



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CRUISIN' TO THE CAPE

Welcome to the 2022 Baja Ha-Ha 'Meet the Fleet' guide.

Please understand there are going to be many inaccuracies in the guide because there will have been many changes in crew and even boats between the time the guide was published and the November 1 start of the rally. We appreciate your understanding.

Many of the mistakes in this publication will probably be the fault of the Grand Poobah, although in some cases he was given incorrect, vague, confusing or contradictory information. He did his best with what he had to work with and appreciates your understanding.

In some cases, the Poobah paraphrased words to sentences in the interest of clarity and frivolity. In all cases, the Poobah did his best to adhere to the author's intent.

CODE:

* Each asterisk means there is a 'kid' onboard. We define a 'kid' as someone chronologically, not just emotionally, 16 years or younger.

(W) Stands for white sails only, as opposed to sailing with a spinnaker or gennaker.

Years, such as **(2013)** indicate at least the minimum number of times the skipper or crew has done a Ha-Ha.

Cities. In cases where two cities are listed, the first is the boat's homeport, the second is where the owner(s) receives mail and most likely lives or used to live.

Triggers. When the words 'wife', 'husband', 'spouse', 'children', and such are used in this guide, they are terms of endearment and respect, not ownership or lesser status.

If the male's name appears first, it's because that's how it appeared in the registration form. In cases where only the man's name was given, the Poobah, whenever it seemed called for, added the name of the wife/partner/significant other. More than a few of you guys 'owe' him.

Ages. The Poobah publishes the age of the men when available, but doesn't publish the age of women unless they are 35 or younger. This is sexist, of course, but the Poobah did it out of respect for women who are sometimes sensitive about their age.

A Cat's Paw — Sun Odyssey DS 44 Bernie Ross

Bellingham, WA / Vancouver, B.C.

Bernie, 59, is the CEO of a private company. His crew will be Rob Keith, 57, a School Principal; Stephen Hafner, 58, a Financial Consultant; and Sam Haffney, 59, a Social Worker.

Bernie has been sailing for 45 years, both in keel boats and dinghies. His most recent

sailing muse has been a Waszp, although he has owned 'The Paw' for nine years. "Normally these boats only get used as coastal cruisers," Bernie says, "but we've put a lot of effort in retrofitting ours to be able to go offshore safely. Our longest passage will be getting from Port Townsend to San Diego for the start of the rally."

The Paw crew is loaded with experience. Rob is a sailing instructor with yacht skipper credentials longer than a midnight watch. Sam is a lifelong sailor/racer/cruiser with over 50 years of sailing experience and a load of credentials. A member of the Royal Canadian YC in Toronto since the '70s, Stephen has sailed and raced from Lake Ontario to Florida to the Caribbean to the San Juan Islands.

Bernie's dream destination is Hawaii, his dream boat is the mythical boat that "cleans itself", Popeye is his sailing hero, 'shiver me timbers' is his favorite expression, and he prefers humble pie for dessert.

"I first heard about the Ha-Ha when I was a young guy crewing on a 63-ft trimaran doing the Van Isle 360 race. That was 20 years ago. Since it's taken so long, I'm really looking forward to the Ha-Ha. Once in Mexico, I'll keep the boat there for several seasons."

Akela — Bristol Channel Cutter 28 Joel Stone Newport Beach / June Lake

Joel, 60, is a retired Attorney. Christine Romanski, "Competent Crew and Medical, too" will be his crew.

"I've been sailing since I was a kid at Boy Scout Camp," reports Joel. "Once I finished school I bought my first boat, the Wilderness 21 Wild Child. I got my first taste of cruising on her while singlehanding on up to week-long adventures along the coast and around Catalina Island. I also raced her in Beer Cans and Catalina Island races. My next boat was *Eagle*, a Cal 25 that I raced in Long Beach and to Catalina. On other peoples' boats, I crewed offshore races and deliveries around the Channel Islands and down from San Francisco. My favorite cruise was with friends and multiple Ha-Ha vets Paul Ludgate and Glenn Twitchell, sailing from Auckland to the Bay of Islands in New Zealand. Needless to say, my cruising companions were quite difficult to get along with, so I look forward to more friendly folks on the Ha-Ha. Just kidding.


"Linden first sailed on a West Wight Potter that she won in a drawing for charity. Scott's first sailboat was a Ranger 20 he raced in the Portland fleet."

"As Covid still had its grip on things in 2020, I sailed back down to Mexico as part of the Assistant Poobah Patsy Verhoeven's unofficial 'Nada Ha-Ha'. I got as far as Puerto Vallarta before sailing back to Seattle and making the mistake of wintering over in the wet Pacific Northwest. I'm currently wrapping up my time in Alaska, and can't wait to be in the sun again.

We also enjoyed cruising down the coast as far as Guadalupe and Cedros Islands. And I owned a Rainbow 24 that I happily solo sailed throughout San Diego Bay.

"After moving up to San Francisco Bay I rented boats from Cass' Marina in Sausalito, which allowed me to keep sailing without the expense of owning a boat. When I retired about five years ago, I bought my Rafiki 37. She's a perfect fit for my love of traditional, solid cruising boats. There have been windy days on San Francisco Bay that I've enjoyed solo sailing with a double-reefed main while those with lighter and faster boats elected to stay at the dock. The other thing that gives me confidence in *Antares* is knowing that she'd been through the Canal and across the Atlantic to Spain.

"I'll be assessing my sailing plans after seeing how I feel after doing the Ha-Ha. It could be the start of a beautiful relationship! I have friends in Sayulita and Hawaii, and even in St. Malo, France! It sure would be fun to drop in on them sometime! My dream boat would be similar to my current ride, but maybe a little larger for comfort. Something like a Hans Christian 43. Yes, I love canoe sterns.

"I appreciate the attitude and philosophy of Bernard Moitessier; who seemed to really connect with the sea. I also love the sentiment expressed by 'I am the master of my fate and the captain of my soul', which comes from the poem *Invictus* by Henley. It captures the attitude required to achieve goals.

I discovered that I'm not a racing-minded sailor. I love handing the tiller off to anyone interested and have been known to alter course to improve the angle of the sun reaching the cockpit on a chilly day. I look forward to a return to Guadalupe Island to see the great changes since the many thousands of goats were 'removed'. When I last visited, everything had been nibbled down to the ground."

Thanks to Disney's 1984 animated movie *Lion King*, many people associate 'rafiki' with anointing somebody by smearing oil over a human or animal's forehead. Over the years the word has taken on slang meanings. One is to lift something up to honor it, as in lifting a cake in front of a



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crowd. August Dream - Alyssa & Jason

August Dream — Jeanneau 43 Jared, Jason, Alyssa and Corey Long Beach / Chandler / Boise, ID

August Dream is entered in the names of Jared Lee, 55, who is self-employed; Jason Bowman, 54, who is self-employed; Alyssa Bowman, also self-employed; and Corey Hanks, 46, the outlier in that he's a Facilities Engineer.

"I've been sailing for six years," reports Jared, "and am excited about the opportunity to participate in the Ha-Ha and visit the Sea of Cortez! This is the first boat I've owned, and my longest passage to date has only been from Long Beach to Ensenada. We plan to spend six months in Mexico before we return to Southern California.

"My dream destinations are the Med and the South Pacific. My dream boat is a Moody DS54, which I have on order. Construction should start by November.

"My only sailing hero is Richard Henry Dana, namesake of Dana Point, and author of Two Years Before the Mast. I'm righthanded and love Key Lime Pie."

Poobah's Galley Tip: Key Limes, also known as Mexican limes or West Indies limes — are small, spherical limes that are light yellow rather than green. Like some people, they are thin-skinned, which means they don't store well and are best used after two days. Key Lime juice is prized for being more tart and more aromatic than regular

lime juice. As such, they are ideal to use when making sweetened-up desserts — such as Key Lime Pie!

*Avogato — Amel Supermaramu 53 Richard, Kathy and Piper (12) May Albany, OR / Port Angeles, WA

Richard, 52, is a Pilot, while Kathy works in Marketing and Development. Their crew will be daughter Piper a Student of Life.

"I sailed a Sunfish as a kid," reports Richard, "then crewed with my family during summers. I have been the skipper of our bigger boats for five years. My life-changing experience came at age 14 when I sailed and got to sleep on the deck with Outward Bound.

"Our ketch *Avogato* is the first boat we've owned, and we've had her for two years. There is nothing unusual about her, although it helps to know French if you need parts because Amels are proudly 100% French.

"We like our Amel Supermaramu a lot, so she's close to our dream boat. We've read all of the sailing guru John Kretschmer's books, so maybe he's our sailing hero.

"Favorite quote: "Livin' the dream". Favorite dessert? Creme Brûlée. And yes, I, Richard, am left-handed.

"My longest passage is six days. After Ha-Ha we plan to go through the Panama Canal to the Caribbean and the East coast of the United States, even though our dream destination is the South Pacific."

The Poobah can't recall another boat named after a fruit. Avogato comes from the Nahuatl Indian word "ahuácatl, meaning testicle. It is thought that the reference is either due to the avocado's shape or the fact that it was considered to possess aphrodisiac qualities by the Aztecs.

Azure - Jane & Rodney

Azure — Cal 40 Rodney and Jane Pimentel Alameda

Rodney, 61, is a Civil Engineer, while Jane is in Solar and Tech Sales.

Rodney grew up sailing in Alameda and is an avid racer. "If there's another boat on the water, it's a race, is his way of looking at things," reports Jane. Rodney has done countless races, including three TransPacs and two Pacific Cups. In fact, Rodney and crew took Class and PHRF division in this July's Pacific Cup.

Jane isn't a racer, but she brings out the cruiser in Rodney. Together they've already cruised much of the world together during two 2-year adventures. The first was in 1996, a year after they married. That's when they sailed to Mexico and did the first Pacific Puddle Jump to the South Pacific. The culmination of that adventure was their son R.J. being born in New Zealand. Then in 2009 they bought a Leopard 45 catamaran and took RJ and his brother Leo to the Caribbean, the Azores, and across the Med to Turkey.

"There is one thing left to check off our sailing list," they say, "finally doing the Baja Ha-Ha. We've sailed to our other dream destinations, so Mexico is now it."

Azure is a Cal 40, one of the classic yacht designs of all time. When built in 1966, a lot of skeptics said fiberglass boats would never last. Ha! Not only did the Pimentel's Cal 40 win the Pacific Cup, Stan and Sally Lindsay Honey did the same this summer in the highly competitive Bermuda Race.







Beso del Mar - Brad & Dan

Beso del Mar — Hunter 46 (W) Daniel Brock Richmond YC / Sacramento

Daniel, 65, is a retired Insurance Agent. He'll be sailing south with Jeff Smith, 65, who is retired; Dave Turner, 66 who is also retired; and Brad Hoff, 67, a retired Appraiser with 37 years of sailing experience in San Francisco Bay and the San Juan Islands.

I have owned two boats," says Daniel. "My current boat is in Seattle, and I have had it for five years. I have been reading about the Ha-Ha for many years, and this year finally decided it's time to go."

Daniels longest passage was from Los Angeles to Seattle. After the Ha-Ha he plans to Bash back up the Baja and eventually to Marina Del Ray.

"My sailing hero is Joshua Slocum, dessert by far is Häagen-Dazs chocolate ice cream, and I'm not left-handed."

Daniel likes the quote "Be careful what you wish for" and his dream boat changes daily.

Big Baby — Hans Christian 38 MKII (W) Chet Moody and Lynn McDaniel Anacortes, Washington

Chet, 66, is retired from the Military and from Baking. Spouse Lynn is a retired RN. They plan on doublehanding in what will be their first Ha-Ha.

"We've been sailing for over four years," the couple report, "and have owned two boats. *Big Baby*, a classic beauty launched in 1981, has been ours for just five months, She's our dream boat."

While the couple will cruise in the Sea of Cortez after the Ha-Ha, their dream destinations are French Polynesia and Australia.

'Severely left-handed Lynn,' like her husband, likes chocolate pie. Who doesn't?

"Don't sail where birds walk and never approach a dock faster than you want to

hit it," is not only their favorite quote, it's great advice.

Howard Blackburn is their sailing hero. Who? A Canadian-American fisherman, Blackburn lost his fingers and toes to frostbite in 1883 fishing out of Gloucester. Not only did he later go on to become a successful businessman, but he also overcame his disability by setting record times for singlehanding across the Atlantic Ocean, organized a gold-mining expedition to Alaska, and later did the Great Loop of the Eastern United States in a small boat. Blackburn should be much better known.



Big Fish - Ron & Carol

Big Fish — Beneteau Oceanis 47.3 (W) Ron and Carol Pierce Marina del Rey / Paradise

Ron, 73, is a General Contractor, while Carol is a retired School Teacher. But there is a lot more to their story.

"I was a Top Grand Prix and Superbike motorcycle racer," reports Ron. "I raced for every major manufacturer during my 16-year career. I had many big wins, including the Superbike in Daytona in 1979. I retired from the sport in 1981 after winning my last race at Riverside Raceway. I've also been a pilot and owned two small airplanes, my last being a Beech A-36. But I haven't flown my own plane in 20 years.

"Carol and I owned Breckenridge Hill Vineyards and Winery in Bakersfield, where we produced five wonderful red and three white award-winning wines. But we just sold it and purchased 232 acres in Oroville. We are preparing to build our new home on the property and possibly start a new vineyard and winery.

"We have owned a construction company for over 40 years, and are currently helping rebuild the Northern California town of Paradise. You'll remember it was almost completely destroyed three years ago, claiming more than 80 lives and over 14,000 homes.

"We don't have much spare time, but when we do we like to draw and paint.

"We only started sailing two years ago when we bought our Beneteau. Carol named her *Big Fish* after the 2003 Tim Burton comedy/drama. "I'm like the Big Fish," she says, "with lots of stories. But my stories are all true, not fantasy.

"This will be our first major passage, as our longest one to date has been from San Francisco to Catalina. We hope to do more Ha-Ha's in the future. Close friend and Ha-Ha vet Larry McKay is the one who told us about the event, and he'll be one of our two crew.

"Capt Ron is our sailing hero, both of us are left-handed, and the Ha-Ha is our dream trip. As much as we love wine, we love Pacifico Beer, too."

Big Idea — Gemini 3200 Eric Smith San Francisco / Buffalo Creek, CO

Eric, 66, is a retired Airline Pilot. His crew will be John Kelly, a retired Airline Pilot, and Naval Aviator.

"I've been sailing for 45 years, and *Big Idea*, which I've owned for 20 years, is my third boat," says Eric. "My previous boats were a Cal 24 and a Catalina 27. After I bought the Catalina, a shroud chain plate pulled out of the deck on the way to my marina. That was exciting, as I was just barely able to keep the mast up while motoring to the boat's new home.

"My longest trip to date was taking the Catalina down the coast to Monterey. The wind picked up pretty good, so I went forward to reef the main. Just then the inexperienced helmsman broached. It was not fun.

"My dream destination is Tahiti, but I'll be staying in the Baja region after the Ha-Ha." 'It's all part of the experience', is Eric's favorite quote, while his favorite dessert is Key Lime Pie.

Black Swan — Swan 46 Nadav Rozenberg / Ethan Barr / Ofir Aricha San Diego

Black Swan is a three-person partnership that "just closed on the boat to be a part of the Ha-Ha." The three owners are Nadav Rozenberg, 41, who is self-employed; Ethan Barr, 40, self-employed; and Ofir Aricha, 42, who, as you might expect, is also self-employed.

One of the owners, the Poobah believes it's Nadav, has been sailing for "about 20 years." This is the fourth boat he's owned part or all of. The Frers design that was launched in 1984 is so new to the partnership that as of late August, they hadn't even sailed her from San Francisco to her

home port of San Diego yet. She's the trio's 'dream boat'. Small wonder, as the 46 is one of the most popular Swans ever built, with 109 sold between 1983 and 1997.

Nadav's longest sail to date has been 26 hours from Israel to Cyprus. While the trio plans to keep the boat in La Paz for a few months after the Ha-Ha, their dream destination would be Croatia. If you've ever sailed Croatian waters, you'll know why.

The trio is fond of bread pudding, which is nothing like North American custard and mousse style puddings — but you knew that — and cheesecake.

Unsure of how to pronounce the name Ofir, the Poobah looked it up. According to Google, it sounds like 'O-Feel', not O-fur



Bseachamp - Susan & Dean

Bseachamp — Island Packet 35 (W) Dean Porter and Susan Hill (sister) Portland, OR / Toronto, Ontario

Dean, 61, is retired from Public Works, his specialty being "Grave Digger". Sister Susan, she's the one who lives in Toronto, flies with Air Canada. The two are the only ones in this year's Ha-Ha who grew up in North Battleford, Saskatchewan, Canada, which is just north of Battleford. Crew will be Drew Bielawski.

"I have been sailing for five years in the Portland area," advises Dean, "and have owned four powerboats and two sailboats. I've owned *Bseachamp* since February of this year. The previous owner had her shipped out from New Jersey four years ago. What's different about her? She has a drop keel.

"Susan was a total newbie to sailing until the trip from Portland to San Diego. Her sailing experience consisted of sitting on a seat at the back of a friend's boat sunning herself with a drink in her hand. She is looking forward to learning and helping as much as she can.

"My longest passage to date," continues Dean, "is from Astoria, Oregon to Port Angeles, Washington. Following the Ha-Ha, I plan on sailing up to La Paz and staying in that area for a few months. After that, I plan to continue south to Costa Rica."

A Poobah's word to the wise: once the first Norther or two roll through the La Paz area, usually in early December, the air temperature remains mostly fine, but the water quickly becomes too cold to swim in comfort until almost May.

What is Bseachamp? It's actually a person. Thomas Bseachamp is the one-legged Canadian hurdler who shocked the world by winning his event in the 1936 Olympics in Berlin. His feat was overshadowed by African-American Jesse Owens winning four gold medals.

Dean, who didn't specify any preferences for fruit, desserts, sailing heroes, or quotes, has a dream 'destination' of sailing around the world. "Many people think I'm crazy," he says, "and they might be right. But I think they should join me."




"After a couple of years of racing my Martin 242 *Steel Breeze*, we realized that the boat was not large enough for the two

Bill, 76, is the semi-retired owner of Hammer & Nails hardware store in Pacific Beach, which has managed to carry on in the face of the onslaught of Home Depot and Lowes. Patty, who retired 10 years ago, has been with Bill for each of the four Ha-Ha's they have done. Their crew will be their daughter Kelly Meanley, who is an IT Project Manager.

"After my first retirement at 26 from Jet Propulsion Lab and the Space Program, I lived in a VW van all over Europe for a year. Then I migrated to Tahoe City and became a ski bum. Working as a dishwasher, for months. I unsuccessfully tried to attract a cute cocktail waitress. Finally, Patty succumbed and we've been married for the last 45 years. But we did build a cabin near Sunnyside while living there in the mid-'70s. We still own it and spend part of each summer living in it.

"In the 38 years we've owned *Dolfin* we've sailed her as far south as New Zealand and

The Poobah has a vivid image of *Dolfin* from a Pirates for Pupils Spinnaker Run for Charity from Punta Mita to Paradise Marina on Banderas Bay a few years back. It's a 12-mile pursuit race, and the bigger and longer *Profligate* overtook boat after boat. As the Poobah recalls, there was just one left, the beautifully sailed *Dolfin*. We never could catch her.

Dream — Sceptre 41 R.B. Ward and Susan McArthur Richmond YC / Point Richmond

Robert, 76, is a retired Carpenter while Susan is a retired College Professor. They will have three crew, Caitlin Robinson, Briana Biller and James Michael Robinson, 73.

"I started sailing at around eight years of age," reports RB. "I've owned four boats; the Santana 22 *Carlos*, the Dogpatch 26 *Moonshine*, an Ericson 29, and now *Dream*, our Sceptre 41 that we've owned for six years."

RB has done the Pacific Cup six times, and what really impresses the Poobah is that he did it twice on the no-frills ultralight 26-ft hotrod *Moonshine*. RB has also done the passage from Mexico to the Marquesas, which is nearly 3,000 miles.

The couple's dream destination is the South Pacific, but this first season he and Susan will cruise the Sea of Cortez. Their dream boat? "We got it!" Can anybody correctly pronounce designer Hien Driehuyzen's name?

The couple's hero is the dynamic 45-year-old Isabelle Joscke, the daughter of a German father and French mother who grew up in Geneva and Paris but nonetheless became an ocean racing phenom. Racing competitively offshore in small boats since 2004, she most recently competed in the 2020–2021 Vendée Globe with the badass IMOCA 60 MACSF. Alas, she had to retire when approaching Cape Horn due to a failure of the keel ram. Check her out on Google and she'll be a sailing hero of yours, too. No one-trick pony, Isabelle has a degree in classic literature.

RB advises that 'the flogging will continue until morale improves' — or perhaps until he's served enough spumoni ice cream.

Drifter — Nauticat 38 (W) Chris and Kelly McCall Portland, OR / Lake Oswego, OR

Kelly, 33, does Home Design for a small company in Portland, while Chris, 42, owns a Crawl Space company. Their crew will be Henry Hall, 39.

"Drifter is our first boat, and we've spent the last three years refitting the 1972 ketch in our driveway. We just splashed her two months ago. We documented the process on our YouTube Channel www.YouTube. com/SailingAdrift.

"We have limited sailing experience, but by the time we get to San Diego we expect we'll be pretty salty."

For folks coming down to the Ha-Ha start in San Diego from the Pacific Northwest — some the 1,329 nautical miles from Seattle, and some the 1,138 nautical miles from Portland — the legs to San Diego will almost certainly be more challenging than any on the Ha-Ha.

Kelly doesn't really understand her husband being such a fan of *The Devil Wears Prada*, but he reportedly watches it "all the time". Kelly says he's a big fan of how it's written.

Kelly prefers the movie, French Kiss. Not the French Rom-Com where a handsome but wayward boyfriend loses his cute girlfriend to an older woman who is happy to cook and clean. French as can be, he gets the girl back but has to share her with the woman. And they all live happily ever after. No, Kelly likes the Meg Ryan version about a woman who flies to France to confront her straying fiancé but gets into trouble when the charming crook seated next to her uses her for smuggling.

Chris is left-handed, and like the right-handed Kelly likes to remember the motivational quote: 'There is always a reason not to do something'.

Having personally customized their boat for several years, *Drifter* is their dream boat. They would love to keep cruising Mexico after the Ha-Ha, but it's uncertain because of Kelly's work commitments.

Encore — Andrews 56 Zachary Singer and Sail MS Richmond / Santa Rosa ('05, '06, '07, '09)

Zachary, 35, is a licensed tugboat captain who was diagnosed with MS and subsequently founded the organization Sail MS.

"After being diagnosed with MS I was unable to safely perform my duties as a vessel operator due to loss of vision. While partially blind, I was taught to sail by Eugenie Russell, my sea mama, who will be the captain of *Encore* for the Ha-Ha. Russell was the skipper of the boat that was sunk by a whale in the '09 Ha-Ha.

Thanks to her leadership, and a great crew, all were plucked from their life raft by a Coast Guard helicopter almost 200 miles from San Diego.

"Learning to sail brought me back from a literally and figuratively very dark place in my life," reports Zachery. "When my vision returned, I decided to found Sail MS and share my experience with others in the Bay Area living with multiple sclerosis. Fifty percent of our Ha-Ha crew will be people who are fighting the same battle that I am.

"Prior to purchasing *Encore*, I nearly bought a 62-ft cement boat that only would have been capable of eight knots if driven off a cliff. After doing nine knots upwind while sailing *Encore* offshore in questionable weather, and the boat not batting an eyelash, she has become my dream boat. In the nine months I have owned *Encore*, she has undergone an extensive refit performed by our very own Multiple Sclerosis Warriors

"In addition to myself and Eugenie, our Ha-Ha crew will include Karina Velasco, my spouse; Francisco Ramos, 43, a Waste Water Engineer and co-founder of Sail MS; and Jerome Pinsonnault, 50, a Team Leader for Bombardier Jets.

"Following the Ha-Ha, we will be continuing on to La Cruz de Huanacaxtle for our winter time program with the support of the Nayarit Riviera Marina and the Vallarta YC, where we are all members.

"My dream destination is getting everyone to the next port of call safely. My sailing hero is Alex Thompson, the Hugo Boss Guy and Vendee Globe veteran. He is just a plain badass.

My favorite quote is, "We cannot control the wind, but we can trim our sails."

"The *Encore* Ha-Ha journey will be the culmination of many difficult life-changing events and battles for the entire crew. Living with multiple sclerosis is a very difficult thing, yet when we come together as crew on a sailboat, we turn our disease from a curse into a blessing."

Escapade — Sabre 40-2 Nick Sands and Renee Linde Sausalito (2017)

Nick, 64, is a retired Electrical Engineer. Spouse Renee is a retired Sales Executive. They will have two crew: Charlie Wood, 55, a Commercial Mariner, and Mauro Calvi, 64, a retired Executive who skippered *Bellavia*, a boat he designed and built, in the 2017 Ha-Ha.

"This is our first boat," reports Nick, "which we've owned since 2005. We sailed her down from Bellingham in the summer of 2006, and we have been racing and coastal cruising ever since, but never south of Monterey. I crewed on a Baja Bash

in 2019, so I know what the uphill trip is like. I'm looking forward to going downhill in the Ha-Ha.

"After the Ha-Ha we plan on sailing to Banderas Bay, and if possible, a bit further south." Poobah Tip: Banderas Bay has the most consistent sailing in Mexico, and it's all flat-water sailing. The wind is light in the winter and more breezy in the spring. Generally speaking, it comes up about 1 pm and dies about 5 pm. It's like it was made for sailing.

Nick and Renee's dream destinations are a boat in Croatia: Vis and Hyar.

Their dream boat? A Sabre 40-2 — and they just happen to own one.

Joe and Jen have been sailing for about

eight years. "We took lessons through Marina Sailing in Marina del Rey to see if we would like sailing, and it turned out that we did. So, we bought a Cal 29 and joined Buccaneer YC. There we started sailing on different types of boats, learning from experienced sailors, racing, and cruising to Catalina Island. We have cruised and anchored or moored all around Catalina Island, San Miguel Island, Santa Cruz Island, and San Diego.

But it's actually Aunt Sheila who has more experience. "I started sailing on the inland lakes of Michigan at age 17, where I participated in Sunday races. I moved to Miami at 25 and lived aboard a 1940 wood Marconi-rigged Atkin-designed Eric. I sailed her extensively in the Bahamas for seven years. Upon moving back to Michigan, I became the First Mate on a Columbia 36 for three years, then sailed a Tartan 26 on Lake Huron for five years. I currently own a Moody Primrose 40 with Joe, and we spend winters sailing the Florida coast and the Keys."

Gretchen and Tim have both logged a few 900+ mile passages in the Atlantic, Pacific, Caribbean, and Irish Seas — sometimes together, sometimes not.

Tim moved to San Diego and Gretchen followed him west. But it's been Gretchen's dream to head offshore, a dream since her first sailing trip when she was 23. Meeting Tim, "a great sailor", solidified those dreams.

"Together we've been working toward this getaway moment since we bought *Felicità* in 2018. We like to say we've spent the last year 'pimping our Catalina'.

"We will be two couples onboard who were brought together through sailing, as our

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

"I love swimming, mountain biking, sp-

litboarding, hiking, and high-performance track driving," says George. Not surprisingly, he adds that he's "addicted to caffeine and sugar."

"Ellen loves cooking, skiing, running, riding our Cannondale tandem mountain bike, hardcore on the floor for her Peloton, and is the stoker on our Fatty 29er. She loves salmon and salads.




FortitudeX - Stefanie & Torsten

"I've been sailing for about 15 years, during which time I've owned two prior boats. I've had my Island Packet for four years. The design debuted way back in 1988, and while no longer in production, 178 of them were built.

"My longest passage to date was crewing aboard the mothership *Profligate* in the 2014 Ha-Ha. After this year's Ha-Ha, I plan to continue up into the Sea of Cortez and explore that area for another year. Then I'll head southeast to the Canal, east to the Caribbean, and eventually north to the Bahamas. After that, who knows? Maybe I'll continue on to the Med, or maybe I'll make a left turn, pull into St. Augustine, and start playing shuffleboard.

John, 61 is an Engineer, while co-captain Tom Luneau, 64, is a Recovering Attorney who passes time contemplating metaphors for seniors. They thought it would be a 'cake in the park' to think up some simple phrases. John is the more serious of the two and says such contemplations are a waste of time, "and besides we could burn that bridge when we get to it".

Crew member, Myles Luneau, 34, is Tom's son and owns a company that converts Mercedes Sprinters into weekend campers. Tom thought the idea of senior metaphors was sophomoric, "You've opened a can of worms now you can lay in it." Myles' fondest memory of the 2017 season was when a crew member, assisted by Kirkland Scotch, spotted a UFO while on anchor in the Sea of Cortez.

The fourth crew member will be Kevin Milmoe, 61, a retired Counselor of Wayward Individuals. He had the same advice for all his clients: "Don't roll the dice if you can't pay the price." Kevin is the best angler on the boat and claims "If you give a man a fish, you feed him for a day. If you teach a man to fish, he will sit in a boat and drink beer all weekend." Kevin believes everyone is capable of becoming a good fisherman. "After all," he says, "it's not rocket surgery."

After the Ha-Ha, the *Good Times* will continue north into the Sea of Cortez, hopefully, further up than La Paz. "But we'll throw that one on the wall and see if the cows come home," says Tom.

Habibi — Gulfstar 37 (W) Hank and Su Kraus Oceanside / Valley Center

Hank, 67, is a retired Business Owner, as is Su. They will doublehanding the Ha-Ha. Hank and Su have been sailing for eight

years. They bought *Habibi* their first boat, a Gulfstar 37, three years ago, and have been actively preparing for the Ha-Ha ever since. Launched in 1979, *Habibi* is one of the many Gulfstar yachts that have proven themselves over time. Assistant Poobah Patsy Verhoeven's Gulfstar 50 *Talion* is 45 years old and still going strong.

Before purchasing *Habibi*, Hank and Su chartered sailboats around Southern California and the South Coast of England. They hope to spend several months in the Sea of Cortez after the Ha-Ha.

The name of their boat *Habibi* is Arabic for 'My Love'.



Halcyon - Richard

Halcyon — Hans Christian 38 Lillyin Love and Richard Weber Los Angeles / Lancaster

Owner/Skipper Lillyin Love, who has one of the all-time great names, is retired from the Coast Guard. Her crew will be fiancée Richard Weber, 58, a boatwright. The Ships Cat is Kikki-weekster


"Between the two of us we have almost



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a century of boating experience," Richard reports. "We have cruised the entire Pacific Coast from as far north as Skagway to as far south as Acapulco. I've owned dozens of boats, but *Halcyon* is our pride and joy.

"Lilly served in the Coast Guard based out of Kodiak and was a Search & Rescue Swimmer. Both of us are scuba divers who love adventure. Our dream destination is anywhere we've never been — as long as there are new adventures and fascinating people."

Their nautical heroes are "all the classics." Ferdinand Magellan, the Portuguese explorer who was the first to sail from Europe to Asia. Many people incorrectly believe that Magellan was the first to sail around the world, but he was killed in the Philippines, and only several of his crew and one of his ships made it all the way around. Another of Love and Weber's heroes is Ernest Shackleton. The Irishman made three voyages of expedition to Antarctica but is most famous for having to abandon his ship in pack ice and make a 700-mile passage in very stormy waters with lifeboats. Weber was also inspired by the solo circumnavigation of teenager Robin Lee Graham on his 24-ft boat Dove.

Lilly and Richard's favorite quote — and boat name — comes from 1600s poet William Shenstone: "There came the Halcyon, whom the sea obeys when she her nest upon the water lays".

Either Lilly or Richard is left-handed, but they're not telling which.

Imagine — Davidson 44 Wyatt and Charlene Jones San Francisco / Sacramento

Wyatt, 60, is a Contractor, while Charlene is retired from an unspecified career. "I've been sailing all my life," says Wyatt, "and have competed in two Pacific Cup races to Hawaii. The last one was in 2018 when we took 5th in our division.

"Charlene and I have been wanting to do a Ha-Ha for years. Cabo San Lucas is our go-to vacation spot, so we're looking forward to sailing there instead of flying there."

The fractional-rigged Laurie Davidson-designed 44 was an unusual IOR boat when launched in 1981, with high free-board and a wide transom. As such, she caused a big IOR rating rule ruckus at her first St. Francis YC Big Boat Series. All these years later the Davidson design makes a great cruising boat, as proven by the Davidson 44 Neptune's Highway, which recently completed an eight-year circumnavigation.

The Poobah has a vivid sunrise memory of a Davidson 44 from 41 years ago. We were racing our Freya 39 upwind and hugging the shore between Frailes and Muertos during the '81 Long Beach to La Paz Race when a Davidson 44 appeared on the horizon behind us. They had no trouble passing us in the light air.



Island Nomad - David, Diane, Wayne & Francis

Island Nomad — Pacific Seacraft 40 (W) Francis Riegler Channel Islands / Malibu (2018, 2021)

Francis, 63, is a retired Physician. *Island Nomad's* captain will be Diane Berol, a Professional Captain who has done two Ha-Ha's. Francis crewed for Captain Diane in the 2021 Ha-Ha on her Pacific Seacraft 40 *Celtic Song.* Diane is returning the favor this year as crew and mentor.

The crew will be Eric Walker, 69, David Huffman, 70, retired from Marine Electronics, and Wayne Polek, 68, a retired Physician who did his Residency with Francis many moons ago. The Ha-Ha will be a reunion for them.

Francis reports that he's been sailing on and off for decades and that *Island Nomad*, which he has owned since 2015, will be the only boat he'll ever own. "If I don't do everything I have ever dreamed of doing on a sailboat with this boat, it won't be the boat's fault!" he says.

Francis has previously crewed across the Atlantic and captained another boat in the Pacific Cup to Hawaii. "After the Ha-Ha we will cruise the Sea of Cortez and then return to California in the spring and prepare for Hawaii and the South Pacific." His dream destination is Bora Bora and he owns his dream boat, so all his dreams may come true.

"My sailing hero is Dennis Johnson, the first and only other owner of *Island Nomad*. He did a solo 10-year circumnavigation."

"Ha-Ha 2021 was a wonderful experience," says Francis, "and I thank the Poobah and his crew for all they do." It was

the Ha-Ha team's great pleasure.



Island Summers - Kevin & Beverly

Island Summers — Jeanneau SO 440 Kevin and Beverly Summers Stanwood, WA ('13, '14, '16 -'19)

Kevin, 64, is a retired Software Engineer, while Beverly is a retired Paralegal. The couple's crew will be Serhad Atakturk, 69, who delivered a Pac Cup boat back to the mainland this summer, and Sue Drake, a vet of countless Ha-Ha's, excellent spinnaker trimmer, and sister of the Assistant Poobah.

"The captain and first mate were raised around ski boats," the Summers report, "but didn't have sailing experience other than kiteboards and Hobie Cats. In 2014 we purchased a 28-ft powerboat to explore the San Juan Islands. After owning her for five years we decided we loved being out on the water but decided to switch to sailing. We took a few sailing classes and that's all it took for us to become hooked.

"In 2019 we went completely insane and purchased a spanking new Jeanneau Sun Odyssey 440 — and then had to learn to sail her! After three years of sailing in the San Juan Islands, we felt ready to join the Coho Ho-Ho rally from Seattle to San Diego. We were lucky enough to talk two sailor friends, who had circumnavigated, into joining us.

"We like the quote, 'You can't control the wind, but you can adjust the sails', because it applies to everyday life as much as it does sailing. Our goal is to explore destinations that you can't get to any other way than by boat."

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Jamma — Hallberg Rassy 40C (W) Janet and Martin McKeown Vancouver. B.C.

Janet is a retired Family Physician, Martin, 58, is a Neurologist.

"I have sailed dinghies since age 10, and began cruising keel boats in 2012," reports Janet. "Jamma, which we've owned for one year, is the second boat that Martin and I have owned. We've never done a Ha-Ha before, but we've heard great things about it.

"My longest offshore passage is eight days, sailing from Vancouver to San Francisco. After the Ha-Ha we plan to continue southeast to Panama and cross to England by July of 2023."

Jamma will have to be jamming to do that. After the first Ha-Ha, Capt Jim Drake took the Poobah's Ocean 71 Big O from Cabo to Europe, so it can be done. The biggest problem is getting through the Panama Canal in early December because once the Christmas Trades start to howl, it can be very difficult to make it the 1,000 miles across the Caribbean Sea.

"My sailing heroes are Tracy Edwards and her all-female crew, who in 1989 did the Whitbread Round the World Yacht Race," says Janet. Tracy mortgaged her home to buy *Maiden* the 30-year-old 58-footer. She and her 11-women crew won two of the six legs in class and finished second in class. As a result, Tracy became the first woman to receive — and this was a little awkward, the Yachtsman of the Year Trophy. She was also appointed MBE.

"Scandinavia and New Zealand are my dream destinations," says Janet, "so *Jamma* has a few miles to sail."

Jan — Hallberg Rassy 48 MKII (W) Giorgio and Jan Aru Jackson, Mississippi

Giorgio, 71, is a retired Cardiac Surgeon, Jan is a retired Registered Nurse. The couple will doublehand their 2018 German Freers ketch.

"I have been sailing since 1973 and have owned three boats," reports Giorgio. "We commissioned Jan at the factory in Sweden in 2018. Since then, we've covered a few miles, having sailed her across the Med, the Atlantic, the Caribbean, through the Panama Canal, to the Galapagos, French Polynesia, Alaska, and down the West Coast of the U.S."

Whew!

The couple hopes to complete a circumnavigation by 2024. Their favorite quote could be 'acta, non verba,' deeds not words.



Jane 'O - Ron

**Jane 'O — Privilege 39 Cat Ron Kuris, KK (13) and Connor (10) San Francisco (2009)

Ron, 57, is a Production Engineer, which is "a specialized software engineer who makes very large systems run more reliably, faster, and at scale." His crew for this, his second Ha-Ha will be Dave Chenette, 70, an Engineer of Some Sort who also did the '09 Ha-Ha; and Ed Kuczynski, 66, a Manager.

Rounding out the crew will be Ron's grandkids, KK and Connor who are both Students of Life.

"Brought up in the Florida Keys, I've been sailing since I was a little kid," says Ron. "I've owned more boats than I can count. I've owned *Jane'O* for four years. My catamaran was launched way back in 1991, but we recently successfully sailed her to Hawaii and back, so she's an oldie but a capable goodie.

"My dream destination is always fleeting. I loved the South Pacific and I'd like to visit Isla Guadalupe someday. But anywhere on the water is fine with me. After the Ha-Ha we'll head down to Puerto Vallarta.

"I'm pretty happy with my current boat, but a new Privilege catamaran would be my dream boat. My sailing hero is Capt Ron. In fact, I dock my cat just like he did in the movie. My favorite quote comes from Capt Ron: "If it's gonna happen, it'll happen out there."

"My favorite dessert is a Klondike Choco Taco, "a fudge-swirled vanilla ice cream in a sugar cone taco with a peanut-sprinkled chocolatey that fortunately was only temporarily discontinued." Sorry Ron, but Klondike says it's not coming back despite consumer protests.

What's different about Ron's boat? "She's decked out with a Raspberry Pi, which is "a low cost, credit-card sized computer that plugs into a computer monitor or TV and

uses a standard keyboard and mouse. It is a capable little device that enables people of all ages to explore computing, and to learn how to program in languages like Scratch and Python." But you knew that.

Jane'O is also equipped with "excellent open-source monitoring tools," as Ron contributed to OpenCPN, which is free navigation software that runs on Jane'O as it does on many other cruising boats.

**Jedi — Beneteau First 435 (W) Bryan, Alicia, Henley (6) and Eloise (4) Souza San Francisco / Hilmar

Bryan, 31, is a Lab Technician, while Alicia, 30, is a Freelance Writer. Their offspring, Henley is a Student of Life as is his sister. Eloise.

The young family has been sailing for 18 months, and this is their first boat. "We're the third owners since she was launched in 1984, during which time she's always been named *Jedi*. Our passage down to the San Diego start will be our longest before the start of the Ha-Ha. After the Ha-Ha we'll continue to cruise in the Sea of Cortez and beyond.

"Alicia is left-handed for writing, but golfs and bats right-handed."

The Poobah was born in Berkeley and lived in California for his first 70 years, but never heard of Hilmar. So, what's the deal? Hilmar is a township in Merced County 4.25 miles west southwest of Delhi, California, and 8,300 miles west of Delhi, India. Hilmar began as a colony of Swedish immigrants as early as 1906. For the record, it's 376 miles between Samoa, California and Hilmar.

For those who like the Poobah have never seen a *Star Wars* movie, the Jedi are a "noble order of protectors unified by their ability to tap into the power of the Force, and who are the guardians of peace and justice."

Josie — Dehler 39 Jo Sandry and David Sandry (brother) Sausalito / Santa Cruz (2021)

Siblings Jo and David are co-owners and co-captains of *Josie*. Jo, the captain this year, is a Therapist. David, 51, an Auditor. Helen Schweitzer, a Project Manager will also be aboard.

Jo and David have been sailing since they were kids on the South Coast of Devon in the UK. They tease their parents that they often risked their lives crossing the English Channel, and have many sea stories from those times.

Since living in the Bay area for 20+ years, they've both primarily sailed smaller boats — Jo owned a Pacific Seacraft 25, *Abundance*, for many years. And David owns





and frequently raced the classic wood Bear Boat *Puff*, a true labor of love.

Jo has made blue water deliveries across the Atlantic and in the Pacific Northwest. David taught sailing at Cass' Marina in Sausalito, "initially did to pick up women". But before long he was to meet his partner and eventual baby mama. These days he gets his adrenaline pumping by practicing Public Accounting.

David and Jo moved up to their Dehler 39 and did the Ha-Ha for the first time last year. They Bashed back up to the Bay right after. "It was tough with two people," they remember, "but we're doing it again so it couldn't have been that bad. Or maybe we have amnesia."

First Mate, Helen Schweitzer has sailed with the Sandry siblings for decades and considers them her bestest friends. Helen got her 50-ton Coast Guard captain's license in 2001 and has taught sailing and navigation in the Bay, Greece and Croatia. She learned the hard way to NEVER teach couples on the same boat. Helen survived a hurricane on her first long delivery, but her front tooth did not.

Jo and David report they are very excited to do the Ha-Ha again this year and are looking forward to gathering more sea stories with Helen. And they promise to be better about providing their position on time each morning.

Just Passing Wind — Sundeer 60 Jeff Wahl Yankton, South Dakota (2005, 2019)

Jeff, 66, is retired from the Hotel Business and is a vet of two Ha-Ha's. He'll have two crew who were not identified as of press time.

"I started sailing in 1990, and have now sailed 21,000 miles offshore," reports Jeff. "I did my first Ha-Ha with a Wellington 47, a spacious and comfortable ketch that was on the slow side. So, I purchased the Dashew-designed Sundeer 60 Just Passing Wind in December of 2015, as she's the ultimate sailing boat designed to trot around the globe with just two people.

"Shortly after buying the boat, I sailed from Los Angeles to El Salvador to the Galapagos to the Marquesas to Tahiti. The plan for after this year's Ha-Ha is to return to the Galapagos by Christmas — which admittedly is a pretty fast pace. I'm looking for crew. After the Galapagos, I'll continue across the Pacific to Australia.

"My dream 'destination' is to continue my circumnavigation on my dream boat, the Sundeer, although my plans are written in sand at low tide. My sailing heroes are Lyn and the late Larry Pardey.

"I eat what's put in front of me, and I'll like it."



K2 - Bryan & Nancy

K2— Corsair F36 Trimaran Bryan Martin and Nancy Virostko Santa Cruz (2015, 2018, 2021)

Bryan, 67, is a Designer and Builder. Partner Nancy is a Clinical Social Worker. Both are still working. Their crew will be Jacqueline Annigoni, a retired Business Owner. Bryan has done three Ha-Ha's; Nancy two; and Jacqueline one.

Bryan has been sailing for 50 years, beginning as a child on his father's boat. His longest passage has been from the South Pacific to Hawaii. He has owned at least six boats, all monohulls until he bought an F31 trimaran in 2006. He is now a committed trimaran sailor. Nancy, who sometimes works remotely from Mexico, doesn't have as much sailing experience as Bryan, but she makes up for it with enthusiasm.

Bryan and Nancy bought *K2* a year ago. *K1* was Bryan's F31.

"After a frenzy of work on K2 last summer, we sailed the boat for the first time when we left Santa Cruz for San Diego and the Ha-Ha start," the couple reported. "After some mishaps, such as losing our steering off Ensenada, and sailing the rest of the way to Cabo and then La Paz with compromised steering, we enjoyed a wonderful six months in the Sea of Cortez. That place never gets old.

"We met up with four other Ha-Ha boats and made it to Bahia de Los Angeles, at which time we parted ways. We continued north to Puerto Penasco, where we pulled K2 out of the water and trailered her home to Santa Cruz. We definitely experienced more drama trailering K2 home than sailing her in the Ha-Ha.

"We were all prepared with our wide load permit, only to have a broken axle about 45 minutes away from the boatyard. We limped back to the boatyard where Bryan rebuilt the trailer. After that, we had a successful journey back to Santa Cruz. Our plan after this year's Ha-Ha is to go to mainland Mexico and make our future decisions as we go.

"A Rapido 60 trimaran would be our dream boat. We have many sailing heroes, but we would like to give a shout-out to our good friend and accomplished sailor Tom Carr, who did both the 2015 and 2018 Ha-Ha's on his 17-ft boat *Bluebird*, the smallest to ever do the Ha-Ha.

"Mango ice cream is my favorite dessert," says Bryan.



Kokopelli - Kate, Addie & Ben

*Kokopelli — Hylas 46 Ben, Kate, and Addie (10) Davidson Vashon Island, Washington

Ben, 48, is a Fire Fighter, Kate is a Teacher, and young Addie is a Student of Life.

"Ben became hooked on sailing after his parents chartered a sailboat for his brother's birthday," reports Kate. "He immediately went out and purchased a boat to live aboard while going to college. Then he went sailing every day, rain or shine, off Bellingham to teach himself how to sail. I know of at least seven boats he has owned, but I'm sure there have been more.

"Ben hasn't always had boats as large and luxurious as the Hylas, in 2007 he sailed his diminutive Vancouver 27 from Washington to Zihuatanejo — and "had a blast". He met Kate in 2007, and they have been sailing together ever since, spending a few weeks most summers in the San Juan Islands. They plan to cross to the South Pacific in April 2023.

"Our daughter Addie is excited to get this cruising party started because she has been promised a horse when we return from our year at sea," says Kate.

Dennis Davidson, Ben's dad, is the source of the couple's favorite quote: "Sometimes the only way to do it, is to just do it." Nike made the last three words of it their own.





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When it comes to desserts, Ben likes beer, while Kate prefers cake, donuts, pastries and pie. Addie's choice is ice cream in a giant waffle cone.

Kokopelli — Santa Cruz 40 Kevin Rooney and Rachel Spencer Santa Cruz / Davenport (2004)

Kevin, 70, is a retired Set Designer, while spouse Rachel is a retired Mortgage Banker. They will have four crew, including Valerie and Gordon (58) Duncan. It's going to be a crowded boat.

"I have owned *Kokopelli* for 20-plus years," reports Kevin. "She's my second boat after a Catalina 27. Both were homeported at South Beach Marina during the '90s. We participated in the Ocean Yacht Racing Association series for three years as well as doing the Vallejo races, the Mid-Winters, South Bay Fridays, Bayview YC's Plastic Classics, and Monday Night Madness.

"Upon retirement, I set the boat up for cruising and did the 2004 Ha-Ha. We then began a cruise that brought us down the Mexican coast to Guatemala, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, through the Canal, and over to Cartagena. Then headed north to Ft. Lauderdale and up the East Coast. We did the 'Round Long Island Race' and wintered over in Montauk, New York. The next season we sailed up the Hudson River to the Erie Canal, to the Great Lakes, to participate in the Port Huron/Mackinaw Race. We finished up in Chicago and shipped Kokopelli back to Santa Cruz. We had wanted to do the Great American Loop, but Kokopelli's 8.5-ft draft was too deep for the Illinois River. We then did the 2015 TransPac, returning via Seattle, where we spent two years exploring the Salish Sea.

"I have our dream boat. 'Keep It Simple Stupid' is our motto. We plan to stay in the Sea of Cortez for the next two years before making a decision on whether to continue on to Florida.

"Capt Ron has my favorite quote: "If it's gonna happen, it's gonna happen out there" and I guess Ted Turner 'the mouth of the south' is one of my heroes."

What Turner said was, "I bet you're all wondering what it feels like to be a billionaire. It's disappointing really. Great wealth isn't nearly as good as average sex."

Laissez Les Bon Temps Rouler — Santa Cruz 52 David Bennett and Amy Herrick Alameda

David, 53, is retired from the Wine Business, while Fiancé Amy is still active in the Medical Field. Their crew will be Brad King, 66, retired; and at least one other person not identified as yet.

"I've been sailing since I was two," reports David. "My parents have owned all kinds of boats, and raced and cruised many of them. We have owned our SC 52 since Christmas of 2021. It was our Christmas present to each other."

When asked to describe the Santa Cruz 52, which was the much more luxurious descendent of the ultra-simple Santa Cruz 50, designer Bill Lee said, "We crossed a Swan with a rocket ship." Twenty-nine 52s were built.

"I have sailed in the Caribbean, to Hawaii and back, and done numerous offshore deliveries," says David. "We live on our dream boat, and our dream destination is the South Pacific.

"My favorite sailing personality was Tom Blackaller," the flamboyant and largerthan-life St. Francis YC and America's Cup legend who died decades too young at just 49.

We don't suppose anybody has to ask what David and Amy's favorite quote is, but it's French, and it's not 'Voulez-vous couchez avec moi ce soir.'

Leglus — Van de Stadt 52 Solomon Ka'ne Oakland / San Diego and Hawaii

Solomon, 53, is a General Contractor. He will have four crew including Noah Persin, 52, David Henry, 65 and Paula Anita Rosemarie Frank.

Solomon reports that he's been sailing for 15 years, during which time he's owned four boats. He's owned *Leglus*, a Van de Stadt 52 racer from 1984, for just eight months. What's unusual about her is that she has a deep keel, which is important because she's only 12'6" wide. A needle.

To date, Solomon's longest ocean passage has been from California to Hawaii. After the Ha-Ha he'll return to California and continue preparations for the 2023 TransPac. The South Pacific is Solomon's

favorite destination, while vanilla ice cream is his favorite dessert.

While Solomon is right-handed, he plays pool left-handed. So be wary if he tries to hustle you into playing pool by offering to shoot with his 'wrong hand'.

What does Leglus mean? Not even Google knows. But the yacht has an interesting history. She was built for the Osaka-Melbourne double-handed race in 1986 as Bengal II. She has since participated in the 1987, 1991 and 1995 Osaka-Melbourne races, as well as the 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2009 TransPacs and the 2002 Pacific Cup. She has crossed the Pacific Ocean, or at least half of it, more than 15 times, probably more than any other Japanese yacht in history.

Thanks to owner Hiroshi Tomikura of Tokyo, *Leglus* became the primary yacht of the Silicon Valley Sailing Club, which was formed to remove barriers for anyone interested in yacht racing by providing a friendly learning environment for sailors of all levels. But now she belongs to Solomon.



Malolo - Kelly & Tim

Malolo — Lagoon 42 Tim Dick and Kelly Hu San Francisco / Palo Alto (2018)

Tim, 60, is an Entrepreneur, while First Mate Kelly is an actress. *Malolo's* other crew will be Evaleen Jones, 62, a Physician; Seamus Murphy, 60, a Navy Master Chef; and Tina Kalekini, a retired Administrator. All met in Hawaii and have strong Hawaiian ties.

"I've been sailing since I was six," reports Tim, "and have owned six boats. I bought *Malolo*, my dream boat, in 2016. I did the Ha-Ha with her in 2018 and loved the boat and the event. After this Ha-Ha we'll either head to La Paz or Puerto Vallarta. My longest passage to date is 600 miles.

"My dream destinations are Hawaii, where I lived and raced for many years, followed by Tahiti."



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Dick's hero is Sterling Hayden, a true swashbuckling American actor, author, sailor and decorated Marine Corps officer who operated behind enemy lines in World War II. A leading man for most of his career, Hayden is best known for his brilliant portrayal of General Jack D. Ripper in Stanley Kubrick's Dr. Strangelove or: How I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bomb. Claiming to act only to pay for boats and voyages, Hayden most famously defied a judge's orders following a divorce in 1958 and sailed to Tahiti with his four children, and Spike Africa as crew, aboard his big schooner *Wanderer*.

When it comes to desserts, Tim, who says he's "up for anything", would like two servings of tiramisu, "please", because YOLO, 'you only live once."

In Hawaiian, malolo means to rest from work for a time.



Mikmaks - Justin & Claire

Mikmaks — Stevens 47 Justin and Claire Waite Seward, Alaska

Justin, 50, is retired from an Unspecified Occupation, while Claire is a Doctor. Their son Jeremy 17 will be joining them. Crewing for the Waites will be Arthur Jesse Osborn, 45, a Consultant, and his spouse Samantha, who own a 50-ft yawl in Ireland that the two plan to sail across the Atlantic in the spring.

"We all met at the local yacht club in Seward and have sailed together for a number of years now," reports Justin. "Among our trips have been down the Inside Passage, from Port Townsend to Los Angeles, then last year's TransPac to Honolulu. Our longest passage was the 23-day trip back to California from Hawaii. It was a great trip.

"Mikmaks is our third boat, one we bought in 2016 and refit with a world cruise in mind. The most unusual thing about her is her retro-fitted aluminum handrails, mast corral, stern tower for antennas, and transom ladder. They mark her as an exploration machine.

"We first heard about the Ha-Ha in Seward from another cruiser, and it's always been on our list of fun things to do. No one on the crew has ever done a rally or group cruise, so we're looking forward to the experience.

"After the Ha-Ha we plan to continue south to Costa Rica and then the Galapagos Islands. From there it's either south around Cape Horn or west to Australia. Tough choices, right? But our dream destination is Svalbard, Norway. It must be all the time we spent in Alaska. Everyone on the crew has a different dream boat, but Samantha insists that when it's time to retire she will buy a tiny dinghy and sail around the Keys in a bikini.

"Captain Jesse's hero is Roald Amundsen, captain of the first boat through the Northwest Passage.

"Our favorite quote: "It's 106 miles to Chicago, we've got a full tank, half pack of cigarettes, it's dark out, and we're wearing sunglasses. Hit it!" Our favorite dessert is Japanese whiskey."

Moon Child — Vagabond 47 (W) Arturo Kabona Aloha, OR / Bellingham, WA

Arturo, who was 'made' in Switzerland 58 years ago, is a retired Jack of All Trades. His crew will be Nick Sissine, 30, a Project Solutions Coordinator; and James Van Etten, 31, occupation not specified.

The highly-experienced and sea-savvy skipper and his crew are thrilled to have a musician/ deckhand earn his wage and grow some sea legs along the passage! Unfortunately, it wasn't specified which deckhand it is.

A self-described "Ha-Ha enthusiast", Arturo has sailed "almost anything that can set a sail," from a 13-ft sailing canoe to his heavy 47-ft ketch *Moon Child.* He's sailed on everything from freezing Swiss mountain lakes to the warm waters off Ixtapa, Mexico.

Arturo's plans after the Ha-Ha are to do more Ha-Ha's, "naturally". But his ultimate destination is Bora Bora.

You might have known there was an Aloha, Oregon, but the Poobah didn't. Sounds strange. Sort of like the name Arturo Kabona, which is indeed an alias.

Namowan — Tayana 48DS Kim Cunningham and Randall Brazzoni Ensenada / Calgary, Alberta

Kim still actively works in the Medical Field, while her husband Randall, 63, is still active in the Healthcare Sector. They will have two crew: Allen Rees, 62, a Recreation Therapist; and Jacqueline Rees, no doubt Allen's better half, a Registered Nurse.

"This will be our first Ha-Ha. We only purchased *Namowan* in March, so we're working through some of the challenges that come with a new boat. We purchased her in the hope of traveling to faraway places once we retire."

In the Cree language, 'namowan' means the wind is favorable to us. Cree is a dialect continuum of Algonquian languages spoken by approximately 117,000 people across Canada, from the Northwest Territories to Alberta. But you knew that.

No Ties — Jeanneau SO 39 (W) Josh and Tonia Feinstein Vashon. WA (Three Ha-Ha's)

Joshua, 45, is an attorney, while Tonia is a Buyer. Sailing south with them will be Doug Lombard, 60, a Captain. He's a veteran of three Ha-Ha's.

"We've only been sailing a little over a year, but our five-year-old Sun Odyssey is our second boat," says Josh. "Our program is to do the Coho Ho-Ho, the Baja Ha-Ha, then cruise the Sea of Cortez until March."

(Poobah Tip: If you want to do any comfortable swimming in Mexico much after December 1, you'll probably have to go over to the mainland. It's just 200 downwind miles to Puerto Vallarta.)


"Our dream boat would be the 287-ft *Maltese Falcon*, but she's perhaps a little out of reach for us," says Josh. Having both attended the launch of *Falcon* in Italy and sailed on her, the Poobah encourages Josh and Tonia to go for it. It might stretch your budget a little, but in the long run, the grandeur will surely have made it all worthwhile.

"Tonia is left-handed, so she would claim to be the Better Half," says Josh. "And probably is. But we both like the attitude of Carpe Diem!"

No Worries — Jeanneau 45 Chris Maher and Mike Scheck Alameda / Walnut Creek ('95, '97, '98, '03, '06)

Chris, 64, a Marine Industry Professional, will be skippering owner Mike Scheck's boat down to Puerto Vallarta for him. As best he can remember, Chris has done the Ha-Ha in 1995, 1997, 1998, 2003 and 2006, but maybe other times, too. He's also done countless offshore races in Mexico, the Pacific Northwest, and the Caribbean. His longest passage is 2,800 miles in the 2002 Atlantic Rally for Cruisers.

Chris will be completing the last 90 miles of the Pacific Crest Trail this summer, culminating with planting a Ha-Ha burgee at

the summit of Mt. Whitney.

While he won't be skipper, owner Mike Scheck will be aboard as crew along with his son Brendon, 35, a Fireman. Another crew will be John Ross, 67.

If for some reason *No Worries* doesn't do the Ha-Ha, Maher says he'll do it with his Olson 34 *Keaka*, which he's owned for eight years, and on which the Schecks crew.

**Ohana — Beneteau 440 (W) Jeff, Sarah, Josie (11) and Louella (6) Orgill Long Beach / Santa Monica

Jeff, 54, is a Small Business Owner, while Sarah is a Teacher. Their crew will be daughters Josie and Louella, both Students of Life.

"I've been sailing for seven years," reports Jeff, "while Sarah began sailing in her teens. She had her own boat when we met, and since then we've owned two more boats. It was only a few months ago that we upsized to our current boat, a Beneteau 440, from a Cal 34.

"This will be our first Ha-Ha. Sarah was in the Navy, so she's done longer passages but aboard large ships. We plan to spend the next year sailing the Sea of Cortez, and perhaps beyond."

The family's dream destination is 'the world', and Sarah is Jeff's "dreamboat".

The Orgill's sailing heroes are explorer Ernest Shackleton and Capt Frank Worsley, captain of *Endurance*, for the Trans-Arctic Expedition of 1914- 1916. After the *Endurance* was trapped in pack ice, Shackleton, Worsley and two others set out on a stormy 800-mile voyage aboard a 22-ft lifeboat to get help. They succeeded and the entire crew was rescued.

Frenchman Bernard Moitessier, another of the Orgill's heroes, is an interesting case with a big Cabo connection. He was heroic

both for his actions in the 1968-'69 Golden Globe Around the World Race and his writings. But Bernard also perpetrated a giant fraud. As some will remember, his famous *Joshua* was one of the first boats that went ashore in Cabo during the freak but brief storm that hit in December of 1982 and left about 30 boats on the beach. The next day Bernard sold *Joshua* to a Swiss guy named Rado for \$1.

Moitessier would later make up increasingly more colorful and detailed stories about what happened, and how after a long time he managed to persuade his shipmate, rather crazy German actor Klaus Kinski, to abandon the boat and swim ashore. Moitessier would stay on the boat while the mast came down and she was driven up on the beach.

But according to Lyn and Larry Pardey, who were on the scene the next day, as was the Poobah, Moitessier immediately confessed that he and Kinski hadn't been on the boat at all, but rather drinking in a hotel room. He asked the Pardeys, his friends, not to reveal the truth, and for many years they didn't.

Anyway, you can see *Joshua*, looking better than ever at the Maritime Museum in La Rochelle, France, where she's been restored and is sailed regularly.



OutRun - Shane & Karina

OutRun — Ericson 36C Shane Engelman Berkeley

Shane, 33, is a Lead Software Engineer for an augmented reality headset company who hasn't retired yet. He will be double-handing with Karina Durand who is from Quebec.

"I've been sailing for six years, and have only owned one boat, *OutRun*, which I bought six years ago. My longest passage to date is San Francisco to Ventura, which we did non-stop in 66 hours.

"My goal after the Ha-Ha is to do the

Puddle Jump to the South Pacific. I don't have a dream destination because, like the saying goes, 'the journey is the destination', and I'm on it.

"I don't have to dream about other boats because I believe the best boat is the one you already have, and mine has everything a sailor could ever need. Plus, a PlayStation 5."

Shane's boat is an Ericson 36C, which was an unusual Bruce King design for the mid-'70s, as she features a traditional clipper bow, a transom-hung rudder, and a cutter rig. She's not to be confused with the more conventional Ron Holland Ericson 36s that were built two years later.

Since Shane is a software engineer, it's not surprising that he not only has an Iridium Go! but an Iridium sat phone, Starlink, and a "fancy 4G to wifi thing I made." He also has an SSB-capable ICOM UC-7300 hooked up to a 34-ft SSB antenna.

While his new watermaker is doing its thing, Shane wouldn't mind a little lemon sorbet.

"I don't drink, smoke, or party," says Shane. "The main reason for me going on the Ha-Ha is to meet fellow independent people and to kickstart the adventure of my lifetime, with my eventual goal being making it all the way around the world in about four years."




Oz - Susan & Steve

Oz — Catana Bali 4.1 Cat (W) Steve and Susan Warner Seattle. Washington

Steve, 57, is in Marketing, while Susan is a "Rover". But Steve has a lot of other skills. He's a former Navy Diver/Special Operation Lieutenant Commander, and a former PJ (Pararescue). Pararescue team members risk their lives, often in dire situations, to save other lives. Ballsy stuff.

"Susan and I have been married for 27 years," reports Steve. "We've lived all over the USA as well as in Thailand, Korea and Romania. We have three daughters, the youngest of which just graduated from college. So, we sold our home and are taking advantage of the opportunity to go on



another adventure together. We're planning on taking a year, but we'll see how we feel after we winter over in Mexico. We might eventually go through the Canal and explore places such as Belize.

"I've been sailing off and on for 30 years, during which time I've owned two boats. We've owned our cat, a standard factory issue Bali 4.1, since 2019. We like her, but she's not our ultimate dream boat. We'll know that when we see it. While in Mexico I'll be looking for opportunities to make some spending money to supplement our savings. I can dive, and am handy with basic repairs and maintenance.

"Our longest trip to date has been from San Diego to Seattle with *Oz*. We don't have any sailing heroes, but we've watched a lot of *Delos* YouTube videos, in part because David is from Seattle and has been out there a long time.

"Whatever doesn't kill you makes you stronger," is our favorite quote. We're right-handed, don't have nicknames, and like Key Lime Pie, spinach and asparagus, and fruits such as red and white wine. Even rose. We like the Stones and The Who, and Saving Private Ryan."



Passing Wind - Corey

Passing Wind — Hunter Passage 42 Shawn and Jennifer Goit Oceanside (2016)

Shawn didn't list an age or occupation. Jennifer works in Customer Service. Their crew will be Dan Goit, Shawn's brother, who is 63 and retired from Construction; another brother Nick Goit, 53, who is the Maintenance Area Manager at Amazon; Robert Temple, 63, who is both a Plumber and Shawn's cousin; and nephew Corey Goit, 32, who says he's "Master Chief Engineer and Facility Manager at Amazon. My day job includes running a team of techs that maintain the infrastructure of Data Centers that provide a multitude of

internet services. Whether it be streaming movie services for your everyday families or deep quantum computing services for the hacker extraordinaire sifting through the matrix trying to find 'the one'." Yeah, there are a lot of interesting people on the Ha-Ha.

"I've been sailing for 20 years and had powerboats for 20 years before that," reports Shawn. "I've owned 15 boats in all, 12 of them power, three of them sail. We've had *Passing Wind* for eight years, and did the '16 Ha-Ha with my son in the year he graduated from high school. Our crossing to Puerto Vallarta was our longest non-stop passage to date, in that it took three days. We might call on Puerto Vallarta again before returning to Oceanside.

"I owned my dream boat, but the Ha-Ha shattered my dream of sailing around the world. It made me realize that it would actually be a lot of work to go all the way around. 'Nothing can be easy,' my friend said I should change my motto, but damn, nothing is easy anymore.

"My son is my sailing hero, and I only wish he could make another Ha-Ha with us. I love ice cream, so if anybody has some in their freezer, I wouldn't mind an invitation. I go by Shawn, but have been called a Dick, possibly due to periodically having a less than ideal attitude."

Poobah Note: A lot of long-time cruisers will agree that cruising is never super easy, but the first couple of long passages were their most trying. Once you get your boat and yourself dialed in, things become a lot easier.

Pelerin — Ovni 435 Mike and Shirley Hiscock Lunenburg / Victoria, B.C.

Mike, 57, is a retired Pilot and Shirley is a retired Translator. They will be doublehanding the Ha-Ha.

The couple report that they've been sailing "off and on" since 1999. The Phillipe Briand-designed Ovni will be one, if not the only, aluminum boat in this year's fleet. The couple have owned her, their third boat, for two years.

Mike and Shirley report their longest passage is 3,000 miles from Lanzarote, one of the Canary Islands to Antigua via Mindelo, Cape Verde.

After the Ha-Ha they will continue on to the Caribbean. Their dream destination is Nova Scotia via the Bahamas. And they hope to do it with *Pelerin*, their dream boat.

Mike's favorite quote: "Cost of doing business", Shirley's: "That's expensive"; Mike's worst sailing experience was getting stuck in the mud in a tight marina in 20 knots of wind, Shirley's, being way overcanvassed on their MacGregor 26. The Hiscock's hero is Bernard Mortessier.

A pelerin is a pilgrim traveling to a holy

place. It's also the name of a French weekly. But you knew that.

Pendragon — Davidson 44 Modified Ed Hoff

San Francisco / San Bruno ('01, '13)

Ed, 65, is both a proud seventh-generation Californian and an Analytical Chemist. Friend Laura Dyball, a Real Estate Relocations expert, will be his crew, along with Stephen Straw, a Carpenter; and Chandell Beeson.

Ed has been sailing for 46 years during which time he's owned five sailboats, including *Pendragon* for the last three years. The vet of two Ha-Ha's, one as captain and one as crew, has a longest passage of Honolulu to San Francisco. And he did that singlehanded!

While his dream destination is the Aegean Sea, he'll hang out in the Sea of Cortez after the Ha-Ha on *Pendragon*, his dream boat.

Hagen-Dazs ice cream is his favorite dessert, "just like what I enjoyed after crossing beneath the Golden Gate Bridge after solo sailing from Honolulu to San Francisco."

Ed believes one of two things happens each time you go sailing. "You either have a great day on the water or you have an adventure."

Praxis —Beneteau 57 Thomas Magee and Elizabeth Ugarte Marina del Rey / Pasadena

Thomas, 65, is a retired Doctor, while spouse Elizabeth is the CEO of an unspecified organization. Spencer Busteed, 38, will be the Captain for this trip; and Spencer's wife Kelsey Roop, an RN, will be crew.

Tom and Spencer, the Owner and Captain respectively, have been sailing "since children". But everyone on the boat is a "Ha-Ha Virgin". Their big trips have been to Catalina.



What is praxis? It is the ability to conceptualize, plan, and organize movements in order to complete unfamiliar motor tasks. But you knew that.

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
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




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Profligate — Surfin' 63 Cat Richard Spindler and Doña de Mallorca La Cruz. Mexico

Richard, 74, was the founder and Editor/Publisher of Latitude 38 for 40 years, and after the founding of the Ha-Ha has been the Poobah for 26 of 27 of them. Doña is a Registered Nurse and Captain, and has done 25 Ha-Ha's and 22 Baja Bashes.

An eight-year former resident of Mallorca, Spain, Doña has sailed across the Atlantic twice, while Richard has only done it once. Richard and Doña met very briefly during an Antigua Sailing Week in the 1980s and were so unimpressed with each other that they didn't meet again for another 10 years. After 23 years of courtship, they got married a few years ago, although neither can remember exactly when.

They live three months a year each on boats in Paris, St. Barth, La Cruz, and Southern California. Hey, it's less expensive than owning a house and living in Coastal California.

Crew Chris Hunt is a Contractor in Sacramento who has done 19 Ha-Ha's on Profligate; Chuck Skewes owns Ullman Sails in San Diego and Seattle and has done five Ha-Ha's; Dino DiPasquale, a Painting Contractor from Colorado Springs, has done 15 Ha-Ha's; Paul Ludgate, from Newport Beach, owns a cat and leads llama tours in Colorado, has done four Ha-Ha's. Christian Holm Bombs Forest Fires from jets and has done five Ha-Ha's; Lynn Ringseis, a former Charter Cat Owner/Operator in the Caribbean, and currently a socialite, has done 14 Ha-Ha's on Profligate. Steve Mueller just retired as a Fire Chief for Cal Fire and is a Ha-Ha virgin, although he's done two Bashes aboard Profligate. Deborah Kirsten is a Consultant and sails on Lake Dillon in Colorado. There will be one or two more crew.

Profligate was completed by DENCHO in Long Beach in 1966 and is based on a Kurt Hughes 60-ft charter cat, but stretched three feet and modified tremendously by the owner. She is basically a day cat that can also sleep 14. She has done 25 Ha-Ha's as well as a trip through the Canal to the Eastern Caribbean and back. She's mostly made of Divinycell and Vinylester resin. Before she got loaded down, she hit 25 knots on both San Francisco Bay under white sails, and again under spinnaker on the Ha-Ha.

Richard has owned 19 boats over the years, including three Olson 30s and an Ocean 71 that he kept in the Caribbean except for a trip across the Atlantic and Med to Turkey and back. Having done six Antigua Sailing Weeks back when it was a huge week-long international event with over 200 entries, he's most proud of his

Ocean 71 *Big O* being declared 'Party Boat of the Week' three times in a row by legendary Joel Byerly, the 'Voice of Antigua'.

Richard and Doña are both proud to be 'regular people'. While they have been very, very fortunate to have been able to do a lot of things over the years, they don't consider themselves any better or different than anybody else.

"I was put on earth to try and help other people have a little fun before leaving this veil of tears," says the Poobah.

Queso Grande II — Seawind 1260 Cat Lance Lott and Sherri Benedict Semiahmoo, WA / Blaine, WA

Lance, 55, is retired from Airline Technical Operations Management, while spouse Sherri is retired from Human Resources Management. Their seven-year-old dog Maybel hasn't worked a day in her life.

Lance and Sherri have been sailing for six years, during which time they've owned two sailboats and some powerboats. They've owned their Australian-built Seawind 1260, which was built in 2021, for 14 months.

Their longest trip to date has been sailing from Seattle to San Diego, but they plan to keep on truckin' all the way around the world without looking back. This plan reminds the Poobah of Eric and Pam Sellix of the Oregon-based Seawind 1160 cat *Pied-a-Mer*. Pam, then 66, had never spent a night on a boat or been out of sight of land before they started on the 2012 Ha-Ha. They later did a second Ha-Ha in 2014 before taking off around the world. Now '76 years young', they are cruising in the Red Sea and have probably reached Turkey.

Lance and Sherri's dream destinations are the South Island of New Zealand and Greece, which are pretty much on opposite sides of the world. Their Seawind cat is their dream boat. Their sailing heroes are friends Teri Mandemaker and Lee Locke, who circumnavigated with their Hallberg-Rassy 37 as part of the Blue Water Rally.

There is always time to do it right the second time', is Lance and Sherri's favorite quote. The couple love fudge brownies, are ambidextrous and are open to being given nicknames.

Rachel Lynn — Fairweather Mariner 39 Robert Feld Billings, Montana

Robert, 71, is an Insurance Broker who will be doing his first Ha-Ha. As of press time he hadn't selected his three crew.

Robert has been sailing for 12 years, during which time he's owned two boats. He's owned *Rachel Lynn* for two years, having fallen in love with the design the first time he saw one.

Although Robert hasn't done a Ha-Ha before, he has sailed from Hawaii to San Diego, which is nearly three times as long. But his dream destination is "San Carlos", although we're not sure which one. There are many.

'Bob' likes the quote "it will buff out" and carrot cake for dessert. But he has a strange desire "To grow up like the Grand Poobah." Just remember, Bob, things are rarely as they seem to be.

Resolute — Beneteau First 50 Peter Lane and Nicky Lecher Jamestown, RI / Park City, Utah (2021)

Peter, 57, is a Franchise Owner, as is significant other Nicky. Both did last year's Ha-Ha, and will once again be doublehanding the big 2007 Philippe Briand design.

Peter has been sailing for 50 years. Among the more than 12 boats he's owned are a Blue Jay, Laser, J/24, two matchracing J/22s, a Moth, a Melges 17 and 24, two J/105s, and three powerboats. Sounds like a pretty strong boat addiction.

Nicky has only been sailing for a few years, but really enjoyed cruising the Sea of Cortez after last year's Ha-Ha. She also owns an Ocean Alexander 52 motor yacht.

This is the couple's second year with *Resolute*, their dream boat. After the Ha-Ha, they plan to sail north to Loreto, then across the mainland to Mexico, down to Costa Rica, and eventually through the Canal to the East Coast. This even though their dream destination the Galapagos, is in the opposite direction.

Peter's sailing hero is his grandfather, with whom he built boats in his youth.

Nicky likes white chocolate for dessert, something Peter can't "fathom". But they both live by the open-ended adage, "Nothing is half so much fun as... (you fill in the blank.)

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Resolute - Nancy & Scott

Resolute — J/122 Scott and Nancy Wildman Long Beach / Palos Verdes Peninsula ('17, '18, '19)

Scott, 67, is a retired Aerospace Mechanical Engineer who has done three Ha-Ha's as crew. Nancy is a high school Chemistry Teacher, who will be doing her first Ha-Ha. Their crew will be Louis 'Frank' Zankich, 61, an attorney; Stephanie Zankich, a Teacher; and Dixie Yeck, an Investment Broker who races out of King Harbor.

"Frank and Stephanie are the new owners of a Tayana 55 in Florida," reports Scott, "and the Ha-Ha will help them decide if they are cut out for boat ownership." Although cruising on a fairly luxurious Tayana 55 is a rather different experience than cruising on a performance J/122.

"I started sailing after high school and haven't stopped," reports Scott. "My first sailboat was a trimaran on the hard in Wilmington. We fixed her up and sailed her to Catalina with a backpacking compass and an Auto Club map. When I met my wife, we purchased a Tollycraft powerboat, also on the hard, restored her, and enjoyed boating with her for 11 years.

"We purchased *Resolute* just two weeks before we signed up for the Ha-Ha. The thing that stands out about this design is that she was the top American double-hander in the Bermuda 1-2 in 2014, and competed in Fastnet Race 2015.

"After my past three Ha-Ha's, I promised myself that I'd do the next one on my own boat. My longest passage to date is 17 days, helping deliver the Andrews 61 *Medicine Man* back from the TransPac in 2019. After the Ha-Ha some of the crew will return to the States, while new crew will show up to head up into the Sea of Cortez to swim with the whale sharks.

"We have been to the Caribbean, Seychelles and Tahiti on 50-foot bareboats skippered by me, the 'Wildman'. Our new

boat is very close to my dream racer/cruiser. If I could name a sailing hero there would be many from racing and cruising years, based on how well they handled themselves in adverse conditions.

"My favorite dessert is a *paleta*, the frozen Mexican natural fruit treat similar to a popsicle. And I hold it left-handed.

"I just completed hiking 1,300 miles, which is half of the Pacific Crest Trail. On the trail, I am known as 'Wildman'. From running out of water in the hot desert sun to being drenched in the freezing mountain rain, or taking a knockdown on a boat, it's important to keep your wits about you."

Nikki was crew on the Catalina 42 *Stargazer* in the '08 Ha-Ha and enjoyed "a fantastic experience." Tony missed out on the fun part but did do the Bash back from Puerto Vallarta.

After the Ha-Ha the couple plan to enjoy the Sea of Cortez, then head across to Riviera Nayarit Marina on Banderas Bay. Their dream destination is "anywhere with clear, warm, aquamarine water, white sand beach, and a lovely sailing breeze."

The couple's favorite dessert is anything with crunchy meringue and/or chocolate — with an extra layer of chocolate. While they are happy with their Catalina 36, Nikki reports that Tony turned "a nasty shade of green" upon learning that his brother had just bought an Oyster 53.

Rosemullion — Catalina 36 MKII Tony and Nikki Hutchinson San Diego / Laguna Nigel (2008)

Tony, 65, is retired from Global Strategies, which could mean a lot of things, while Nikki is a retired Librarian. Their crew will be sister Nic Wilson, a Marina Secretary; and Neil Wilson, 66, brotherin-law and retired Veterinarian.

"I'm originally from Cornwall," reports Tony, "where sailing is a big part of life because the beautiful area of South West England has water on three sides." While Tony is a lifelong sailor, Nikki only started when they met. "It was that or the relationship was, no pun intended, dead in the water," she reports.

The couple have owned five boats of various sizes to date; four Catalinas and one Ericson. The most unusual thing about Rosemullion, which they have owned for two years, is her name. Rosemullion is a family-run craft distillery set in the rural Cornish countryside that is being overrun by Londoners.

Salt Whistle — Catalina 34 Rob Simonds and Dawn Wilson Richmond / Camino

Rob, 63, is retired from High Tech Sales, while spouse Dawn is a retired Teacher. Son Robbie Simonds, 26, will be their crew.

Dawn has sailed since she was a kid, racing Lightnings with her dad on Long Island Sound and later on Lake Michigan. Wayne, Dawn's dad, once won the award for being the oldest participant in that year's Ha-Ha. Rob only started sailing when he and Dawn got together — it's a great story — nearly 15 years ago.

"We sail most weekends in the San Francisco Bay," the couple report, "and have bareboat chartered a half dozen times in the Caribbean. In fact, our *Salt Whistle* is named after the gorgeous bay at Mayreau Island in the Grenadines.

"We've owned two boats over the years, not inducing the two Lasers for sale in our backyard, and bought *Salt Whistle* in 2019. We do have a print of a Jim DeWitt painting of Dawn's dad sailing under the

Golden Gate in the boat. The original hangs in our house.

"Our longest single passage was from Tortola to Antigua with John Kretschmer, our sailing guru, aboard his boat *Quetzal*."

Dawn wants to sail the Seychelles while Rob wants to sail to Greece. They'll have to work that out. No matter where they sail, they'd like to do it aboard a Hylas 46. But the reality is that after the Ha-Ha, they'll sail the Sea of Cortez for several months.

Both are right-handers, but it's chocolate for Dawn and Crème Brûlée for Rob. He answers to Simesie, while she responds to Dawnie.

Saty — Cal 2-46 (W) Dave Talton San Francisco / Emeryville

Dave, 71, is retired after being both a Mortgage Broker and a Yacht Broker. This will be his first Ha-Ha. His crew will consist of friend Bobbi McElravey, a retired Entrepreneur and 14-year resident of Baja; Larry Jacobson, 67; and Patrik Hendrickson, 54.

"I've been sailing San Francisco Bay for nearly 50 years," reports Dave, "and have chartered all over the Eastern Caribbean and Bahamas. I have a USCG Master Mariner 100-Ton license and am a Coast Guard Auxiliary member and a coxswain.

"I've owned two boats in my life, a Pearson 38 and my Cal 2-46 that I bought in 2010. Launched in 1975, she's from the glory days of Lapworth-designed Cal yachts. Given her age, I've done an extensive refit on her. While I'm happy with *Saty*, I'll take a Hylas 56 if they decide to start giving them away.

"My dad is my sailing hero, and I agree that it's "better to remain silent and thought a fool than to speak and remove all doubt."

After the Ha-Ha Dave plans to winter over in the Sea of Cortez, even if it means he won't be able to find his favorite dessert, Mitchell's Chocolate Crackle Crunch ice cream.

A left-hander, 'Capt Dave's' dream destinations are the South Pacific and the Philippines.

The word *saty* has several meanings. One is slang for 'silent all these years', another is 'open-mindedness', while a third is 'uncontrollable sexual desire', coming from the Greek word satyriasis. But you knew that. We're guessing it's number two.

Scapa Flow — Jeanneau SO 42 Frank Quinn Santa Cruz / Sunnyvale (2018)

It's the name of a British Naval Base in Scotland's Orkney Islands, famous as being the place where the German Navy surprised England's Royal Navy by scuttling 52 of the 74 German ships held captive there during the final months of World War I. But you knew that.

Seaquester — Beneteau 423 Bill and Cheryl Leone San Diego / Denver, Colorado

Bill, 65, is an Attorney. He'll be sailing south with spouse Cheryl, who is Retired; son Corey Smith, 41, a Paralegal; daughter Teresa Leone, 30, a Consultant; and Jacin Steele, 40, a Software Engineer.

"I've been sailing for 16 years and have owned three boats, *Seaquester* for the last three years."

Having done five San Diego to Puerto Vallarta and L.A. to Cabo races, Bill knows the Ha-Ha course well. He's also a vet of the Newport to Bermuda Race, as well as the 2019 TransPac. Those are a lot of competitive ocean miles under his keel.

The Leones own their dream boat in the 423, and their dream destination is the Galapagos, just 2,081 miles from the Ha-Ha finish in Cabo.



"Our group has co-owned Shoofly for three months. She was broken down when we bought her three months ago. But collectively the four of us have 150 years — yikes! — of experience working on boats, so we took on the challenge of fixing her up in time to do the Ha-Ha.



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"Colin has been sailing the longest, since 1979, and offshore since 1984. *Shoofly* is boat number six for him.

"None of us have done a Ha-Ha before, but collectively we've sailed to Hawaii or back 14 times on various boats, and sailed a lot in Mexico as far south as Manzanillo. After the Ha-Ha we'll keep the boat in Mexico for each couple to use.

"Collectively our dream destination is Mexico aboard the boat we now own."

The group's sailing hero is Ken Read, an East Coaster who is considered one of the world's most accomplished and celebrated sailors. He's won more than 40 World, North American, and National Championships in a variety of classes, been a helmsman in America's Cup campaigns and Around the World Races, and perhaps most famously, been the helmsman on Jim Clark's 100-ft *Comanche* and J Class *Hanuman*.

"After this year's Ha-Ha, we'll head up to Bahía Concepción, spend time in the Loreto area, then return to the Channel Islands in December. We had excellent weather in the same time frame in the Sea last year, with only a few 'duck and cover' days.

"My dream destination is landing where we have more in common with people than we have differences, and do it with *Silver Linings*, my dream boat.

"Horatio Hornblower, the fictitious British sailing officer during the Napoleonic Wars in C.S. Forester's novels, is my sailing hero. It was he, or more accurately Forester, who got me interested in the history of sail through story. He and Popeye

"I'm only left-handed when needed to balance a margarita. I enjoy using my right-handed skills in creative projects both on and off the water. Aaron, 58, is a retired Union Electrician. Heidi is the CEO of a Non-Profit and an Event Coordinator as well. She did the 2005 Ha-Ha on *Blind Luck* and both of them did the 2021 Ha-Ha on *Fundango*. Their crew will be father Jim Stagg, 77, a retired Union Electrician; and grandson Cody Wood, a Student of Life.

Aaron and Heidi have known each other since they were four years old, having been introduced to each other by their respective fathers at an Electrician's picnic. They reconnected 41 years later. Within four months of Aaron finding Heidi on Facebook, they moved on to Aaron's dad's Freedom 32, then bought *Sonho* three months later. They were married on Angel Island.

Aaron is an avid racer on the San Francisco Bay scene, while Heidi skippers their Wilderness 21, *Slice* on Estuary Beer Can races with an all-women crew. Both have done the San Francisco to Cabo and back

"We can't wait to have three generations onboard for the first leg of our journey to paradise!"

Stainsby Girl — Catalina 470 Garry and Cheryl Dobson San Francisco / Cold Springs ('94, '00, '01, '06, '18, '21)

Garry, 70, is a retired Real Estate Developer and Cheryl a Real Estate Broker. The crew will be Jim Painter, 64, an Engineer; and Karen Miller, an Executive Assistant who crewed on the 2021 Ha-Ha and is a longtime friend from the Stockton Sailing Club.

"I've been sailing for 37 years," reports Jim, "and *Stainsby Girl*, which I purchased in 2005, is my second boat. My wife and I have been together for 14 years, and this will be our second Ha-Ha together. Our longest passage has been San Francisco to San Diego. After the Ha-Ha, we plan to leave the boat in La Paz and use her like a condo.

"Our dream destination has always been my next anchorage. Our feeling is "If you're lucky enough to be doing the Baja Ha-Ha, then you're lucky enough."

Stainsby is located in the county of Derbyshire, East Midlands, three miles southwest of the town of Bolsover, six miles southeast of the major town of Chesterfield, and 126 miles northwest of London.

Stainsby Girl is the name of a hit song by Chris Rea.

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Swan Fun - Joe

Swan Fun — Nautor Swan 55 Joe Heinzmann Oakland / Concord (2021)

Joe, 52, is a retired Power Engineer. His crew consists of Rob Vellinger of IOD fame; Marine Consultant Paul Kamen, 72, who has done countless races to Hawaii, a number of Ha-Ha's, and will be giving celestial navigation classes in Turtle Bay; Jim Commins an LLNL engineer who can fix anything; Audrey Yen, seamstress extraordinaire and retired project manager from Proctor and Gamble; and Joe's daughter Catie who is an animal whisperer and a sailing novice.

"Swan Fun's crew consists mostly of creative engineers," Joe reports "who will be sailing Swan Fun south improvising repairs of all flavors on the way down.

"I started sailing 42 years ago with Hal Nelson, then owner of Nelson's Boatyard, aboard *Axel Heyst* and did the original Pacific Cup with him on that boat." Joe built and restored boats in the 80's before heading to the Cal Maritime Academy to receive his Mechanical and Marine Engineering degrees and Coast Guard certs.

"Hired by GE as a field engineer, I have developed products for critical power systems, Fuel Cell systems, and most lately helping bring the promise of large-scale batteries to utilities in California and around the world."

Patsy is a veteran of the real estate world in Lake Oswego, Oregon, spent some time boatbuilding at Schooner Creek in Portland, and when not working on the Ha-Ha spends time as a webmistress.

Her Ha-Ha crew will include her guy Tim Horne, 64, a veteran Colorado River guide and current employee of the city of Aspen; nephew Elliot Drake, 32, who is in software sales for 8x8 Inc, a communications platform; John Cavanaugh, 70+, Charter Boat Captain at boatsafloat2.com; and picked up from the Baja Ha-Ha/Latitude 38 crew party Santa Barbara surfer dude, Spencer Lyon, 31.

Patsy has done every Ha-Ha since 2007 and is legendary for sailing all the way every year and being able to sail her

45-year-old Gulfstar 50 fast and deep. Not many sailors can do both well at the same time, and it's what much of the Ha-Ha is all about.

"I have owned *Talion* since 2000 when I bought her to replace my Columbia 43 that had blown up in a propane explosion. I've sailed north to Alaska, south to Costa Rica, west to Tahiti, and east up seven locks on the Columbia and Snake Rivers to Lewiston, Idaho.

"I've lived aboard for well over 30 years, and for the past 15 years primarily on the hook in Mexico and Southern California.

"My dream boat would be one that requires no maintenance and one on which nothing breaks. Ha, ha, ha.

"My favorite dessert is red wine with chocolate, and I am left-handed.

"I'm proud to be the Poobah's only employee since he sold *Latitude 38* and married Doña.

"My goal," says La Reina, who frequently singlehands her 50-ft boat, "is to do whatever I can to enable others to enjoy the cruising lifestyle."

I haven't done a Ha-Ha before, and plan to sail up into the Sea of Cortez afterward.



There were two Cal 33 designs. *Teaser* is one of the original Jensen Marine Cal 33s from the early 1970s with the familiar look of the Lapworth-designed Cals. In the mid-'80s, long after the Jensen Marine days, Raymond Hunt did a more modern version. But hey, the original Cal 33 set a class record in the Fort Lauderdale to St. Pete Race of the old SORC. Anybody remember that once great series?

Tempest — Jeanneau 45.2 Owen Provence and Bill McNamara Alamitos Bay / Huntington Beach (2018, 2019)

Owen is retired from her Public Relations business. The name Owen means 'well born' or 'warrior' in Welsh. You probably gotta be a warrior in the PR industry. Bill, 61, is a retired Electrical Engineer who teaches STEM classes to middle schoolers.

Both Owen and Bill are lifetime sailors. Owen has done six Newport to Ensenada races as skipper of all-women boats and is a Staff Commodore of Shoreline YC in Long Beach. Bill is currently Jr. Staff Commodore of the Southern California Yachting Association, Race Committee Timer, 'Voice of the Newport to Ensenada Race', and is a member of ALYC.

Both Owen and Bill are active members of landed clubs: BCYC, SYCLB and Corsair YC, and less active as members of numerous other yacht clubs and yachting associations in the United States and Mexico. Whew! How many hours are in their days?

After retiring, Bill did the 2018 Ha-Ha, while both Owen and Bill both did the 2019 Ha-Ha. "We loved doing the Ha-Ha on our Catalina 355 *Moonlight Lady*," they report. "After the Ha-Ha we cruised up into the Sea of Cortez, planning to Bash in March

of 2020. Oops, Covid! So, we ended up in Southern California and the boat in Mexico for a year.

"Having cruised our 35.5 for three months, we realized that 'we're gonna need a bigger boat'. So, we bought *Tempest* in 2021 and have been getting her ready for this year's adventures, the highlight of which will be the Ha-Ha. We'll spend the season in Mexico, then either Bash back or find a place in Mexico."

Alec has been sailing for 30 years, during which time he's owned three 'Charters' boats. He's owned *Tenacious* for six years. The red boat should be easy to spot on the mostly downwind Ha-Ha, as she carries a custom Superman spinnaker. Alec's longest passage to date has been 145 miles, so the Ha-Ha will be a big step up. After the Ha-Ha, his plans are to spend a few days in the Sea of Cortez, then return north to San Diego.

The South Pacific is the dream destination of many Ha-Ha participants, including Alec. But he's the only one who sees a Club Swan 50 as a dream boat.

Alec doesn't really have a sailing hero, but he enjoys seeing that sailing legend Dennis Conner is still racing and on the water around San Diego.


The Irish Rose - Derek & Rachael

The Anderson family has signed on two crew. Nine-year-old Elena Elliott and dad Adam, 41. Both are Bay area sailors. Elena loves the sun, swimming, fishing, and adventure. Lemurs are her favorite animal. Dad likes sashimi, killer tacos, and is looking forward to a fun run south. Wait, one more crew on the big cat, Sandy Lazzari, a long-time Bay sailor.

The Anderson family has been sailing *Tiamat*, which has already done a circumnavigation, around San Francisco Bay since buying her in 2018. Tim, 61, is retired from Aviation Security. His crew will be Beth Leatherman, a Flight

Attendant; brother Melvin Watkins, 64, retired from the U.S. Army; and Lorilee Cadwell, a Flight attendant.

Tim has been sailing for six years, during which time he's owned *Tranquility*, his only boat to date. His longest sail has been from Los Angeles to San Diego.

While he'll stay in the Sea of Cortez for the season, his dream destination is the Med with a Leopard 50 catamaran. He answers to 'Skipper'.

Tritium — Customized Orma 60 (W) Scott and Vidi Rhoads USVI / St. Petersburg, FL

Scott, 57, is the Director of the Ultimate Adventure Academy. Vidi is an attorney. Their crew will be Sage Epic, a 29-year-old male Consultant; and Ian Moore, 17, a Student of Life. But there may be more crew, for as Scott wrote: "A couple of others may join us as we are open to friendly pick-up crew. We have a large vessel and room for cool folks that add flavor without turning the flavor bitter."

"Vidi and I have been sailing together for 10 years around Hawaii, the Caribbean, California and the Med," reports Capt. Scott. "I have been a professional sailor/educator for nearly 30 years. With the school, we have owned over 250 boats all over the world that range from Lightnings and Windmills, that we build at the Academy, to a 110-foot schooner and everything in between.

"We've owned *Tritium* for six months. First launched about 35 years ago as an ORMA 60, and constantly upgraded and lengthened by 12 feet, she is one of the fastest boats in the world. She was built to smash world records and did so before becoming a test boat for the America's Cup with foils for flying the hulls. But we're not using them. *Tritium* is a carbon fiber monster. Even the spokes on the wheel are carbon fiber.

"I have lost track of all of my sea miles," continues Scott. "I stopped counting them after it reached a point that most folks couldn't believe them anymore anyway. This will be our first Ha-Ha, although I have wanted to do one since the first. Alas, the challenges of running the school have conflicted every year until this year. We are excited to come play!

"We are going to explore the Sea of Cortez after the Ha-Ha and then head for the Caribbean. My dream destination is always the next one. We have sailed all over the world and have loved almost everywhere.

"We are excited to pick up a boat that is being donated to our school in New Zealand, and then push her against the breeze to Fiji, Tahiti and then Hawaii. Our next big boat, which has been my dream boat all along, is a square rigger. I can't disclose any details until the paperwork is done.

"My dog is my sailing hero. What a trooper! Nobody comes aboard without a burger for him.

"My wife makes the meanest tiramisu on the darn planet. If someone has a bigger fridge than we do — everyone does — I will talk her into making it for us. Such goodness. It will ruin you for all other tiramisus.

"I'm only left-handed when hanging onto a line being pulled behind the boat holding the watermelon in my right hand," says Scott. "By the way, I'm actually not that friendly, but my wife Vidi makes up for it by far, so everyone will be okay."



Truly - Scott & Cindy

Truly — Nordhavn 40 M/Y Scott and Cindy Smith Astoria, OR / Ontario, OR (2014)

Scott, 63, a retired Sales Manager, and Cindy, a Rural Mail Carrier, did the 2014 Ha-Ha as co-skippers. Marshall Peabody, 60, retired from Sales, and also a vet of the '14 Ha-Ha, will be their crew.

"We've been sailing and boating full time since 2013, and did the '14 Ha-Ha with *Velvet Sky* our Island Packet 38 — and our then four-year-old grandson. We purchased *Truly* in February of this year and are ready to go again. But this time we'll stay in Central America for the season, then transit the Panama Canal in order to start the Great American Loop the next year."

What's the Great American Loop? In no particular order, it's the Intracoastal Waterway, the Chesapeake Bay, the C&D Canal, the Atlantic Ocean from Cape May to New York Harbor, the Hudson River, the Erie Canal, the Oswego Canal or Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, the Trent-Severn Canal, Georgian Bay, Lake Michigan,

the Illinois River, the Mississippi River, the Ohio River, the Tennessee River, the Ten-Tom Waterway, Mobile Bay, the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway, and the Okeechobee Waterway. The whole thing is between 5,250 and 6,000 miles and can be done as quickly as two months or as long as forever.

'DB' says his goal is to "get off the dock and go sailing", although in his dreams he'd do it aboard an Oyster 54.

'Pay attention and try to keep up' is the right-hander's favorite quote.

Vanadium — Beneteau 41.1 (W) Michael Brost and Catherine Brown Newport Harbor / Anaheim Hills

Michael, 62, is in IT Tech Sales, while spouse Catherine is retired after a career of being Self-Employed.

Having been sailing since his teens, Michael is skilled, Catherine only started sailing in 2018 when she met Michael. So, she's still learning.

The couple purchased *Vanadium*, their first boat, in late 2018 and have it in the Sail Time program out of Newport Harbor.

"We have sailed to Catalina many times and twice to the Channel Islands, but this will be our first Ha-Ha," report the couple. "We're very excited, as this will be a test trip for us. If all goes well, we plan to buy a larger catamaran and join the Pacific Puddle Jump fleet to the South Pacific in 2024.

Michael, 61, is a retired Engineer — in

aerospace, electric and hybrid vehicles, and medical devices. "I spent a long time learning to be an engineer and now don't know how not to be one." He's also an Entrepreneur who loves watersports, boats, cars, cycling, and wine.

His crew will be brother-in-law Alan Beaulaurier, 66, who is a retired Pilot; Eric Brown, also a brother-in-law, who is a retired General Contractor; and Craig Urasaki, 64, occupation Unknown.

Michael has been sailing on and off for 50 years, and consistently for the last 20 years. He's owned three boats, including *Venture* for the last 17 years. What's special about her? "She's my well-loved dream boat. When I'm not sailing her, I often dream of sailing her.

"My dream destinations are anywhere downwind, warm, with following seas, such as Cabo San Lucas and a Pacific Cup I did to Hawaii. But to me, it's more about the sailing than the destination.

"I've been sailing for over 40 years, starting with dinghies as a child," reports Pierre. "I moved up to a small monohull in the 1980s, and for the last 20 years have been doing charters in various places around the world. We've owned three boats: a Tanzer 22, a Jeanneau 36i, and our current boat, the Amel Maramu 52, which we've had for the last two years."

Amel, based out of La Rochelle, France, is a storied name in yacht building. Founded in 1964 by Henri Amel, they were innovators in the use of fiberglass. Unlike Beneteau or Jeanneau, Amel didn't introduce a lot of new models. Indeed, the Amel Maramu and Super Maramu, which became ubiquitous in the world of sailing, remained largely unchanged for many years. But thanks to a sheltered center cockpit, powered sail controls, a ketch rig, and a unique setup for sailing wing-onwing, they had a near cult following. Their

boats are "proudly 100% French.

Pierre and Marie-Josée's dream destination is the islands of the South Pacific, which they'd like to see from the decks of their dream boat, which they already own. They don't have any sailing heroes but have great respect for French Oceanographer Jacques Cousteau.

"You only get one life to live," they say, so they'd like carrot cake for dessert. Their longest passage to date has been two days, so the Ha-Ha will be a move up. They intend to cruise Mexico into next year.

Voyager — Hylas 54 Ed Lecco and Liz Barsell Alameda / Danville (2021)

Ed, 59, is a retired Navy P3 Flight Engineer. The Poobah bets he's got some stories to tell, as he "spent 10 years flying all over the Pacific and Asia on P3s during my naval career." He later worked for several enterprise software companies.

Liz is an Estate Attorney who is fairly new to sailing, but has taken some courses, loves going out on the Encinal YC cruises, and is super excited about doing the Ha-Ha. In fact, Ed and Liz are already planning to do the 2023 Ha-Ha, followed by a cruise to South America and beyond.

Their crew will be Mike Plowman from Hawaii and Edward Starr, 51, who is in Software Sales and is planning to do the next Ha-Ha with his own boat. Edward wants everyone to know that he plays guitar, bass, and drums. Anybody want to jam?

Ed bought *Voyager* earlier this year and sailed her down to the Bay Area from Seattle. He has sailed for 30 years and used to own a Hobie 16 that he sailed daily off Ewa Beach, Hawaii, before moving up to a Catalina 380 partnership and then on to two additional boats. After the Ha-Ha his plans are "to continue on to Puerto Vallarta and sail Mexico."

Ed's dream destination is Thailand, his dream boat a Hylas 70. John Paul Jones, who was born in poverty but became the so-called 'Father of the American Navy', is Ed's sailing hero. JPJ had a great quote: "I wish to have no connection with a ship that doesn't sail well, for I intend to go into harm's way." But Ed prefers the quip from Admiral Bull Halsey: "Don't be afraid to step on anyone's toes. If they were moving, they wouldn't get stepped on."

"I'm 'Drew', and I started my sailing career in my preteen years purposefully capsizing a Sunfish because it was fun. I grew up racing with my family on a Baltic 35, and after that did some collegiate racing. Ingrid and I have finally realized our dream of owning our first boat, and it's been four months since we moved aboard. Getting to the Ha-Ha start from Seattle will be our longest passage before the start of the Ha-Ha. After the Ha-Ha we plan to explore the Sea of Cortez, and then head to the Bahamas via the Panama Canal.

"Our dream is to eventually do a Pacific crossing and meet other adventurers. If we win the lottery, it'll be aboard a Beneteau 51.1.

"Our current favorite quote is 'Feel the fear, and do it anyway'." It's what launched us from dreamers to doers."

Wanuskewin — CS36 Michael Terides Maple Bay, B.C. / Victoria, B.C.

Captain Michael Terides, 66, is a retired Chiropractor. His crew will be Kevin White, 60, a Small Business Owner; and Roberta Barolat.

"I started sailing at age 20 aboard a 46-ft steel ketch on Australia's Great Barrier Reef," reports Michael. "I spent four months as First Mate doing local charters while living aboard. Too many years later, after several power boats, I bought my first sailboat. I'm on my second sailboat now, and I've had my current boat for five years, so I've been consistently sailing the past 12 years. Wanuskewin is the first CS36T I've seen with a hardtop dodger, so that's what's unusual about her.

"I've never done a Ha-Ha but am looking forward to the experience. My longest passage to date has been circumnavigating Vancouver Island, which is approximately 800 nm, with Kevin. My current post-Ha-Ha plan is to explore the Sea of Cortez and the Pacific Coast, although my dream destination would be the South Pacific Islands. What's my dream boat to do it on? An Oyster 49.

"Kevin, my crew, owns both a Columbia 39 center-cockpit and a Hunter 30. He and his family cruised the Sea of Cortez in 2012 with the Hunter 30.

After the Ha-Ha he plans to cruise the Sea of Cortez while his thoughts will be on his dream destination, Rarotonga.

Jim's sailing hero is Eric Forsyth who circumnavigated twice among other accomplishments in his Westsail 42, Fiona.

Wild Grace — Hunter 356 John Santon Dana Point / Vista

John, 64, retired from Engineering, like so many of the other Ha-Ha boat owners. John's crew will be Mark Giraud, 72; Shawn Knight, 58, who is retired from Medical Sales; and Woody Sutherland, 68, a retired Oceanographer. "I found my crew on the Ha-Ha Crew List," says John.

"I started sailing ocean-going sailboats in 2007 with a MacGregor 26 on a trailer," reports John. "After the financial crisis of 2008 a lot of boats moved out of Dana Point, so I put my name on the waiting list for both a 30 and a 35-ft slip. After a few years, I got a 30-ft slip and graduated to a Hunter 30. After a few more years, I decided to go on the Ha-Ha. But I really wanted to wait until I had a bigger slip and bigger boat. As it turned out, while I was preparing Pure Grace my Hunter 30 for the 2017 Ha-Ha I got a notice that I was on the top of the list for a 35-ft slip. So, I bowed out of the Ha-Ha and bought my Hunter 356.

"I registered for the Ha-Ha again in 2021, but three weeks before the start I fell and dislocated my shoulder. This year it's going to be the charm!
