo. I did the Bash home in 2019. I am eager to sail south again and explore more of Mexico. I'm hoping that the Ha-Ha will be the first leg in a circumnavigation that I hope to start in two to three years.

"My sailing heroes are Portuguese explorer Vasco de Gama, who was first to sail to India by way of the Cape of Good Hope; Portuguese explorer Ferdinand Magellan, best known for having led the Spanish expedition across the Pacific to the East Indies, and for survivors of his group to have completed the first circumnavigation'; English explorer James Cook, who made three fabulous voyages of discovery; and more recently, Lin and the late Larry Pardey, for their 200,000 miles of voyaging in small, engineless, homebuilt, wood sailboats.





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Azimuth — Peterson 365 Scott Racette and Ashley Gremel Oakland

Co-owner Scott, 32, is a UX designer, while spouse and co-owner Ashley, 29, is a director of operations. Overseeing crew performance will be "Cypress the Cat. a friendly 15-month-old creme-colored tabby who always wants more tuna."

"We went sailing together seven years ago and have been sailing around ever since," reports Scott and Ashley. "Azimuth is Ashley's first sailboat, but she grew up fishing and swimming in the Great Lakes. Scott loved racing his Hobie 16 while growing up in Virginia, and learned keelboat sailing on his previous boat, an Ericson 34T."

Scott and Ashley purchased Azimuth in the fall of 2016, and have been living aboard in Oakland ever since, refitting her for offshore passages. "We've also been very active in racing on San Francisco Bay on other people's boats and campaigned a Moore 24 in the 2019 OYRA season. Scott at the helm and Ash on bow.

"We've been in San Diego for about a month as we write this, and will soon be making our way to the Chesapeake Bay. We figured the Ha-Ha would be a great way to start the adventure. Ashley is wrapping up work projects while Scott is working on his captain's license.

"Our dream passage would be doing the Northwest Passage aboard our dream boat, a Gozzard 44. Sailors of small wood boats without engines, Lin Pardey, and the late Larry Pardey, are our sailing he-

Bambu, Zak

Bambu — Newport 41 (W) Zak Crawford Marina del Rey

At 27, liveaboard Zak will be one of the youngest skippers in the Ha-Ha, and at 50 years, his Newport 41 will be one of the oldest boats in the fleet. But note that Gilles Finlayson is nearing completion of a 15-year circumnavigation with a sister-

pedigree.

The software engineering manager will have three crew: Cory Dominguez, 31, another software engineer: Cory's partner Anoosh Moutafian, a 30-year old female illustrator; and Alyx Forsyth, 29, a female nurse. While the proofreader is not crazy about those names, the Grand Poobah loves them.

Zak has a lot of sailing experience, starting at age 12 when his dad left him to singlehand a Hobie Cat on Lake Michigan. His dad left to play beach volleyball. Since then Zak has sailed the Andaman Sea off Thailand, the Philippines, and the Whitsunday's in Australia. In addition to sailing Bambu on Santa Monica Bay, he's a regular on a J/80 for Beer Can races.

Cory has thousands of miles of sailing experience, having done a San Francisco to La Paz trip, and raced a Vanguard 15 and Express 27s on the Bay.

Zak's dream destination is Bacuit Bay, Palawan in the Philippines. His dream boat is an 80-ft shunting Pacific proa. After the Ha-Ha he plans to cruise Mexico for a bit, then meander down the coast and through the Canal to the Caribbean.

Berkana — Valiant 40 **Greg Andrew** Maple Bay, British Columbia, CA

Greg, 51, is a pilot. He'll have two crew: Robert Andrew, his 78-year-old dad; and Corey Anderson, 49, a first responder.

"I've owned seven or eight boats, depending on how you define ownership," reports Greg. "My first was a little Optimist, then a Laser, a C&C 41, an Endurance 35, a C&C 30, a Bayliner fishing boat, a 42-ft trawler, a super cool wooden dinghy, and the Valiant, which I bought just a year ago.

"Berkana, launched in 1976, has been in refit since last October. It's all done now. I lived aboard, but please don't tell the marina owners.

"My plans are to sail until I have to work again, then repeat. Life is too short for a full-time job. The important things are sailing, exploring, adventuring, and meeting new people.

"I've gone the wrong way around Cape Horn on my way from the Falkland Islands to Ushuaia, Argentina; done multiple trips on the west coast of Canada by sail, and have also fished tuna and salmon commercially.

"The Marquesas is my dream destination aboard my Valiant 40, which Robert made me say is my dream boat. Alex Thompson of Hugo Boss is my sailing hero, and I like cheesecake.

'Just because we can doesn't mean

ship, so there's few worries in the boat's we should . . . but I say let's try anyway.' That's my motto.

'The Ha-Ha is the beginning of my adventure of a lifetime, and just getting to the start will already be the coolest thing I've ever done."

Black Crow — Morgan Out-Island 41 **Timmy Neumann**

Long Beach (2017)

Timmy, 54, retired as CEO of Cargo Control Systems and will be sailing south with a crew of three. They will be Tim Ehrlch, 49, a general manager in the mortuary industry who did the '17 Ha-Ha; and two others not determined as of press

Timmy has been boating most of his life but is new to sailing. He's owned a string of powerboats, including the Egg Harbor 39 he's eager to sell now that he's taken up sailing. He bought the Out-Island, a classic Charlie Morgan design from 1979, last September on San Francisco Bay, then sailed her south to Long Beach. It's his longest passage to date.

Black Crow has been extensively restored with new electronics, a new interior, and much more.

After the Ha-Ha, Timmy plans to spend time in Mexico, and may eventually head to the Canal and the Caribbean.

'Timmy Two Boats' has a dream destination of French Polynesia, and a dream boat of a Formosa 51 ketch. His favorite quote is from Captain Ron, and we don't even have to tell you what it is, do we?

'Captain Kirkland', as he's also called. likes New York Cheesecake. Lucky him, that's always served at the Ha-Ha kick-off

Bloom County — Mancebo 31 **Elliot James** Tiburon

Elliot, 31, is a construction estimator. and his Mancebo 31 is an appropriately young man's boat with a big open cockpit. Although now almost 40 years old, she's got a lot of inherent speed but not much in the way of creature comforts. On the other hand, Elliot will be able to throw her on a trailer and drive home from Cabo following the Ha-Ha. It's a fabulous drive, and the two-lane road is narrow. Shoulder? There's no shoulder on the Transpenisular Highway.

Kyle Vanderspek, 30, a first engineer in the merchant marine, will be crew.

Elliot has been sailing for over 20 of his 31 years and has already owned five boats. He currently owns a 36-ft Albin trawler, a Melges 20, and Bloom County.

Having done a number of 20+ day Atlantic crossings aboard the tallship Con-



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




cordia, Elliot knows offshore.

Elliot has no dream destination but hopes to do a proper circumnavigation one day, perhaps on a Santa Cruz 52. His sailing hero is French singlehander, Jean Le Cam. (The Poobah and de Mallorca had dinner with 'Cam the King' in St. Barth once, and can assure Elliot that he's a fun-loving as well as a worthy sailing hero.)

Elliot is right-handed and likes ice cream for dessert, although he's not going to be able to take much of that on the Ha-Ha.



Cara Mia, Jim and Edie

Cara Mia — Beneteau Oceanis 46 James and Edith Jones San Diego

James didn't give his age or occupation, but Edith is an interior decorator. They will have three crew: Nadia Al-Alwi, a consultant; James Housells, 56, an investor; and Kenneth Speelman, 58, an engineer. The latter two haven't done a Ha-Ha, but they've done the Bash home, which is usually much more challenging.

'Jim' has been sailing for 40 years and holds a 100-ton license. He and 'Edie' have owned three boats: a Catalina 27, a 40-ft sloop, and for the last sixteen years, their Farr-designed *Cara Mia*.

Jim and Edie cruised Mexico in '17-'18. This year they plan to do Mexico's Gold Coast after the Ha-Ha, head up to the Sea of Cortez in the spring, and then come north to Catalina for the summer.

Their dream destinations are Tahiti, Thailand and Sardinia, all of which they've already been to. If Covid and forest fires didn't mess things up, they would have done a cruise in Turkey this summer. Their ideal boat would be a 50-ft cat.

Celebration — Beneteau First 38 Stephen and Dianna Sweet San Francisco Bay / Chico



"Our dream destination is anywhere there are tropical reefs, warm water, and not too many people. We are on our dream boat. My sailing hero is Lin Pardey, who did two circumnavigations with her late husband Larry on their two very small, engine-less, wood boats.

"My favorite quote is one I made up: "Choose your goals wisely, it will determine the path of your life."

The couple plan to leave for the South Pacific in May of 2002.

**Chaos — Beneteau First 47.7 Mark and Karen Williams Seward / Anchorage, Alaska

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Mark thinks they can do it because for many years they cruised remote Alaska "on a smaller semi-racing boat with six kids, two large dogs, and only 55 gallons of water."

Rick hasn't done a Ha-Ha, but he did the '15 TransPac aboard the Davidson 50 Pipe Dream.

"Any anchorage with crystal clear warm waters is fine with us," says Rick, "and on my dream boat, which I fortunately already own."

Rick lives by his dad's motto: "Onward and upward, never back!'

Carrot cake is Rick's dessert thing, and he's secure enough to have no problem if you call him 'Ricki Ricardo'.

Compass Rose — Morgan 45 (W) Randy and Joanne Weeton Alameda

Randy, 61, and Joanne are both retired, although they didn't specify from what careers.

Corahleen — Herreshoff 56 Schooner **Rick Bishoprick**

Ridgefield, Washington (2019)

Rick, 54, is both a rancher and a homebuilder. He'll have four crew aboard: Ray McCormack, 53, a hired skipper active in the Coast Guard merchant marine; Brad Coffey, 55, a sanitation engineer; Cheryl Greathouse, a wellness professional; and Rebecca Kramer, who is in real estate.

Corahleen is an unusual entry in that she's a 56-ft double-ended staysail schooner that was launched in 1957. She was built by Rick's father and grandfather to a design published in Rudder magazine. But here's the most unusual thing about her: up until this June, she'd been out of the water sitting on a trailer since 1994. Twenty-seven years is a long time for a wood boat to be out of the water.

The long restoration was undertaken by Rick and his father Stan, and completed by Rick, with help from others, after his father passed in 2013.

Corahleen raced in the 1958 TransPac race to Hawaii but finished last. It wasn't because she was slow, but because Rick's tee-tolling grandmother insisted that all sails be taken down at night.

One day Rick was singlehanding Corahleen on the Columbia River. As the teenager was walking forward, the autopilot suddenly pivoted the big schooner 180 degrees, tossing him into the chilly water. Even if the boat wasn't destroyed, Rick was sure he'd never be able to sail her again.

But miracle of miracles, not only did the schooner suddenly reverse course, but Rick was able to pull himself back aboard. It's the



kind of thing Rick never told his dad.

In 1994 Rick's dad pulled Corahleen out of the water and launched another boat, Radiance. This was the founding of Legendary Yachts in Washougal, Washington. Lots of Legendary Yachts workers learned their trade slowly but steadily repairing her.



Coyote, Mary and Scott

Coyote — Beneteau First 42 Scott Smith and Mary Culley Santa Cruz (2003)

Scott, 61, is in engineering management, while Mary is a technology strategist. Their crew will also be from the tech world: Jason Lauer, 53, who is in engineering management and who crewed in the Ha-Ha in '03; and Denise Diani, a physical therapist.

First Mate Mary learned to sail on Hobie Cats as a child around Hilton Head Island and on the Finger Lakes of New York. She is passionate about marine wildlife such as whales and birds, and is known as 'The Spotter'. She's also an avid gardener and loves to learn about flora and fauna in new places.

Scott is passionate about bicycles and boats. He did a TransPac as navigator on *Kokopelli* in 2015 and helps Mary in the garden. It's said that if it looks good in the Culley home, Mary did it; if it works well, Scott did it. He's also passionate about the sea and conservation. As a volunteer, Scott created the iPhone app for the Monterey Bay Aquarium's Seafood Watch program.

Jason Lauer was the 'Covid Commodore' at the Santa Cruz YC, and a vet of both the '03 Ha-Ha and of a Doublehanded Pacific Cup.

Denise is the ship's Health and Spiritual Officer and teaches yoga.

Scott learned to sail at age 7 on a Sunfish. Prior to *Coyote*, the Culley's owned a Santa Cruz 27. They bought Coyote in 2015 after she'd done two Pacific Cups.

Scott's sailing hero is Sir Francis Chichester, who in 1966, eight years after being diagnosed with terminal lung cancer, became the first person to do a west to east circumnavigation. Scott dreams of sailing where it's warm aboard *Coyote*, which is his and Mary's dream boat.

**Dakota — Hunter Passage 42 Ryan and Christina Dixon Coyote Point / Rocklin (2016)

Ryan, 45, is an airline pilot whose favorite destination is "anywhere my wife wants to be on the boat, so Mexico for right now." Christina is an attorney.

Ryan's two sons, Elliot, 12, and Finely, 8, will be doing the Ha-Ha, an event he himself has wanted to do for 30 years.

Ryan has been sailing since he was 10, during which time he's owned two cruising boats. He did the 2016 Ha-Ha with *Dakota* but had to start a week behind the pack. But he continued on to southern Mexico and later sailed back to the Bav.

Ryan's aunt and uncle are his sailing heroes for having introduced him to sailing.

"What's been our favorite spot in Mexico? Everywhere!"


Day Dreams — X-Yacht/AP44 Robert Day Newport Beach / Laguna Beach

Robert and his son have been sailing since '07 when they learned on San Francisco Bay. They later relocated to Southern California, where they enjoy the warmer sailing conditions.

"My dream would be sailing into the lagoon at Bora Bora, anchor, then swim to the St. Regis Hotel for breakfast.

Jason has been sailing since he was a lad growing up in New Zealand, while Candice was baptized in the cold cauldron racing Nacra 20 cats on San Francisco Bay. She was lured by the promise of future cruising in the tropics aboard a boat big enough to sleep on.

"We own our dream boat and our dream destination is wherever we are at any given time. Our sailing heroes are all those who have scrimped and saved and had the *cojones* to cut the docklines and seek adventure. And Kiwi sailing legend Peter Blake, too. Our favorite dessert is pavlova. Contentment is a wonderful thing, and Bob says his current boat, the second he's owned, is his dream boat. "Really!"

His sailing hero is 'Patsy', who we take to mean the Assistant Poobah, Patsy 'La Reina del Mar' Verhoeven. She's done it all, from Central America to the Pacific Northwest to the South Pacific. And often singlehands.

Bob's favorite quote comes in like a hanging curve down the middle of the plate with the great Tony Gwynn at the plate: "Ninety percent of the game is half mental." Yogi, of course.

As befits a sailorman, Bob is not finicky when it comes to desserts. "As long as I didn't have to make it, I like what's put in front of me."

After the Ha-Ha, Bob plans to spend time in the La Paz area.

*Elixir — Freedom 45 (W) Colin Rogers and Christina Spring Alameda / San Leandro

Colin, 45, a tech executive, will be heading up a family boat along with spouse Christina Spring, a tech recruiter. Their crew will be son Westly, 5; and Colin's sister Margot Rogers, a LA County executive.

Colin grew up sailing the Chesapeake "lashed to the mast at age three". At age four, he and four other family members squeezed into an O'Day 21 and cruised the Hudson River for a month. He later enjoyed various Outward Bound sailing adventures.

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When Colin came to San Francisco, he decided to live aboard the Freedom 45 for three years before moving ashore. Other than a four-week charter, his longest offshore passage has been 10 days from Seattle to San Francisco.

"We are super excited to finally be in a position to join the Ha-Ha, having heard about it for so many years. After the rally, we'll explore more of Mexico.

"Our dream would be to revisit the Cook Islands, but on our boat. Our dream boat would be a Neel 51 trimaran.

"While Westly is the only lefty on the boat, we all like brownie sundaes.'

Emma — Deerfoot 62 **Kurt Christofferson** Santa Barbara (2017, 2019)

Kurt, 62, is "unemployable" and "lives all over". His crew will be Keith Hilen, 62, a developer who did the '17 Ha-Ha; Ryan White, 43, another developer; and Suzy Garren, a vet of the '17, '18 and '19 Ha-Ha's who Kurt describes as a "sailing bum"; and Eve Rooklidge, a teacher.

"I sailed for several years before buying Emma, my first boat, four years ago. Since then I've spent most of my time sailing around Mexico and getting ready to jump the Puddle.

"My longest passage has been racing a Soverel 33 in the '96 Pacific Cup. The first time I Bashed Emma back to California from the Sea, we sailed 600 miles offshore before tacking back and checking in at San Diego. My second Bash was La Paz to San Francisco. I was alone, so I made a number of stops to sleep.

"After this year's Ha-Ha, I plan to sail over to La Cruz, take in some South Pacific seminars, and jump across to the Marquesas in the spring.

"I'm happy with Emma as my dream boat, but have many dream destinations: the Philippines, Niue, and Palau, to name just a few.

"I think Martin Luther King got it right when he said. "The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy".

The kids go by Gabby and Zachy, and like all kids will be looking forward to hanging out with other kids. Maybe even start their own Kids' Ha-Ha Radio Net. In past Ha-Ha's, parents weren't allowed on the kids' net.

The Forsman family has been sailing since 2004, but only bought their first ocean-going sailboat, Endeavor, four years ago. But as long as six years before buying the boat, they were following the Ha-Ha and dreaming of joining it.

Their longest sails have been trips to Catalina and during a charter in the British Virgins. After the Ha-Ha they'll cruise Mexico a bit before the family flies home and Todd and crew do the Bash.

William, 64, is a retired property manager, while Cheryl is a retired chiropractor/nurse. As of press time they were still deciding which couple would crew for

"We've been sailing for 12 years and have owned Epsilon, our only boat, for just six months. Only about 50 of the Island Packet 41 SPs, which are considered motorsailors, were built.

"Our longest passage to date has been 242 miles. After the Ha-Ha we'll either do the Sea or continue on down to the Canal.

"In our dreams, we'd travel to Tristan de Cunha, the most remote inhabited archipelago on earth. It's 1,750 miles from Cape Town, 1,316 miles from Saint Helena, and 2,161 miles from the Falkland Islands. But we'd want to do it aboard our dream boat, a Nordhavn 56."

The couple's sailing hero is Tristan Jones, real name Arthur Jones, born to a 'working girl' in London. Jones' astonishing sailing adventures were only exceeded by his ability to create a past from whole cloth and mix fact with fiction.

William and Cheryl are not left-handed, but "are willing to learn". That's a good quality in a human. Coffee ice cream is their favorite dessert


Esperanza — Catalina 380 Mike Whalen and Bill Nork Alameda / El Dorado Hills

Mike and Bill have been sailing for 40+ years, mostly racing on San Francisco Bay. But they have also cruised Mexico and the Caribbean. They've owned six

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
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

Their dream destination is La Paz, although they'd prefer to arrive on a Lagoon 77 catamaran.

Their sailing hero is Neil Reid, although the Poobah is not aware of who he is. Anybody?

Equanimous — Hans Christian 34 (W) Brett Klein

Victoria, B.C / Edmonton, Canada

Brett, 33, who didn't state an occupation, intends to do the Ha-Ha with two crew, neither of whom were identified as of press time.

Having only been sailing for two years, Brett has owned just one boat, his Hans Christian, for 18 months. He claims there is nothing unusual about her — "except the people onboard."

Brett is the only Ha-Ha entrant with a stated dream destination of the Baltic Sea. Curious.

Because of the Covid-closed U.S./Canadian border, our friends from the north have not had an easy time coming south. A number simply gave up on this year's Ha-Ha. But Brett is made of sturdier stuff and went for it. So far he's stopped at Coos Bay, San Francisco, and Santa Cruz. So far, so good.

Brett's only preference for dessert is "seconds".

Evening Star — Morgan 461 Blair Eldridge and Natasha Sinkinson Long Beach / Dana Point (2017)

Blair, 44, a mortgage broker, and his wife Natasha, will be sailing south with three crew, yet to be identified.

Blair says they have been sailing for seven years, and have owned two boats. They've owned *Evening Star*, launched in 1979, for the last three years. Their longest sail has been 900 miles from Bermuda to Newport, Rhode Island. Their goal is the South Pacific, as Blair has "a shell to place back on the beach at Vanuatu.

The Poobah remembers a time long ago at the Ala Wai in Honolulu when a guy, who seemed very old, but now that the Poobah is in his 70s realizes was actually middle-aged, came up to him looking very distressed.

"She's my Morgan 461, and we — me and those four young guys still aboard drinking beer — just got in from California," the guy said. "It was an anxiety-ridden trip for me. Because every night I'd lie in my bunk and could overhear them in the cockpit discussing where they'd sail my boat — after they'd thrown me overboard."

Ever After — Jeanneau SO 440 Andrew and Laura Park Lake Oswego, OR / Chico

Andrew, 59, is an insurance agent, while Laura is also in the insurance business. Their three crew will consist of David Weathers, 62, a teacher; and two others not identified as of press time. Lucy, their Yorkie, will be overseeing all operations.

Andy started sailing 45 years ago in El Toros and Optis. Laurie has been sailing for 10 years, beginning with a Ranger 20 on the Columbia River, and living aboard *Ever After* for the last two years.

The couple sailed to Southern California last summer. After the Ha-Ha and the Sea of Cortez, they'll continue south to Panama and then east to the windy Caribbean.

A new Hylas 56 or a catamaran would be their dream boat, and the Med their dream destination.

Nikki Henderson, "the best badass female sailor on the planet", and at 25 the youngest skipper ever in the Clipper Round the World Race, is their sailing hero.

The couple go bananas for coconut ice cream

Exit Strategy — Jeanneau SO 45.2 Steve Ginder Dana Point / Park City, Utah

(2003, 2010, 2019)

Steve, 72, retired from mortgage finance, has been the skipper in three previous Ha-Ha's. He was still assembling his crew as of press time.

"My wife and I have been sailing for 40 years. *Exit Strategy*, our dream boat, is our fourth and final boat. We bought her in 2003 and promptly joined the Ha-Ha. Since then I've logged 25,000 ocean miles between Mexico and Canada with her, did the 2015 TransPac, and countless trips to the Channel Islands.

"We'll stay in Mexico until May at which time we'll return to Dana Point."

Fair Winds — Pacific Seacraft 37 Randy and Elizabeth Jenson Seattle / Woodinville, WA (2018)

Randy, 67, is an engineer/consultant who did the '18 Ha-Ha as crew. Elizabeth, an instructional designer, will be part of the crew this year along with their 33-year-old son, Dan, a software engineer.

Randy has been sailing since high school, first in the San Francisco area, then Seattle/Puget Sound, then Alaska. He's owned lots of kayaks, canoes, small boats and such, but *Fair Winds* is his first big boat. He bought her from her original owner in Alaska in 2013, then sailed her down to Seattle.

"Fair Winds is not the fastest horse in the stable, but one of the prettiest and most seaworthy — and she's mine. I love her and she loves me." Randy's longest passage to date has been Hawaii to Seattle on a Swan 441, but he also crewed on *Tenacity* in the 2018 Ha-Ha.

"My son Dan and I are kind of disciples of John Steinbeck and Ed Ricketts, and after the Ha-Ha would like to revisit some of the places they stopped at and wrote about in *The Log From the Sea of Cortez* and *Between Pacific Tides*. By the way, their old boat, *Pacific Flyer*, is currently being restored in Port Townsend.

"While in Mexico, we anticipate opportunities to drink Mexican beer, snorkel, kite-board, and philosophize. When the money runs out, we'll probably return home via Hawaii rather than do the Bash."



Fairwyn, Rick and Gayle

Fairwyn — S&S 42 Richard and Gayle Leland Emeryville / Durham, CA

Richard, 66, is a retired attorney, while Gayle is a homemaker. Richard has been sailing for 55 years, mostly in dinghies.

Fairwyn is the couple's first boat and was bought to keep Richard active in retirement. Launched in 1957 — 64 years ago — she's no ordinary boat. Built as an ocean racer, she won the 1959 Prince of Wales Cup and other important races. In 1980 she was modified to include more creature comforts that have been used in her subsequent 35 years of cruising.

Richard and Gayle purchased *Fairwyn* in Vancouver three years ago, and kept her in Anacortes for two years, but have been basing her out of San Francisco Bay for the summer of 2021.

After cruising the Sea of Cortez for the winter, Richard and Gayle will sail *Fairwyn* out of Los Angeles.

Favignana — Bavaria Ocean 38 (W) Elliot Schlegelmilch and Margot McKirdy Olympia / Friday Harbor, WA

Elliot, 41, an IT professional, will be doublehanding with his wife, Margot, a teacher.

"We've owned our boat for three years, and moved aboard soon after buying her. She's our first boat and we're pretty new sailors. But we've been working our butts off to learn as much as we can by taking



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
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and sail down to San Diego, you've almost certainly got the experience you need to do the Ha-Ha and cruise Mexico.)

Don, 66, a retired scientist and professor, will be doublehanding with his friend Julie Dunne, a nurse.

Don has been sailing since age 10 on Sabots in Southern California, but his passion for coastal cruising started around Boston and Maine in the fall of each year. He's been the skipper and navigator of four Bermuda Races and won the 1995 Marion Race on Allegro, his Bristol 35.5. That's a big deal. Since retirement in 2016, he's lived aboard First Light.

Julie has sailed extensively since age 20, cruising and racing on the British Columbia coast, where she owned a C&C 33. Over the last nine years, she's developed a passion for cruising, particularly in the South Pacific. In addition, the couple have spent hundreds of hours free and scuba diving in the beautiful islands of Belize, Roatan, the Caymans and the Sea of Cortez.

"Fish fear Don's spear," they say, "and friends delight in Julie's fish dishes."

Covid permitting, the two intend to continue on to the Marquesas and the rest of French Polynesia. They are looking for other Ha-Ha'ers with the same de-

Flyer — Outbound 46 Wavne and Susan Koide Incline Village, Nevada (2007)

Wayne, 65, is a retired airline pilot, while Susan is a still active real estate broker. Their two crew will be Mike Jos-

selyn, 71, a retired biology professor; and "Our first year we cruised around Van- Andrew Redfern, 41, who does marine electronics and delivers boats.

Crewmember Josselyn was, along with Assistant Poobah Patsy Verhoeven and Head of Security Doña de Mallorca, one of 71 Ha-Ha participants who had to spend (If you circumnavigate Vancouver Island the night on the beach at Bahia Santa Maria in 2007. The surf had come up too high for even the panga guys.

Having started out on a friend's Hobie 16 in the 1980s, Wayne has owned four boats: an El Toro, a C&C 35, a Sydney 36 CR, and Flyer, an Outbound 46. He still owns both the Sydney and the Outbound, The former for 11 years, the Outbound for just a year.

"I have been spending the greater part of each day getting Flyer ready for the 'big cruise', putting in a watermaker, adding solar, and so forth."

While Wayne and Susan are new to cruising, Wayne has plenty of offshore experience: Three TransPacs on Santa Cruz 50/52s, and two Pacific Cups on his Sydney 36CR. He's hoping to get his cruising feet wet on the Ha-Ha and meet other cruisers who share his big dream of continuing on to the South Pacific.

Wayne has his dream boat, and fantasizes about sailing her into Sydney Harbor, spinnaker up. He loves Jimmy Spit-hill's "never give up" spirit, as demonstrated in his Cinderella-like comeback in the America's Cup on San Francisco

Some of you young pups may not understand, but when Wayne was in the Air Force he was nicknamed 'Commander Koide'.



Fundango, Scott and Joanne

Fundango — Bavaria 46 Scott Sibbald and Joanne Pilkington San Francisco /Carson City, NV ('05)

Scott, 54, is a retired United States Forest Service heavy equipment operator, which must have been interesting, while spouse Joanne is a retired software QA manager. They will be sailing south with

Heidi Stagg, an event coordinator, and her husband Aaron, 57, an electrician.

Scott and Joanne have been sailing for six years and bought Fundango, their first boat, in December of 2020.

Their longest passage has been 400 miles from La Paz to Puerto Vallarta, about the same distance they'll need to travel to get to the Ha-Ha starting line.

After the Ha-Ha they plan to cruise the Sea of Cortez. Beyond that, who knows? Although Rangiroa is their dream destination, on the dream boat they now own.

The legendary buffoon Capt Ron is their sailing hero, and his "If it's gonna happen . . ." quote is their favorite.

Lotus Biscoff ice cream is their favorite dessert, although it's sometimes hard to find in Turtle Bay and rarely available in all flavors at Bahia Santa Maria.

Scott and Joanne met on a beach in Baja 20 years ago. The Poobah met a future spouse on a beach in Baja, too — but it didn't work out as well.

Gabriella - Symbol Yachtfisher 51 Nadav Rozenberg Laguna Hills

Nadav, 40, occupation not given, will be motoring south with Ethan Yariv Barr, 39; and one other crew not yet determined.

Nadav reports he's been sailing for 22 years, during which time he's owned two boats. He's owned Gabriella for just five

Although Nadav is on a powerboat, his dream boat would be a Privilege 585 catamaran, and his dream destination would be Croatia. As it is, he thinks they may be staying in Mexico for the holidays.

His longest passage to date was nine days doing the Caribbean 1500 from the Northeast to the Caribbean, a normally much more challenging sail than the Ha-Ha. After the Ha-Ha he'll cruise up to La





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Paz and around the Sea of Cortez.

A lefty, Lee's dream destination would be Rarotonga and the entire South Pacific, ideally on a custom build from Lyman-Morse in Maine.

He likes Tiramisu, and is "happy to have a boat in the right place to finally do the Ha-Ha."

Grey Goose — Bene Oceanis 390 (W) Chad Kominek

Ventura / Camarillo (2003, 2012)

Chad, no age given, is a business owner. His crew will be his brother Rorke Kominek, 59, who is in sales; and other brother Kory Kominek, age not given, a retired Teamster.

Chad has been sailing for 30 years. During that time he's owned three boats, and after this Ha-Ha all of his boats will have done a Ha-Ha. After the first Ha-Ha Chad enjoyed several years as a 'commuter cruiser', then had the boat trucked home. After the second Ha-Ha, he sold his boat in Mexico. "This time I plan to Bash home, probably in May," he says.

Based out of Ventura, Chad has made over 100 trips to the Channel Islands, so he knows anchoring. Hiking and kayaking the Channel Islands are two of his favorite pastimes,

"I'm left-handed," confesses Chad, "and as a committed kayaker I have little use for dinghies." When necessary, he even transports provisions to his boat by kayak.



Gypsy, Rebecca and Daniel

Gypsy — Islander Freeport 36 Daniel Lewis and Rebecca Runnels Seattle, WA

Daniel, 36, is a "sprinkler fitter", which the Poobah thinks is a cool occupation. Spouse Rebecca, 35, is still active in an unspecified career.

Daniel has been sailing Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands for 18 years and has been living aboard for 15 years. Rebecca has been boating most of her life and sailing with Daniel for the last five years. "We've been living aboard and getting Gypsy ready to cruise for the past several years," the couple report, "with an eye on leaving the dock in August.

"We got married in July, and are embarking on our 14-month honeymoon: Seattle, Mexico, South Pacific, Hawaii, and back to Seattle. The Ha-Ha will be our first lengthy doublehanded passage.

"French Polynesia is our dream destination, and Rebecca loves her mother's tiramisu. Daniel is a lefty.

Haka — Mull 34 Michael Mauney Santa Barbara / Ventura

Michael, 34, is a bartender who has spent his entire life on or around boats, although he's only been sailing for four years. He intends to have two crew.

"My plan is to sail around the world," he says, "using the Ha-Ha as the first part of the adventure. So I'm really excited to meet more experienced sailors to learn from them. After Cabo, I plan to continue on to French Polynesia, then sail up to Hawaii, then back home to bank some more money.

"My custom Gary Mull design was launched in 1984 and is believed to have done at least one TransPac race to Hawaii. She's in great shape as I've put all my time and money into her to get ready for the adventure.

"I've been dreaming about sailing around the world since I was 18. For me, now is the time to poop or get off the pot. My dream boat would be a Lagoon catamaran. That's out of a bartender's budget, but maybe I'll at least get to sail on one sometime.

People call me Mooney, Moondog, Moonfish . . . anything close will do.

Helvick — Hans Christian 48T (W) Liam and Margaret Kiely Brisbane / San Jose

Liam, 62, is still an active engineer, while Margaret is a retired engineer. The two will doublehand their big boat.

Liam's love of the sea started with childhood fishing off the south coast of Ireland. Sailing for him and Margaret began on the Ottawa River, and continued with charters in the British Virgins, sailing on Lake Ontario, off Boston, and all along the Northeast coast.

"In 2005 we moved to Silicon Valley, and five years later purchased the Hans Christian in San Diego. We bought her to go beyond coastal cruising.

"As a teenager, the book that got me really excited about the sea was *The*

Riddle of the Sands by Erskine Childers. Set in pre-WWI Europe, the author was unfortunately killed by an English firing squad for "a certain mischief". Here's a quote I liked from the book:

"A keen wind from the west struck our faces, and as swiftly as it had come the fog rolled away from us, in one mighty mass, stripping clean and pure the starry dome of heaven. . ."

Blueberry cheesecake is the favored dessert aboard *Helvick*.



Hokulani, Tony

Hokulani — Tayana 48 Tony Rogers Leucadia

Tony, 54, occupation not stated, will be sailing south on his '05 Perry design with Rico Guerreiro, a teacher; Ron Rogers, his 75-year-old father; and Christopher Rogers, 30, a nephew who is an entrepreneur.

"I fell in love with sailing during a vacation in Hawaii in the 1990s and haven't stopped since. My first boat was a Cape Dory 19 I sailed all over Southern California, including two 200-mile passages to Santa Barbara Island and back.

"I then moved on to chartering larger boats and exploring different cruising grounds, including in the Caribbean, Florida, and the Puget Sound. In 2020 I sailed 750 nautical miles from Maryland to Bermuda with legendary sailor/author John Kretschmer on his Kaufman 47, *Quetzal*. Profoundly inspired by the passage, upon return to San Diego I began to search for a boat capable of making long ocean passages. I found it in *Hokulani*, a Robert Perry designed 2005 Tayana 48.

"For many years I've dreamed of sailing the Ha-Ha. While this Ha-Ha will be the first time my crew and have sailed to Mexico, *Hokulani* is a veteran of two prior cruising seasons in *mananaland*. I hope to take *Hokulani* west into the Pacific after the Ha-Ha.



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Hosea, Timan

Hosea — Allied Princess 36 Timan Eatherton and Ari Davalos Sausalito

Timan, 46, is a sailboat technician, while spouse Ari is a mystic. It's always good to have a combo of the practical and the supernatural on a boat.

During the last six years, Timan has sailed the San Francisco Bay while working as a sailboat technician for Modern Sailing School and Club. His entire focus has been sailing-related, and while he enjoys keeping the 26 sailboats at the school running, his true dream is to slowly cruise around the world.

Last October Timan traded his old truck for *Hosea*, his third boat. "She's got a golden spirit, endless love, patience, and compassion, just like her captain," he says.

Ari, Timan's wife and co-owner of *Hosea* looks after all the magical, spiritual, logistical, and food-related concerns. She has been sailing just as much as Timan, "but only half as intensely". She whispers to the oceans and the winds, and asks them for guidance and safe passage, and makes appropriate offerings when necessary.

"Our chihuahua Papichulo, aka as "Biter", "Little", or "Many Needs", has been sailing as long as both of us. He is tolerant, especially when cozy in our jacket. But watch out, he's an ankle biter.

"After Baja, we plan on sailing as far as the boat and our kitty will allow, traveling with tools, a wing, and a prayer. No wonder Sterling Hayden, who wrote the following, is their sailing hero:

"To be truly challenging, a voyage, like a life, must rest on a firm foundation of financial unrest. Otherwise, you are doomed to a routine traverse, the kind known to yachtsmen who play with their boats at sea . . . "cruising" it is called. Voyaging belongs to seamen, and to the wanderers of the world who cannot, or will not, fit in. If you are contemplating a voyage and you have the means, abandon the venture until your fortunes change. Only then will you know what the sea is all about."

Timan's favorite dessert is a chocolate cupcake, while Ari loves "whatever she hasn't tried yet".

Ilmater — Valiant 50 Jan-Åke Schulz Anchorage / Moose Pass, AK

Jan-Åke, 58, is retired and will be sailing south with "friend" Taylor Haylin. Neither stated what they did for careers.

"I raced sailboats in college," reports Jan-Åke, "so sailing is not a mystery to me. But everything else about cruising is. I've been on a shakedown cruise in Alaska with the new-to-me Valiant 50, and am finally headed south. My ultimate plan is to cross the Pacific to New Zealand and Australia.

"My longest passage was helping on a delivery of a Swan from Newport, Rhode Island to St. Martin. Now I'm ready to crush the ocean with my own boat." (The Poobah assumes autocorrect switched 'cruise' to 'crush', because nobody 'crushes' the ocean.)

This left-handed and retired 20-year citizen of the polar north is quite ready to seek his dream destination, "a theoretical combination of the spice island of Ternate, the blue lagooned Bora Bora, and culturally enticing Bali Hai."

"To follow in the wake of Moitessier, and to eschew the expectations of a wider grand society, all while husbanding my ice cream supply. . . this would be the most accurate description of my plans. Or to put it more succinctly, I'll go south until the butter melts and turn west!"

Imagine — Caliber 40 LRC JR Rousseve and Corinne McCarty Rio Rico. AZ

JR, 71, is retired from stainless steel fabrication, while Corinne, his "domestic partner", is a retired flight attendant. Their two crew will be Tom no last name given, 48, a structural engineer; and Christine, no last name given, an accountant.

"I have been sailing since 1985," reports JR. "First on a Hobie 18 on Lopez Lake near Pismo Beach, then on an O'Day 22 out of Channel Islands Harbor for 10 years. I later moved up to a Cal 2-30 for many trips out to Santa Cruz Island. That was a really fun 12 years.

"I've owned Imagine for 2½ years, and she's truly the boat of my dreams. After the Ha-Ha we plan to cruise the Sea of Cortez and wherever the wind blows us. But our dream cruise would be to the South Pacific."

Intrepid — Hylas 44CC Russ and Debbie Noorda South Lake Tahoe (2007)

Russ, 68, is retired from a career in rigging and sail repair. Debra is retired from a career in bookkeeping. Their three crew will be Richard Panuschka, 35, an environmental scientist; Caitlin Robinson, 36, a nurse; and Kris Morehead, 40, a captain.

Russ and Debbie did the 2007 Ha-Ha with their Morgan Out-Island ketch *Zeph-yra*, then did the Puddle Jump in 2009. But they did it by way of Panama and the Galapagos before stopping at French Polynesia, the Cooks, and Niue before spending the cyclone season in New Zealand.

"After 3½ years of living aboard and sailing Zephyra," the couple writes, "we sold her in New Zealand and moved back into our home in Tahoe. As soon as we both found work, we knew we needed another boat, so we bought an Ericson 35 that we sailed on Lake Tahoe for nine years.

"Last fall we purchased our Hylas 44 and having been refitting her for this year's Ha-Ha. Our retirement plan is to spend our winters in Mexico and Central America, and our summers at Lake Tahoe."


Russ' sailing hero is Bernard Moitessier, "who didn't know how to stop sailing."

It's About Time — Hunter 42CC (W) John and Christal Bell San Diego / Chula Visita


John, no age given, is in fusion tech, while Christal is retired from working in the city of Roseville senior program.

Allen, 62, is a retired IT manager, while Maria is a retired relationship consultant. They will be doublehanding.

"Maria and I have been sailing for 20 years, up until four years ago mostly in the relatively sheltered waters of the Solent on England's south coast, with the occasional trip to France.

"Jamala is our fourth boat, and nearly twice as big as our first, which was a bilge keel Sabre 27. Despite having bought Jamala in October of 2020, as of this writing, we've yet to sail her. Indeed, we haven't even seen her! She's still on the hard in Washington State, waiting for us to return from the United Kingdom.

"Our having bought a 53-ft boat we've never seen probably flags us as lunatics, but we know a lot of people familiar with the boat. We also had the hull, engine and rigging surveyed, and had 800 photographs scrutinized by an Amel expert. Even so, we're going to be holding our breath the first time we drive up to her.

"In 2017 we sailed our Moody 425 from England to the Caribbean and East Coast of the United States, before heading to Panama, the Galapagos and French Polynesia. Our circumnavigation plans were ended by Covid, and we sold our boat in Nuku Hiva.

"Our plan is to spend a season in Mexico, return to French Polynesia in 2022, then continue our circumnavigation.

"Robin Knox-Johnston, who we shared a pontoon with in Portsmouth Harbour, is our sailing hero.

"Maria deserves the perseverance award, as she's suffered from seasickness since we left the UK.

"We think our dream boat is the one we now own, although we'll know more once we actually see her.

"Dessert? Thanks, but we'll pass on durian, which looks like a green porcupine, smells like rotten onions, and is banned in many public places because of its odor".

The Poobah has just one question. Who do you sell a boat to on tiny and remote Nuka Hiya?

Jolly Rodger — Catalina 42 Blake Maxwell and Rodger Maxwell Newport Beach / Costa Mesa

Blake, 36, an insurance broker, will be sailing south with Rodger Maxwell, 66, his dad and the boat's namesake. Rodger is in the real estate business. They will have one other crew.

"I purchased *Jolly Rodger* in Anacortes in 2019," says Blake, "and along with my wife Kim and six-month-old daughter Amela cruised her in Washington, British Columbia and Alaska before bringing her home to Newport Beach."

Blake has been sailing 30+ years, which is a lot for a 36-year-old, during which time he's owned more than 10 boats. He has also done a TransPac.

Blake's dream would be a Hylas in the Tuamotu Islands. His sailing hero is Robin Lee Graham, who famously circumnavigated in his teens aboard a 24-ft boat.

Apple pie is the dessert of choice on *Jolly Rodger*.

History Lesson: The title Jolly Roger is thought to come from the French phrase *joli rouge*, which means 'pretty red'. The original pirate flags were blood red and thus signaled that no mercy would be given once the pirates boarded and battle ensued.

Josie— Dehler 39 Jo and David Sandry Sausalito

Sandy, a therapist, and sibling David, 50, a CPA, will have Shannon Service, a journalist/film director along as crew.

"We've both been sailing on San Francisco Bay for 20 years," reports Jo, "and grew up sailing in England. We've both owned smaller boats, a PS 25 and a Bear boat, and we now own *Josie* in partnership.

"David's dream destination is to cruise the Pacific Northwest, Vancouver and more of Canada. I want to circumnavigate. We'll see how this trip goes."

The Poobah doesn't know if these folks are secretive or just ran out of time filling out their entry, but we don't know the important stuff, such as what they like for dessert, who their sailing heroes are, or if they have a favorite quote. But it's possible that David might like that old accountant motto: "Be audit you can be."



Jubel, Kyle

Jubel — Gulfstar 44CC Kyle and Leah Mackenzie Victoria, British Columbia (2000)

Breaking with stereotypes, Kyle, 30, is a Certified Public Accountant, while Leah, 32, is a mechanic. They will doublehand on what will be the first Ha-Ha for Leah. Kyle did the 2000 Ha-Ha with his parents on *Scalawag*, a TransPac 49. They continued on to Panama, Ecuador, the Galapagos, then thru the Canal to the Caribbean, then back to Canada.

Leah was introduced to sailing by Kyle and has since voyaged to Alaska, and fallen in love with it as much as Kyle. They've been living aboard their 1980 Gulfstar since 2018. Previously they owned an Ericson 29.

The couple have two pets, a Shiba Inu named Ricky, and Moby the cat. "Both can't wait for the beaches."

Kyle, who is left-handed, and Leah who isn't, dream of the South Pacific, and if they were on an Amel 50, it would be even better. They love almost all desserts.






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


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Just Lucky — Pacific Seacraft 40 Ron and Kirsten Risden Seattle, WA

Ron, 69, is retired from working in the "supply chain at Boeing", while Kirsten is a retired "user researcher". They will be sailing south with Jim Walsh, 67, a stillactive finance manager; and David Jade, a retired software engineer.

"We got into sailing later in life than most," says Ron, "starting only 12 years ago. We've raced a bit, especially on our first boat, a Hanse 34. That really helped up the learning process.

"We've lived aboard our Pacific Seacraft 40 for a little over five years. Shortly after buying her we did the Inside Passage to Southeast Alaska — and spent the winter in Petersburg. The following summer we went down the outside of Vancouver Island."

Ron would like to sail around the world but on a Cabo Rico 47PH. His sailing hero is Skip Novak, an around the world racer and Cape Horn legend.

Ron is a former professional ski patrolman for 11 years; Kirsten is a former cross country ski racer, and Jim and John are lifelong enthusiastic skiers. K2 — Corsair 36 Tri Bryan Martin and Nancy Virostko Santa Cruz (2015, 2018)

The Corsair trimaran has excellent speed potential in part because she only displaces about 5,500 pounds. That's just a little more than the food and water Doña de Mallorca insists must be carried on the mothership *Profligate* for her large crew.

Bryan doesn't have any sailing heroes,

but he's got a favorite quote: "I spent all my money on booze, broads and boats; the rest I wasted."

Mango ice cream is his dessert thing.



Kalewa, Katie and Kevin

Kalewa — Custom 50-ft Cat Kevin and Katie Millett Nawiliwili/Kalaheo, Kauai, Hawaii (2006, 2008, 2019)

Kevin, 56, will be doing the fourth Ha-Ha with the custom high-performance cat that he designed and built in 2003. No charter cat, *Kalewa* is particularly fast in light air. The exuberant Katie will be doing her second Ha-Ha with him.

When Kevin did his first Ha-Ha with his first wife and daughter, the cat Kalewa didn't even have a main salon. So they froze their buns off while in Alaska prior to the Ha-Ha. That shortcoming has been corrected. Prior to the start of the Ha-Ha, Kevin and *Kalewa*, with Katie, did their third trip to Alaska.

Want to run your boat with electric motors? Kevin is the man with first-hand experience. It's not always been good. Kastaway — Hunter 420CC Steve and Karen Cloney San Diego / Placerville

Steve, 58, a just-retired facilities manager will be using the Ha-Ha "as the launching point for my retirement".

Steve will be sailing south with his cousin Melissa and her four kids Ella, 16; Mia, 14; Noah, 12; and Lana, 11. The kids will be busy with their ship's duties and their schooling. They homeschool, but their mom & teacher doesn't let them shirk their work.

Steve sailed in high school, bought his first boat in 2013, and became addicted. He has owned Kastaway for 5 years. Once they get to Mexico, Steve's wife, Karen will join the family, along with Melissa's husband and her mother.

Steve and Karen plan a circumnavigation. Bora Bora which looks best from a distance is their dream destination.

Key Lime Pie — Kelly Peterson 44 Pawel Drzazga Channel Islands / Clovis, CA

Matthew, 67, is a retired restaurant owner, who will be sailing with his daughter Nicole, 24, who is a restaurant manager: and son Gustavo. 26. also a restaurant manager. Friend Liz Biggs, 24, who is in sales, will round out the

Matthew has been sailing for 10 years and has ASA 101, 102 and 103 certifications. *Knot To Tipsea* is his third sailboat, one he's had docked in San Diego Bay for

"I sail almost every day, four months a year," says Matthew. So far his longest sail is to Catalina. After the Ha-Ha he plans to keep the boat in the San Carlos

"I would like to explore the Sea of Cortez like Steinbeck did." he says. It's possible, too, as the Sea hasn't changed much since the great author was there. Joshua Slocum is Matthew's sailing hero.

(2007, 2016, 2019)

Keith, 79, is a retired enterprise resource planning consultant who has done three Ha-Ha's. He'll have a crew of three: Joshua Ott, 38, an aerospace engineer who was Ha-Ha crew in '16; Curt Smiscik, 40, who runs a CNC machine shop; and Jared Baldridge, 24, a greatnephew and mechanical engineer.

"I've been sailing for 67 years," says Keith, "and have owned three sailboats: an eight-foot El Toro, a sistership to Kenichi Horie's famous Mermaid; and

"Our previous boats were an Express 27 and a Newport 41. We've had the Catalina 42 for three years. Our dream would be to sail a Gulet in Greece."

Suzie has the classic sailor/surfer's



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
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dream: to find great surf breaks, anchor off them, and paddle in from the boat.

Norb, 65, a retired Fire Department Division Chief, will be sailing south on the S&S design with perhaps the greatest amount of tumblehome in any production boat. His crew will be Jeff Cutler, a Fire Apparatus Engineer, and two others not determined as of press time.

Norb learned to sail while growing up in Santa Cruz. He's owned a number of boats over the years, including the Catalina 27 he and his family sailed on Lake Tahoe. He taught his three children to sail, and they've all taught sailing on Donner Lake. If it weren't for medical school and college, they'd be joining him on the

Lucky Star was Norb's retirement present in 2014, then he did the '15 and '16 SoCal Ta-Ta's, which are the mini version of the Ha-Ha's.

As noted above, this will be the 12th Ha-Ha for Myron and Marina on their venerable Swan 44. Only the mothership *Profligate*, with 23, and *Talion*, with 13, have done more.

What's one of the best tips a finance guy can give others to keep cruising costs down? Get the boat you like and keep her forever. Trading boats is expensive.

While *Mykonos* was recently re-powered, Myron is hoping for more wind than in some of the previous Ha-Ha's.

When not sailing, Myron enjoys horseback riding.

Nereid — Catalina 425 (W) Larry and Donna Davis San Diego / Riverside

Larry, 59, is a retired small business owner, while Donna is a retired neonatal intensive care nurse. Their two crew will be Terry O'Donnell, 64, an executive and brother-in-law; and Danna O'Donnell, an executive and cheerleader coach who is Donna's sister.

"I started sailing when I was in the Navy and stationed in Okinawa in 1984," advises Larry. "I loved it from the start. Donna and I have owned six boats, including speed, power, and sail. We bought our 2019 Catalina 425 last year.

"I retired in April of this year, and this



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will be our first long passage. We intend to continue on to La Paz for a while, then cross over to Banderas Bay, and finally return to San Diego for the summer.

"Odyssey is pretty much my dream boat, as I have her the way I like her which is 'Old School' and distinctly different from my race boat. Although I fully



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


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intend to terrorize the cruising division of Banderas Bay Race Week with Odyssey.

Dan, 61, is in brand management, while his fiancée is still active in an un-











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

Their crew will be Dave Summerfeldt. 56, retired from the Alaska Airlines IT group; and Sally Rothwell, a retired geologist and environmental permitter.

Dave and Sally are experienced sailors, having sailed their Outremer 45 performance cat from the Med to the Caribbean. The two promise they won't mention the disparity in the monohull's downwind speed. At least not every day.

John and Marcy started sailing in Alaska 27 years ago, and Rochambeau is their fifth boat. They still own a previous boat, a Jeanneau 44, in Alaska. They bought their 49 in San Francisco in May of this year from a bar pilot whose dreams of Tahitian anchorages gave way to RV life.

The couple have extensive sailing experience in the Med, in the Caribbean, and in Alaska. Their dream would be to do the World ARC, but only if it was five years long instead of just 18 months.

The first day John met Mary in college, he told friends that he was going to marry her. They've been together for 39 years.

Runaway — Hylas 70 Julie and Lowell Potiker San Diego / La Jolla (2018, 2019)

Lowell, 61, an executive, and Julie will be sailing with a crew of eight for his third Ha-Ha. Among them will be Peter Frost, 39, the hired skipper; and Lake Rickolt, 39, another captain.

"Julie missed the last two Ha-Ha's due to last-minute family emergencies," reports Lowell, "so I'm excited that she will finally get to share the wonderful sailing experiences and camaraderie of the Ha-Ha that I have told her about!

"I've been sailing for over 30 years in a variety of vessels starting with a Sunfish and culminating with our current Hylas 70," reports Lowell. "I've owned 13 boats, including Runaway for the last four years. We bought her to cross oceans and do long trips such as the Ha-Ha.

"Runaway is a veteran of the last two Ha-Ha's, but her longest passage was doing a TransPac. After the Ha-Ha we will loiter in the Sea of Cortez for a while, then either turn left and head for the Canal or bring her back to San Diego and then race her right back down again to Puerto Vallarta!

"Our dream destination is the South Pacific, which we have delayed going to because of Covid. Our dream boat is the one we have right now. My sailing hero is Joshua Slocum, while my favorite dessert is Key Lime pie.


Sacagawea, which they purchased in Seattle, is #2 of the 25 Caliber 47s built.

"Our dream destination would be the South China Sea."


Seabiscuit — Watson 48 PB Belinda Erdelt and David Herndon Dover, NH / Houston, TX

Originally from Vancouver, B.C., in 1991, Garry, who just this year got his U.S. citizenship, sailed south on a friend's boat. The intention was to sail

around the world. But he was stopped in his tracks in Santa Barbara when Cupid introduced him to Suesan and her two children. Within 10 months he and Suesan were married.

In 2004, with the kids grown and adventure still in the couple's blood, they sold their home and bought Sugar. It was their first boat, and they moved aboard.

Having sailed to Ensenada a couple of times, and to the Channel Islands even more often, they figure now is their time to expand their horizons.

But with the onset of Covid, Suesan went virtual with her classes, and Garry decided there is no time like the present to retire. Since Suesan is about to take her classes 'on the road', they've spent the last year getting the boat ready for long-distance cruising. They plan to cruise Mexico for as long as they can.

Garry was the 'Covid Commodore' of the always friendly Santa Barbara YC, which has often been the starting point of the SoCal Ta-Ta, aka the mini Ha-Ha.

Sukha — Bristol 40 **Lucy James**

San Francisco / Sierra de San Pedro, MX (2012, 2013, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019)

Lucy, a former pilot, will have a crew of two: Sue Drake, who is retired from the insurance industry and is a veteran of six Ha-Ha's; and Paul Kamen, 70, a vet of three Ha-Ha's.

"I've sailed sporadically throughout my life, usually as a passenger or crew," Lucy reports. "My longest passage has been 1,000 miles from Bermuda to Antigua. I did the 2019 Ha-Ha aboard the Deerfoot 62 Emma, which is doing the Ha-Ha again this year.

"While I have a 14-ft dinghy, Sukha is my first big boat. I bought her in July of this vear."

After the Ha-Ha, 'Luz' will keep Sukha in the Sea of Cortez and do some exploring. But her dream destination would be "anywhere with warm turquoise water and white sand." She'd like to enjoy being there on a "fast but comfortable" catamaran.

Lucy likes the quote, "Go as far as you can see; when you get there, you'll be able to

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see further." That's from Scottish historian and more, Thomas Carlyle.

Lucy is a righty who likes three kinds of desserts: crème brûlée, sticky toffee, and ti-

The trio hope to continue on to French Polynesia in the spring.

"We're looking forward to playing with all the new gadgets on Thirst Responder, and liken ourselves to Captain Ron in that we take the pace of life as it's offered. With all the politics and anger in break with like-minded people."

"Jeff and I have been sailing together for 20 years," reports Naomi, "and have owned the Wilderness since 2000. We did the Ha-Ha the following year, and in 2004 spent six months sailing her to Newport, Rhode Island. Not only were we still together when we got there, we lived in Newport for 12 years.

"We recently moved back to Manhattan Beach and got our old berth back in King Harbor in Redondo Beach.

"We doublehanded the Ha-Ha in 2004, but this year will be sailing with our two daughters, who are excited but nervous about the adventure.

"While we hope to keep our boat in either Cabo or La Paz for the winter, our dream destination continues to be Two Harbors, Catalina, which we are fortunate enough to visit often."

A couple who have cruised from Southern California to Rhode Island and their dream destination is Two Harbors? Somebody contact the PR people there.

Wind Waker — Oceanis 41 Sundeep Ghuman **Oakland** (2009, 2018)

Sundeep, 34, is a programmer/builder and will be sailing with three crew. They include Barry Demak, 55, a captain and sailing instructor who has done 1 and 1/3 Ha-Ha's. One-third? He was on the Ha-Ha boat that was hit by a whale and sunk about 10 years ago. Thanks to the crew and the Coast Guard, a "textbook rescue" was effected 180 miles south of the border.

"Seven years ago I decided that I wanted to live sustainably on a sailboat," says 'Capt Deep', "so I learned to sail. Two years ago I became the proud owner of my Oceanis 41.

'Capt Deep's' dream boat is a 50 to 60-foot catamaran that is fully outfitted with solar panels for unlimited sustainable traveling. "But for now, I just want to make it to the Med and bum around for a couple years. Eventually, I dream of sailing back to Thailand, and pulling up on Haad Wai Nam, where I first came up with this sailing dream."

Sundeep's sailing hero is "100%, without a doubt, Moana" of the 2017 Disney

His favorite quote is from Hamlet: "Which dreams indeed are ambition, for the very substance of the ambitious is merely the shadow of a dream."



Windhorse, Vickie and Dennis

Windhorse — Isl. Freeport 41 (W) **Dennis Patterson and Vickie Reed Napa** (2016)

Dennis, a retired printer, and partner Vicki, a retired teacher, both did the Ha-Ha in 2016. They will have two crew.

Dennis has been boating for 30 years and sailing for eight years. Three years ago he earned his 50-ton master's license. He drives a water taxi in San Francisco as his retirement job. Vicki has been sailing for seven years and boating much longer than that.

The couple have been living aboard their Bob Perry design ever since returning from the '16 Ha-Ha, and even have wine on tap.

Their longest passage to date was Bashing north of Turtle Bay for 48 hours. They won't have to do that again for a while. because they plan on staying in Mexico.

(Inside Sailing: Before the Poobah started Latitude 38 in 1976, he sold boats, including one of the first Islander Freeport 41s. That boat appeared in the then very large Cow Palace Boat Show in San Francisco, after which it became surprisingly popular. One even starred in a television series. Who can name that show?)

WindStar — Liberty 49 (W) Stephen and Bente Millard Santa Barbara (2010, 2015, 2018)

Stephen, 68, is a festival producer and vacht broker, while Bente is an attorney. The couple have done three Ha-Ha's, and as always Senji, their Shih Tzu, will round out the crew.

"This will be our fourth season in Mexico aboard our meticulously restored 1986 Liberty 49, the fourth of 13 that were built. Someone said the definition of insanity is doing the same thing over again and expecting a different result. If so, we

must be crazy, because each of our trips has been a different adventure. We're looking forward to meeting new friends on the Ha-Ha, knowing that we'll run into many of them again in the different anchorages in Mexico."

Both Stephen and Bente will be working remotely from Mexico. Bente in real estate and business law, Stephen in mega arts, festival producing, and vacht sales. "It means we'll occasionally fly home for business. But we'll also have family fly down to meet us in our favorite places.

"While our local cruising grounds of the northwest Channel Islands are beautiful, we can't wait to be jumping overboard into 80-degree water again."

To add a bit of culture to the program, Bente is a common girl's name in Denmark and the Netherlands, and means 'Blessed'. It is pronounced Ben-Tah. Benedict is the male version.



Windswept, Don and Gloria

Windswept - 2000 Hylas 46 Don Chaney and Gloria Bell **Monterey County**

Don, 67, and Gloria are both retired. He as a tile contractor, she as an executive for an apple juice company.

Don has been sailing most of his life. He bought his first boat, Inyala, a 47-ft gaff yawl that was built in 1901 while in the Med. Yes, 1901. "Inyala owned me, not the other way around," he admits. "But lots of fun."

While working in the oil fields in Singapore, he found Lukana, a 41-ft ketch. He eventually sailed her across the mighty Indian Ocean to Perth, Western Australia, to see Dennis Conner win the 1986 America's Cup.

Gloria began her ocean adventures skippering her Carver 32 motoryacht, frequently in the Monterey Bay Triangle of Moss Landing, Santa Cruz and Monterey. She was at a local tavern one day when Don asked her to dance. They've been dancing together ever since.

In March of 2019, the couple traveled

Wren — Ron Holland 43 Tim Prouty and Wren Herring Newport, Rhode Island / Sausalito

Tim is still active in media marketing despite being 75, while Wren, the boat's namesake, is a Registered Nurse.

Tim has been sailing since a kid, starting on Minnesota's lakes. After moving to the Bay Area in '79, he bought a Ranger 23, and a few years later moved up to the Ericson 35 that he kept for a quarter of a century.

Wren is one of 13 Ron Holland 43s that were built to order. Tim "stalked" her online before finally picking her up in Rhode Island in '07. After a season there, the couple needed a warmer location, so they moved to Norfolk and enjoyed five years of great sailing and friends on the Chesapeake Bay.

After trucking the boat to Sausalito, they've been enjoying Wren on the Bay and in the ocean.

Wren is Tim's dream boat, while Wren would prefer a 70-ft catamaran in the Caribbean, as it would have room for all her family and friends.

Beryl and Miles Smeeton are Tim and Wren's sailing heroes. For you young pups out there, Miles Smeeton (1906-1988) and Beryl Smeeton (1905-1979) were an outstanding couple of travelers, pioneers, explorers, mountaineers, cruising sailors, recipients of numerous sailing awards, farmers, prolific authors, and wildlife conservationists. They famously pitch-poled on their way to Cape Horn.




