

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CRUISIN' TO THE CAPE

Welcome to the 2023 Baja Ha-Ha 'Meet the Fleet' guide.

Please understand there are going to be many inaccuracies in the guide because there will have been many changes in crew and even boats between the time the guide was published and the October 30 start of the rally. We appreciate your understanding.

Many of the mistakes in this publication will probably be the fault of the Grand Poobah, although in some cases he was given incorrect, vague, confusing or contradictory information. He did his best with what he had to work with and appreciates your understanding.

In some cases, the Poobah paraphrased words to sentences in the interest of clarity and frivolity. In all cases, the Poobah did his best to adhere to the author's intent.

CODE

* Each asterisk means there is a 'kid' onboard. We define a 'kid' as someone chronologically, not just emotionally, 16 years or younger.

(W) Stands for white sails only, as opposed to sailing with a spinnaker or gennaker.

Years, such as **(2013)** indicate at least the minimum number of times the skipper or crew has done a Ha-Ha.

Cities. In cases where two cities are listed, the first is the boat's homeport, the second is where the owner(s) receives mail and most likely lives or used to live.

Triggers. When the words 'wife', 'husband', 'spouse', 'children', and such are used in this guide, they are terms of endearment and respect, not ownership or lesser status.

If the male's name appears first, it's because that's how it appeared in the registration form. In cases where only the man's name was given, the Poobah, whenever it seemed called for, added the name of the wife/partner/significant other. More than a few of you guys 'owe' him.

Ages. The Poobah publishes the age of the men when available, but doesn't publish the age of women unless they are 35 or younger. This is sexist, of course, but the Poobah did it out of respect for women who are sometimes sensitive about their age.

Adrenalin — Santa Cruz 50 Mark Howe Richmond (2017)

Mark, 67, is a Developer. He'll have three crew: Ann Thomas; Mark Thomas, 73, a retired Engineer; and Laura Parent, a Professional Captain.

"I've been sailing since I was a 10-yearold junior sailor in Santa Barbara," reports Mark.

"My dream vacation," Mark advises, "is sitting on my boat at the Riviera Nayarit Marina in La Cruz near Puerto Vallarta." Ha-Ha Fun Facts: About 25 years ago Ann did an Antigua Sailing Week with the Poobah aboard his Ocean 71 Big O. She can surely tell some stories, as the 'racing crew' of 35 was at the apex of wholesome debauchery. Some years later she and her husband Mark joined the Poobah and Dona de Mallorca aboard Profligate for a pleasant circumnavigation of Catalina.



Ale er Ron - Ron & Holly

*Ale er Ron — Hunter 460 (W) Ron Johnston and Holly Hall San Diego

Ron, 67, is a retired Test Pilot for Boeing. Holly is Retired from an unspecified career. Their crew will be friends Emily Prewett and Tyler Wilson, 39, and their 3-year-old son Gabriel.

'Captain Ron' started sailing at age 17 while in high school at Guam. He has owned and sailed several boats. Ron bought *Ale er Ron* — the name a play on an important aircraft component and his name — in 2005, and it's been his "love and joy" ever since.

Captain Ron, whose nickname has been 'Taco' for 40 years, lived aboard in Seattle until retiring from Boeing in 2017. During the 12 years living aboard in Seattle, he got off the dock nearly every week, summer and winter, to explore Puget Sound or participate in a regatta. Taco is proud to say that he is the one primarily in charge of his boat's maintenance, and only rarely needs to bring in a mechanic.

The day after retiring he started cruising by heading up the Inland Passage to Alaska with numerous stops in British Columbia. Intending to stay in Alaska for only that summer, he and his First Mate fell in love with it, so they ended up spending four summers there. While there he shared numerous beautiful small anchorages with friends and family. The usual segment was a 10-day adventure, leaving one port that had airline service and dropping the friends off at a different port with airline service.

During the four summers, the USCG boarded *Ale er Ron* three times. Each time the vessel, crew, and Captain received the 'gold standard' of inspections, with a perfect inspection report.

After four wonderful summers in Alaska, Captain Ron and his first mate Holly have decided to try cruising in warmer and dryer climates. After a winter haulout in Anacortes, where numerous maintenance tasks were completed, Captain Ron headed down the West Coast and is currently in San Diego.

His overnight offshore experience includes a one-night voyage from Astoria to Neah Bay, where he and his crew of three weathered 25 to 35 knots of wind and 10-foot seas at 11-second intervals. The boat and crew came through fine. This past summer Captain Ron and a crew of four made a two-night passage from Coos Bay to San Francisco Bay, including rounding Cape Mendocino in 7-foot following seas. Three of those four crew members will be on the Ha-Ha, one of whom is an instructor for his local sailing club in Seattle.

Amazing Grace III — Island Packet 440 Kim and Lena Eddy

Seattle / San Diego (2019, 2020, 2022) 'Master and Commander' Kim, 70, fell in love with sailing while serving in the US Navy in the early '70s. While doing the last Ha-Ha he fell in love with Lena, one of three crewmembers he recruited from the Ha-Ha Crew List. "On July 1 Lena and I drove to Las Vegas, wrapped the anchor chain around each other, and both said, "I do." Lena has retired from Teaching to become a full-time cruiser with me.

"My additional crew will be Peter Morris, 74, a retired YMCA Director; and Dave Craig, 71, also a retired School Teacher. I've had the privilege of sailing with both of them during the last 30 years. This will be Peter's second Ha-Ha and Dave's first. Our youngest crew member will be Lena's niece, Sarabelle Parra, 28, from Minot, North Dakota. She's a Vehicle Maintenance Technician who is very excited to be doing her first long-distance sail.

"If you counted the semi-unofficial 'Nada Ha-Ha' hosted by Assistant Poobah Patsy Verhoeven in the Covid year of 2020, this will be *Amazing Grace's* fourth Ha-Ha since 2019. In past years I've also sailed back to the Pacific Northwest, but this year we'll be exploring Southern California. My longest passage to date has been a solo non-stop passage from Cabo to Seattle in May of 2020. It took 28 days — and a real toll on my body!

"My dream destination is wherever the boat happens to be, although going west is something Lena and I are contemplating. I'm certainly not left-handed as it makes simple tasks so much more difficult."



Amizade - Mike, Wren & Jennifer

*Amizade — Bavaria 47 Mike and Jennifer Ward Port Townsend, WA / Tonasket, WA (2008)

Michael, 56, is a Fisheries Ecologist, while spouse Jennifer is an Educator. Their crew will be Leia Ward, 10, a Student of Life.

"The motivation for our current cruising adventure comes from a conversation on a dock in Auckland's Westhaven Marina in 2010 at the end of our last Pacific crossing. I was telling a Kiwi sailor "The best thing I've ever done is go cruising on a bluewater sailboat."

"That's the second best thing I've ever done," responded the father of a couple of grown kids. "The best thing is cruising with kids. You should try it!"

"Since then Jennifer and I endeavored to do just that, by getting married, starting a family, and working hard to find and buy our next boat. Finally, here we are, ready to start an epic kid-cruise. Naturally, we are very keen to meet and buddyboat with the other kid boats in the fleet."

Mike has been sailing his whole life, and Jennifer has been sailing since she prepared to join Mike in Tahiti on his previous boat, the Kelly-Peterson 44 *Thin Wolf* at the end of the 2009 Pacific Puddle Jump. Jennifer then cruised the next 5,000 miles from Papeete to Auckland with Mike. Wren is being raised as a 'boat kid' by sailing, white-water rafting, and canoeing ever since she was a toddler.

"We purchased our 2000 Bavaria 47 *Amizade* in Puerto Vallarta in January of 2023," reports Mike, "then sailed her uphill in preparation for the 2023 Ha-Ha. Alas, relentless conditions north of Point Conception turned us back. Unable to find a suitable slip in Southern California, we berthed in Ensenada for the summer.

In addition to *Amizade*, we previously co-owned the Kelly Peterson *Thin Wolf* with acclaimed artist Luke Tornatzky. We

sailed her in the 2008 Baja Ha-Ha and the 2009 Pacific Puddle Jump. Mike's most recent rally was double-handing in the Salish 100 in 2022 with a Compaq-16. The Wards have also explored the San Juan Islands on charter boats and try to take an annual multi-day whitewater rafting trip on one of the rivers in the Pacific Northwest.

Mike's longest passage was 3000.0 miles — to the tenth of a mile! — from Puerto Vallarta to Hiva Oa in 2009. Jennifer's longest sailing passage was a 1,500 mile passage from Tonga's Ha'apai Islands to the Bay of Islands in New Zealand – but that doesn't count her thousands of miles at sea on fishing boats in Bristol Bay and the Gulf of Alaska. Wren's longest passage so far was across Georgia Strait from the Salt Springs Islands to Vancouver, although she's planning to cruise out to the Island of the Blue Dolphin next month.

"After the Ha-Ha, we plan to cruise Mexico until the spring of 2024. If all goes well, we'll follow our dream of crossing the Pacific as a 'kid boat'. Otherwise, we'll either gunkhole back to the Southern California bight or sail to Puget Sound via Hawaii."

Jen is a lefty. Both Jen and Mike are meditators.

Wren's favorite dessert is *helados de yogurt*, which she recently discovered in Ensenada.

Angelique — Columbia 57 Andy Kurtz Lahaina, Maui / Sebastopol

Andy, 64, is a retired Business Owner and Captain. He expects to have a crew of five including Kazuko Jones, Kim Brazeau and Michael Scott, 67.

"I've been sailing and a boat owner since I was 8," reports Andy. "I can't keep track of all the boats I've owned, but I believe *Angelique* is number eight. I've owned her for 16 years, during which time I've rebuilt everything but her hull.

"My longest singlehanded passage has been 27 days from Samoa to Hawaii, but I did a passage as the captain of a 151-ft square rigged ship with a crew of about 30.

"I have no plans to return to anywhere after the Ha-Ha, so I'll go wherever the winds and my mood take me. I did have a photo of exotic Raja Ampat, Indonesia in my 'in box' for the last 10 years I was working, so I guess I'll eventually go there. Raja Ampat is considered to be the global center of tropical marine biodiversity.

"If I had a sailing hero it would probably be Captain Ron, a happy-go-lucky goof with a heart of gold. Of course, the late Jimmy Buffet is every sailor's hero or should be.

"Having ice cream 1,000 miles from

shore is the height of decadence, so I guess that's my favorite dessert. While I'm not left-handed, I do seem to still be on the wrong side of a lot of stuff.

"I may be the only guy on the Ha-Ha who has actually been attacked by a pirate. The G-rated version of that story will cost a beer. The R-rated version could only be told after I've had a few beers.

Ha-Ha History Lesson: When introduced in 1973, the William Tripp designed Columbia 57 was the largest production yacht in the world. Twelve of them were built, one of which was owned by Bay Area sailing legend Irving Loube of Bravura fame. Loube used to have his 57 shuttled between Northern and Southern California in the summer so he could do a maximum number of races. He later went on to great success with a series of custom racing yachts named Bravura.

Columbia Yachts was started as Glass Laminates by Dick Valdes and Maurice Threinen in 1958 when the company made camper shells and canoes for Sears. Eventually, they began to produce sailboats in almost every foot range. By the late 1960s Columbia was the biggest sailboat manufacturer in the world, with plants all over the globe. The founders eventually sold Columbia to the Whittaker Corporation, with Valdez staying on as president. Whittaker would later acquire Bertram Yachts, Trojan Yachts, Riva, Desco Marine, Kettenburg, Balboa Marine, and Frank Butler's Coronado Yachts. Valdez left in 1972, after which Whittaker's marine interests went into steep decline. After a year at Whittaker, Butler started what was to become the wildly successful Catalina line of sailboats.

Will, 28, is in the Software field. Emily

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is — get this — a Pipefitter. The Poobah salutes women in the Trades. William and Emily will doublehand.

"We have been sailing together, always with our four-legged companion Ludog, for the past 12 years," they say. "So far our sailing has been on the East Coast, in the Caribbean, and on the Great Lakes, so we're eager to see what the West Coast has to offer. The bonfire story we like to tell is of when we had no option but to go the wrong way through a Force 8 gale in the Exumas during the off-season. What a ride that was!

"Early this summer we purchased the most recent of the three boats we've owned, the spacious Catalina/Morgan 440. We are very proud of her. We have not done a Ha-Ha before and are signing up after many personal recommendations. After the Ha-Ha we plan to explore the Sea of Cortez for the remainder of the fair weather season. After that, who knows?

"Our dream is to circumnavigate, and the more we are looking into all the potential destinations, the harder it is to say which one represents the most dreamlike. French Polynesia is a likely candidate.

"Our dream boat is the Sirius 40DS with the lifting keel, but in all honesty, we think our 440 is right up there. Skip Novak, who did four Whitbread Around the World Races and for the last 20 years has been doing charters in Antarctica, is our sailing hero. The fictional Martin Harvey being the second.

"A nicely made Tiramisu is our favorite dessert. Both of us are right-handed and neither have fun nicknames, but we have an infinite number for our dog.

"We are really looking forward to the Ha-Ha!"

Ha-Ha Factoid: Retired Navy fighterpilot Roger Can't Remember his last name, was a fixture at Two Harbors on Catalina with his Catalina/Morgan 440 about 12 or 15 years ago. Then he did a Ha-Ha with her, then a circumnavigation. He met a woman in the Canaries the day before he was going to cross the Atlantic, and apparently believing in love at first sight, and asked her to marry him. She said 'yes'. They crossed together and got married. Anybody know where Roger is now?

Another Cheeseburger in Paradise Hunter 41 Terry Wasik Verdi. NV (2019)

Terry, at the ripe old age of 75, same as the Poobah, is still Building Luxury Custom Homes in the Reno area. As his wife Barbara will not be making the trip, his First Mate will be daughter Kendra Doyle, a Graphic Designer at Palisades Tahoe Ski Area. She has worked extensively with Terry on all aspects of the *Cheeseburger's* systems.

Other crew will be Linda Humphrey, a retired Anesthesiologist and Realtor who has joined Terry and Barbara for sailing expeditions to Tahiti, Tonga, the Grenadines, the San Juan Islands, and other places. Rounding out the crew will be Patrick North, 75, an Accountant who is a longtime friend and who has sailed many places in the world as well as having done a Baja Bash.

Shortly after retiring from military service in 1969, Terry found himself living in Hawaii. He obtained a captain's license and ran fishing charters out of Honolulu. While he learned many skills during that time, the one voted most appreciated by the crew was his ability to pull a tuna from the water and turn it into sashimi on the spot, complete with wasabi and dipping sauce.

A subsequent marriage and move to Reno prompted a change in direction, although Terry never lost his love for the sea. He has owned, maintained, and operated a sailboat — this one is *Cheeseburger* #2 — on Lake Tahoe for 25 years. You can find him there every weekend, and often on weekdays between Memorial Day and Labor Day, working on his many projects or taking his numerous friends out for a cruise. Winters bring frequent trips up to the Lake to shovel the snow off the deck, although mysteriously not as many friends come along.

Terry has been sailing for 50 years, during which time he's owned four boats. He's had his Hunter 41 for 14 years and considers her "a great boat". Terry has plenty of offshore chops, having done two Puddle Jumps to Tahiti and back to Honolulu, as well as five Baja Bashes. After the Ha-Ha he plans to hang in La Paz for the winter.

Terry's dream destination is Tahiti, and he'd love to do it aboard a Jeanneau 50. His sailing hero is Jock McClain. Jock from long ago at the San Francisco Boat Works?

"Work hard and play hard" is Terry's philosophy. He's a left-hander who enjoys rum for dessert.

Aquila of Vancouver — Young Sun 43 Aaron Sugrue and Linda LaFontaine Vancouver, BC

Aaron, 59, is a retired Critical Care Flight Paramedic. Spouse Linda is a retired Paramedic Supervisor. They will be sailing with Shayne Price, 52, and with Nova, their 5-year-old 73 lb. Bernedoodle who loves to sail but loves beaches and hikes even more.

The Ron Amy design from 1978 was handed down from Aaron's parents, who sailed the world with her for eight years.

"The boat was then stored in a shed for roughly 13 years before she was gifted to us." Aaron and Linda have been restoring her for the past 11 years including living aboard the past 3 while sailing and

exploring the coast of British Columbia. They intend to circumnavigate with her.

"We crewed from Los Frailes to San Blas, Mexico in January 2023 on a friend's boat, and recently circumnavigated Vancouver Island.

"Our plan called for us to depart Neah Bay on September 8, en route to the Ha-Ha. After the Ha-Ha we intend to enjoy Mexico for a while then head south, either through the Panama Canal or off to the South Pacific, we haven't decided yet.

"We are a very late entry," reports the couple, "we'll have to tell everyone about it over sundowners."

*Ara — X-Yacht 46 (W) Nigel and Yulia Beck San Francisco

Nigel, 53, is an Executive, as is Yulia. Aaron, 7, is a Student of Life. Crew will be Kenneth, 64, and Patty Hall. Yulia and Nigel are the only married couple in the Ha-Ha who met in a Georgian restaurant in Moscow. Yulia was born in Ukraine and Nigel in Canada. They spent five years on opposite sides of the Atlantic before moving to San Francisco in 2011 and getting married.

The couple started sailing together in 2006. Since then they've been up and down the East Coast from Rhode Island to Maine and in both directions between Florida and New York. The latter is their longest trip to date. Nigel and Yulia have also sailed in the Caribbean, while Nigel has sailed the Arctic, and Yulia has raced on the Solent in England.

In the spring of 2021, the couple brought *Ara* down the coast from San Francisco to Oxnard with young Aaron, 5 at the time, as crew. Yulia's dream destinations are Mexico and the Caribbean, while Nigel pines for the Arctic. Talk about conflicting dreams.

Their favorite quote at the moment is, "To the victor, the spoils." But only in ancient Greek.









STEERING THE DREAM



Nigel and Yulia eschew nicknames, but the right-handers agree that chocolate is best for dessert.

The word 'Ara' has at least 30 different meanings, the most common being 'king' and 'brings rain'. But it's also a constellation in the southern hemisphere.

The couple's hero is "nutcase" H.W. Tillman, often considered the greatest explorer and adventurer of the 20th Century. Tillman served with distinction in World War I, and fought behind enemy lines in World War II. Between the wars, he explored and climbed the remote peaks of the Himalayas. He didn't take up sailing until after World War II, when he bought the ancient gaff-rigged Bristol Channel Cutter Mischief. He sailed that classic little yacht for 20 years, often in the Arctic and Antarctic waters. Noted for being self-effacing, Tillman wrote 15 highly respected travel books. He was lost at sea while sailing aboard a poorlymaintained vacht headed toward another mountain he hadn't climbed.

**Attitude — Hans Christian 4750 Alex and Susan Jordan Alameda / Oakland

Alex, 58, is a Principal in Blue Pelican Marine, having previously worked for West Marine when there were only three stores, and later Svendsens for 17 years. Susan is a retired CPA partner who specialized in trusts and estates. One of their crew will be son Brendan, 23, who is a student at Laney College in Oakland. The rest of their crew will be Doug and Pollie Robbins, and their offspring Will, 12, and Margaret, 11. The Robbins live aboard their Catalina 42 in Sausalito.

"I've been sailing since I was six years old," says Alex, "and spent much of my life sailing an Islander 30 that my father bought new in 1974." Susan has been sailing since she met Alex in 1995, and over the years they have sailed together in the Exumas, Bahamas, and the Caribbean from the BVIs to Grenada. She just completed the US Sailing BK and BC courses at Club Nautique.

"Attitude is the fifth boat we've owned," Alex says. "We bought her in Newport Beach last year and have been retrofitting and upgrading her ever since. Previous owner Neil Farley did the Ha-Ha with her in 2010."

When you think of Hans Christian yachts you probably think of heavy boats with massive amounts of exterior wood. Not the 4750 *Attitude*, a blue-hulled beauty launched in 1999. On the outside she's a very modern-looking center-cockpit yacht, but with a rich wood interior typical of previous generations of Hans Christians.

Alex's favorite movies are *Tommy Boy* followed closely by *Captain Ron*. His favorite singer David Bowie, his favorite food is a good rib-eye. He is a huge history buff who loves Shakespeare, Delac-

roix, and author Dumas. Susan's favorite movie is *The Wizard of Oz* and her favorite music group is Earth, Wind, and Fire. Brendan likes Bob Marley and is a fan of UFC mixed martial arts fighting, especially Connor McGregor. He is also an off-grid prepper who likes Bushcraft. His favorite movie is *Fox and the Hound* and his current favorite series is *Breaking Bad*.

Spider, a two-year-old mixed Chihuahua terrier is the ship's dog. She likes left-over rib-eye and her favorite movie is *Puss 'n Boots*.

After the Ha-Ha, the Jordans will be joined by their daughter Tori, and they will head north to Marina Puerto Escondido just south of Loreto on the Sea of Cortez. But the Bahamas is their dream destination.

The Jordans live in the Oakland hills, an area the Poobah knows well as his high school stomping grounds. They even attended the same high school as the Poobah, although nearly two decades later.

AudreyAnna Hope — Catalina 42 MKII Jim Ephraim Oak Park, IL / Sugar Grove, IL

Jim, 61, is an Engineer and General Manager of a manufacturing company in Chicago. His crew will be John Santon, who did the Ha-Ha last year on his Hunter 356 *Wild Grace*; they are looking for a third crewmember.

Jim learned to sail in 1988 while in grad school in Boston, and crewed on racing boats off Cape Ann. He also sailed an Ericson 30 out of Chicago in the 1990s and lived and sailed in and out of San Diego with his family for over 12 years. He's always dreamed of longer voyages.

"Because *AudreyAnna Hope's* past owners focused on racing, she was in need of my help preparing and outfitting her for open waters," Jim says. "The start of the Ha-Ha gave me both the inspiration and a deadline to get her ready. My longest passages up to this point have been across Lake Michigan, so I am grateful to be able to make the Baja journey with such an experienced group of sailors.

"After the Ha-Ha I hope to keep the boat in the Sea of Cortez throughout the winter, visiting her as often as possible, and with my boat partner Steve Brodt planning our next leg to — well, we don't know where. This brings us to our favorite quote, which is by David Bowie: "I don't know where I'm going from here, but I promise it won't be boring".

"Our favorite poem is *One Ship Sails East* by Ella Wheeler Wilcox. The Poobah was not aware that people still had favorite poems.

"The AudreyAnna Hope is our dreamboat come true," Jim reports, "and the Ha-Ha will be the start of fulfilling our dream of a journey to Mexico, along the Central America coast, and through the Panama Canal."

August Dream — Jeanneau Sun Odyssey 439 Jason and Alyssa Bowman Long Beach / Star, Idaho (2022)

Jason, 55, is Self-Employed as is his spouse Alyssa. Their crew will be Michelle Hamilton, who is Self-Employed; Mike Clark, 57, a Sales Manager; and Rich Landaal, 59, a Mechanic.

"My husband and I have been sailing for a relatively short time," reports Alyssa. "We've co-owned *August Dream*, our second boat, for 3 1/2 years. Our first boat was a daysailer since we live in Idaho and only have access to nearby lakes.

"Jason sailed his first Ha-Ha last year with our boat partner. This year he and I will be doing it with some great friends from Arizona. After the Ha-Ha we're taking the boat to La Paz, which will be her base for exploring a second winter in the Sea of Cortez. To date, my longest passage has been from Long Beach to Ensenada.

"Our dream destination has changed so many times over the last two decades that we now only think about the next six months. By the time we set sail for Cabo we should be Empty Nesters, so I assume we'll continue to update our dream destinations on the way down Baja.

"Here's some big sailing news. Jared, our boat partner, and we have ordered a Moody 54DS. She's to be delivered in Germany in December. But that's a long story.

"I'm currently listening to a podcast on the history of pirates. I'm really impressed with Sir Francis Drake."

Barramundi — Seawind 1000 Cat Steve and Pam Ellsworth San Diego / Lake Havasu (2010)

Steve, 70, is the retired President of an Unspecified Company, while Pam, bless her altruistic heart, was a Nurse before

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she retired. Their son Jeff, 48, a Production Manager, will be along as crew.

Steve and Pam have been lake boating since 1978. They started sailing on friends' boats on the ocean in 1990 and joined the Windward Sailing Club in 1997 in part to get instruction.

In 2002 they purchased *Barramundi* new. She remains their dream boat, having already taken her on the 2010 Ha-Ha and seven months of cruising in Mexico, as well as many trips in Southern California. After the Ha-Ha they plan to explore the Sea of Cortez.

Their dream destination is La Cruz, and their sailing hero is Josh Slocum, the first person to circumnavigate single-handed and a terrific author. Jeff likes the nickname 'Jefe', Crème Brûlée for dessert, and the quote, 'Live half your dreams, dream half your life." Pam is left-handed, so watch out.

Barramundi aka Asian sea bass, is a species of tropical marine fin fish. The species is widely distributed in the Indo-West Pacific region from South Asia to Papua New Guinea and Northern Australia. The fish is known as pla kapong in Thai and as bhetki in Bengali. Something to remember.

Bear North — Hans Christian 48 Frank Kortbeek and Judy Townsend Edmonton, Alberta, Canada

Frank, 61, is an Orthopedic Surgeon; spouse Judy Townsend is a retired Physiatrist. A what? Physiatrists are specialist physicians who treat patients who have had injuries or suffer from disabilities that affect physical and cognitive functioning. Their two crew will be brother and co-owner of *Bear North* John Kortbeek, 63 a retired General Surgeon; and sister-in-law Vici Kortbeek, a Nurse. *Bear North* is going to be like a floating health center where any and all ills can be treated.

"My brother John and I were taught to sail by our father on Lake Wabamun, a prairie lake just outside Edmonton city limits," reports Frank. We started with dinghies such as a Laser and 505s, then small catamarans. We have raced locally, provincially, and at odd international events ever since. We slowly moved on to bigger boats doing charters on the coast.

"In 2010 we began our big boat project with a Hans Christian 48 that had been started in Thailand and was the last 48 hull the company laid. She was eventually finished eight years later by First Yachts in Vancouver.

"While we have some offshore experience circumnavigating Vancouver Island and up to Observatory Inlet near Ketchikan, and my brother to Hawaii from Victoria, we've never done a Ha-Ha. We're really looking forward to it. Afterward, we plan to spend some time in the Sea of Cortez, then cross the Pacific a couple of years later.

"As long as we're sailing, we think we're living our dream. In addition to the normal sailing heroes such as Shackleton and Slocum, we've also always admired local Bill Norrie, who did a circumnavigation via the five Southern Capes.

"Of course I'm left-handed, but the rest of the crew can't seem to adjust. That's why they've put me in charge.

"Our nightly ritual involves anything chocolate. It's also noteworthy that after 60+ years, brother John, thanks to computer recipes and modern technology, now has outstanding culinary skills with a crock pot."



Ber Necessity - Wendy & Berah

Ber Necessity — Columbia 41 (W) Wendy and Berah Taylor Los Angeles / Lake Forest

Berah, 59, is a Construction Estimator at Kaiser. He's known there as the 'Berah of Bad News'! "We met online," says Wendy. "I knew he was the man for me when he picked me up on his Harley wearing a kilt. After all, you can kiss the Irish, but it's a Scotsman you want to take home."

Their crew will be Miles and Kathy Tralle, who met about 20 years ago. Within three months Kathy moved in with Miles on his Cheoy Lee 32, and they became a big part of the Bay Area Sailing scene.

"My Ber is a soft-spoken nerd, but he's my nerd," says Wendy. "Berah is an amazing Skipper and a MacGyver of the sea. He has his ASA 101,103,104 certificates, we both have our California Boater cards, and we've both logged tons of time on the water.

"We have been sailing together ever since we met in 2012. We first bought a Catalina 27 named *Sea Lass* and sailed her all up and down the coast from LA Harbor to Dana Point and all points in between. We loved that little boat!! Right before Covid, we found Ber's new favorite girl, his necessity, our Columbia 41 ketch we call *Ber Necessity*. She's been his project and she's an amazing boat. She's big

and sturdy, very fun to sail, and roomy and comfy. We found her in Santa Barbara and have sailed her all over the Channel Islands and up and down the coast from Santa Barbara to San Diego.

"Although I turned 60 last November," says Wendy, "I feel as though I'm 40 even though I made a career of partying with the Marines on my birthday — and their birthdays. My real career is IT, but now I own a small real estate agency. I also love watching dogs, helping the less fortunate, and volunteering. With my red hair — I soak it in the blood of my enemies every night — most people think I'm Irish. My green eyes and wild child streak reinforce that impression. But I'm actually Lebanese. I'm a pretty darn good sailor who loves to take the boat in and out of the slip and just being at the helm. Ber and I make a great team.

"We have sailed the Kingdom of Tonga with the amazing world sailor and author John Kretschmer. We both love all of his books and we both love all desserts. Ber's dream is to be cruising Kiribati and the South Pacific, but I'll be happy anywhere he is. Eewww, isn't that sappy? As you can imagine, I'm especially excited to participate in the Here to Eternity Kissing Contest in the surf at Cabo San Lucas. Woo-hoo!

Bibi — Cal 3-46 Eric Mizrahi Marina del Rey / Redondo Beach

Eric, 60, is a Physician. His crew will be Andy Fraga, Jr, 44, a Musician/Realtor; Gary Novak, 50, another Musician; and Marty Danhi, 50, a Mechanic.

"I started sailing in 1979 at the age of 16 at UCLA," reports Eric. "I took and taught all of the dinghy sailing classes, which included the Advanced level. I also completed the ASA 101, 103 and 104 courses, and obtained my Bareboat Skipper's license.

"My first boat was *Oliver's Travels*, a beautiful and nimble Newport 30 designed by Gary Mull. I mainly sailed her to Catalina for about 10 years. I sold her to a retired Naval Officer and bought *Quiet Times*, which I have renamed *Bibi* after my sister.

"Originally a ketch, I re-rigged *Bibi* as a cutter for future singlehanded bluewater sailing. Built in 1977 her previous owners sailed her to the Pacific Northwest, the Caribbean, and the South Pacific. After buying her, I sailed her down from San Francisco and took her to Catalina before starting a two-year retrofit. She's my dream boat.

"That sail from San Francisco was my longest passage to date, and the Ha-Ha will be my next adventure. After that, I plan to singlehand her to La Paz. Eventually, I hope to head for Hawaii and French Polynesia, or directly to French Polynesia. (Poobah Tip: Unless you like sailing hard



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on the wind, direct to French Polynesia is 'more betta'.)

The right-hander who is sometimes called 'The Chosen One' or 'Kiki' "feels blessed and infinitely grateful that he has "amazing friends and sailing in my life". An aspiring singlehander, it's no wonder his sailing hero is Bernard Moitessier. When Eric gets to Cabo he'll get to see the beach where Bernard lost *Joshua* in 1981 and sold her for \$1. Fortunately, *Joshua* has been completely restored and is now actively sailed off France.

'Don't let others judge you by their own limitations,' Eric will tell you between spoonful's of either vanilla Swiss almond ice cream or bites of "great" watermelon.

Blue Safari — Leopard 40 Cat Mark and Lisa Wolford San Diego / Escondido

Mark, 53, is an Engineer, while Lisa is a Finance Director. Both are still working. Their crew will be Tom Priest, 60, who has a bundle of ocean miles to his credit, Jeff Cerjan, 51, and Shelley Morton.

Mark has been sailing for 30 years and previously owned a 1990 Hunter 42. But he and Lisa fell in love with catamarans and the sailing lifestyle during several sailing vacations in the British Virgin Islands. So in November of 2017, they purchased *Blue Safari*, a new Leopard 40 cat. Their dream was always to take a two to three-year sabbatical and sail the South Pacific. What better way to start than with the Baja Ha-Ha?

"We want to sail 'everywhere' on *Blue Safari*, which is our dream boat. Cats aren't inexpensive," they say, "but the real cost of anything is the amount of life you exchange for it.

"We love cheesecake, and use forks with our right hands when we eat it."

Boat Bum Gal — Nicholson 38 Sandra Barnes Long Beach / Bakersfield

Sandra lists her Occupation as a "Tap Dancing Fruit Cake". She'll have two crew. Drew Bielawski, 64; and Bryan Hail, 45, a Laboratory Manager.

"I've been sailing for approximately 10 years, during which time I've owned two boats. I have owned my beloved John Alden designed Nicholson 38 ketch for seven years. I was off the boat for a little over a year because of a boat custody battle. I'm happy to say that I won her back.

"Although I have never participated in the Ha-Ha, I have always contemplated engaging in this death-defying activity. So this year I thought, 'What the heck?'

After Cabo my plans are to head to La Paz, and then see where the wind takes us. My dream destination is the Caribbean, and there is a good chance that I will ultimately achieve my goal."

"I have my dream boat. It has been a lot of work, but it's been worth it.

"My sailing hero . . . Capt Ron, of course. "Don't worry," he said when on a collision course with a ship, "he'll get out of the way. I learned that driving the Saratoga.

"But I'd like everyone to know that I am so happy to be participating in this year's Ha-Ha, and am very fortunate to have two great guys joining us in the adventure."



Boundless - Naiby, Dan & Belina

*Boundless — Shannon 43 Dan Chase and Naiby Hilton Venice Beach / Punta Uva, Costa Rica

Dan, 57, is a semi-retired Producer/Engineer in the music biz and is now a Contractor/Property Manager on the Westside of Los Angeles. He is also an ABYC certified Electrician and owns a Yacht Management company. Naiby is a classically-trained Private Chef from Costa Rica. They're doing their first Ha-Ha with their second daughter, Chief Medical Officer and Ambiance Coordinator Belina, 8, a Student of Life. A third-grader, Belina will be homeschooled on the boat.

Dan is also an accomplished drummer and DJ, and the whole family has regularly attended the Burning Man Arts Festival in Nevada. They have helped design and fabricate large interactive art installations. "The Burning Man festival involves principles that we find are related to sailing and cruising culture," says Dan. "Radical self-reliance, communal effort, civic responsibility, leaving no trace, immediacy, and so forth. We see these as a reflection of the cruising community's ethos."

Dan started sailing during the years he lived in the Virgin Islands and has continued chartering catamarans with extended family members over the years in the BVI's, Belize, Bahamas, Thailand, and French Polynesia. After the Ha-Ha they

Belina loves art and science and is squealing with delight about the opportunity to live on a boat and explore. She has been attending a Spanish immersion elementary school and speaks fluent Spanish, which will certainly help for this cruise.

"Aside from the major subjects Belina will study for third grade," says Naiby, "we've used an AI program to create an engaging Earth Science and Biology curriculum incorporating all of the unique locations we'll be visiting during our trip. It took the program about 15 seconds to do that.

"We've been preparing for this trip for years, upgrading much of the major gear on the boat. We've got new sails coming in, new rigging, a wind vane, a new anchor plan, and better fishing gear. The refit is going well, although there will certainly be some items that we won't get to before the Ha-Ha start. We can't wait to put our boat and ourselves to the test."

Buttercup — Jeanneau SO 43DS (W) Ryan Sabin and Megan Lilly Salt Lake, UT

Ryan, 48, is a Software Engineer who can't be any more specific than to say he works in Cyber Security. Megan, who had "the best night of my life" attending a recent Taylor Swift Eras show, is an Executive Assistant. "A distant second to that Swift show were the nights I spent raising four ginger children".

The couple will have three crew, two of which are offspring. "Alek Sabin, 30, Sells Toothpaste for a living, and likes to eat oysters and tell stories. Amber Sabin, 21, is a Full-Time College Dropout. "When she's not busy being a Dropout she works as a River Rafting Guide in the Summer and a Ski and Snowmobiling Guide in the winter." The third crewmember is Huston Evans, 30, who takes photos of little girls. "Not those kind, you creeps," he says, "I'm a dance photographer. I'm also a vir-

Brad has been sailing for about 45 years. He sailed to New Zealand via Hawaii, Samoa, and Tonga in 1980, but on three different boats. It was on those trips he learned to use a sextant, and hopes to pick the skill up again on the Ha-Ha.

"April has been with me for all my boats," Brad reports. "She does all the small things that make boat life easier. She'll steer, pull lines, grab the mooring wand, share the cooking, organize, ask me what I want, and provide the encouragement we often need. Most importantly, she is there with me."

A boat owner for 15 years, *California Stars*, which Brad has owned for seven years, is his second boat. "She is a Sparkman & Stephens design that was built by Benello in Livorno, Italy in 1970," he says. "She did a circumnavigation and also competed in the 1977 TransPac. She

also appeared in a Time-Life book about boat handling way back in 1975.

"I first met her in San Diego in 2012 and took the opportunity to buy her in Loreto in 2017. I cruised her to La Paz and then over to Mazatlán before bringing her up to California in November of 2018.

"I own my dream boat. She is nowhere near perfection, but I've added some cruising amenities and she's functional. She sails well, makes water, provides hot showers, and keeps the beer cold. And she is reliable with a comfortable motion.

"I'm a right-handed Ultimate Frisbee player in case anyone wants to get a game going, and I like peach cobbler.

"No definite plans after the Ha-Ha except to be in Mazatlán on April 8, 2024. My dream destination would be Long Beach — after a cruise that satisfied my cruising desire."



Chat de Mer - Eve & Steve

Chat de Mer — FP Belize 43 Cat Steve Lindley and Eve Carlson Oyster Point / Mountain View

Steve, 61, is a Psychiatrist, while spouse Eve is a Research Psychologist. They will have Nancy Ibison as crew.

Steve has been sailing since he was a child. Before acquiring their Fountain Pajot 43 cat he owned a 22-ft monohull and a 30-ft monohull. Eve has been sailing with Steve for about 20 years.

"What's unusual about our cat is that she was built in France in 2002, so we have extra fun sourcing spare parts." This even though over 200 of the FP 43s were built and can be found in all corners of the world.

"Our longest passage to date was from Oyster Point Marina, near SFO, to the Channel Islands. This will be our first Ha-Ha.

"After the Ha-Ha we plan to sail to Puerto Vallarta, which will be *Chat de Mer's* home for the foreseeable future.

"We own our dream boat, but our

dream destination would be French Polynesia."

Circe — Islander Freeport 41 Dave and Kelly Kendall Owl Harbor, Isleton (2009, 2013)


Dave, 57, will be the only Underwater Bridge Inspector in this year's fleet. Kelly is a retired Registered Nurse and Health Inspector. Friend Leslie Skarshaug, an Accounting Officer, as well as an adrenaline junkie and 'adventure firstie' will be their crew.

Dave has been in or under the water most of his life and isn't happy if his fingers aren't wrinkly. He has sailed extensively on San Francisco Bay and in the Delta. He's also crewed on other people's boats on two Ha-Ha's, the Ha-Ha route at a different time of year, and one "adventurous" Tehuantepec crossing that involved jumping overboard to clean the waterline and swim with a turtle.

Kelly has sailed with Dave on San Francisco Bay and in the Delta, and was with Dave on the Tehuantepec crossing to El Salvador, and has done the Ha-Ha route on a friend's boat. But this will be her first Ha-Ha. Kelly's nursing specialty was a Health Facility Evaluator Nurse with the State, a title that sent other nurses running to the break room with their 'illegal' water bottles. Loreto is home to two marinas, the smaller being Loreto marina right in town and the larger is the new and upscale Marina Puerto Escondido. Charters and tour operators can be found in both locations.











Kelly loves roller coasters, baking, reading, and naps.

Dave and Kelly have owned seven sailboats. "At one point we owned three boats at the same time," remembers Kelly, "and I had to tell Dave I never again wanted to hear the words 'boat' and 'investment' in the same sentence." They've owned *Circe* for five years. They particularly like that she has a drop-down swim ladder built into the transom.

The dream boat for both Dave and Kelly would be a Passport 40. Dave would like to take one to the dive paradise of Palau, while Kelly would prefer the San Blas Islands of Panama. Dave's sailing hero is Tania Aebi, who did a 99% solo circumnavigation on a 26-footer. She started as an 18-year-old and finished three years later in 1987. Kelly's hero is Holly Martin, the Wind Hippie sailing blogger.

Dave's favorite quote is from Eleanor Roosevelt: "You must do the thing you think you can't do." Kelly's favorite is: 'I'm always disappointed when liar's pants don't actually catch on fire'."

Dave goes for Tiramisu, while Kelly is a Crème Brûlée girl. Circe, no relation to Cercei Lannister of Game of Thrones fame, was a minor Greek goddess and powerful female sorceress able to concoct powerful potions, and the power to hide the sun and the moon as she willed. While we won't be calling on her powers any time soon, we do hope she carries us safely on our explorations of the Sea of Cortez and beyond.



Contagious - Declan & Tracy

Contagious — Beneteau Oceanis 46.1 Declan and Tracy Sacre Vancouver, BC

Declan, 53, is in Sales, while Tracy is, bless her heart, is a Registered Nurse. Their four crew include and Dave Ryley, 40, Thomas Wood, 37 and Victoria Wood.

Declan has been sailing his whole life, first on the Great Lakes with his family,

then after moving to Vancouver at a young age he started racing out of the West Vancouver YC in a number of events and has raced around Vancouver Island twice. Tracy accompanied him on many of these races as crew.

Contagious is a 2019 Beneteau 46.1 which they bought spanking new in 2019.

"We haven't done a Ha-Ha yet, but are excited about the adventure. When we finish the race we plan on cruising up into the Sea of Cortez until April." 'Race'? The Ha-Ha is more of a rally where the idea is to sail with friends, not beat them. But times are taken and awards given.

Capt Declan is a left-hander who, like Tracy, would like to cruise the world aboard their dream boat — which they now own. The Beneteau 46.1 is an upgrade of the Beneteau 45, which was Beneteau's biggest seller in the world.

Not a common name in the United States, Declan means 'messenger' in Greek, and 'man of prayer' or 'man of goodness' in Irish.

Convergence — Wylie 65 (W) Randy Repass & Sally-Christine Rodgers Santa Cruz

Randy, 79, describes himself as a "Crowd Pleaser". Sally-Christine identifies as "the Captain's Care Giver", although she's also the author of *Convergence: A Voyage Through French Polynesia* and several other books. Their three crew include son Kent-Harris Repass, 28; Grant Smith, 27; and Emily Brouwer.

Perhaps Randy should be better known for selling nylon rope out of his garage in 1968, and eventually turning that enterprise into West Marine, which now has 247 marine supply stores. He took the company public after a number of years, and in 2017 it was acquired by private equity for \$338 million.

The Poobah remembers meeting Randy for the first time in 1977. It was after hours at the first West Marine store in Palo Alto of all places, and Randy was busy at the grunt work of putting price tags on marine knives. The Poobah was selling ads for the just-founded *Latitude* 38. Those were the days.

Like a lot of people who have become wealthy, Randy and Sally-Christine have two homes. But here is where they differ from most affluent people. Instead of a mansion, their first residence was an 850 sq ft, one-bedroom, one-bath cabin. They milled the wood for it, raised the walls by hand with a bunch of sailing buddies, and finished it off with the help of a carpenter. They still live in the cabin except in the summer. With an expanding family, they eventually had additional living quarters built on their land.

More recently they built another cabin on a very small island in the Pacific Northwest. They cut down the trees, and while they had a contractor, they did as much design and hands-on work as they could.

But get this, they've been proudly living off the grid at both their residences since 1989-24 years of solar power.

More importantly, between them Randy and Sally-Christine have owned over 10 boats over the years, the biggest and latest being the unique Wylie 65 Convergence built by Westerly Marine. Among her unusual features are that she has a free-standing carbon fiber mast with a wishbone boom, no jib, a big windowed pilothouse with inside steering, and a 'beach deck' where the dinghy can be stored. She's plenty fast, too.

Randy and Sally-Christine started a circumnavigation in 2004, and 19 years later all they have left to complete the loop is the Barra de Navidad to Santa Cruz leg. But first Randy and *Convergence* are intending to buddy boat north with the Poobah and *Profligate* in early October to get to the San Diego starting line.



Counting Stars - Rosario & Denis

Counting Stars — Whitby 42 Denis Heinrichs and Rosario Passos Port Moody, BC

Denis, 55, is a Computer Programmer while spouse Rosario is an Instructional Designer.

Their crew will be Jennifer Handley and Campbell Good, 67, a very experienced wife and husband team. Jennifer and Campbell sailed their boat *Camdeboo* to the South Pacific in 2006 with their two daughters, a niece, a nephew, and Jennifer's brother. By the time *Camdeboo* returned to Victoria in 2011 she had visited 14 countries, had 25,000nm under her keel, and had welcomed 27 people aboard

"My wife Rosario and I have been sailing for about 15 years," reports Denis. "Our first boat was a Catalina 27. Our Whitby 42 ketch is a slow but solid and comfortable Brewer design from 1980. These days she's a bit unusual because



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she has two masts. Two are better than one, right?

"We've done quite a refit on *Counting Stars* over the last eight years. We rewired and re-plumbed her. This spring we re-did the standing rigging, installed mast pulpits, built and installed a watermaker, and added a Hydrovane self-steering system. We did all the work ourselves, although we did get advice from experts.

"Six years ago we crewed on a friend's boat from La Paz to the Galapagos. Even though it took 21 days, we are still friends.

"We've had our offshore dream for most of our 15 years of sailing. Our crew for the Ha-Ha have been our inspiration for sailing offshore, as they have sailed the South Pacific with their family. They are our sailing heroes. This will be our first Ha-Ha, and we're really excited. When it's over we plan to enjoy the Sea of Cortez for several years.

"Our favorite quote is 'Live your dreams, don't dream your life'.



Courage - John & Kristine

Courage — Tartan 4100 John and Kristine Slater San Francisco / Marin County

John, 57, is a retired Management Consultant and is now a Business Owner. Kristine is a retired Child/Adult Psychiatrist who was in Leadership at Kaiser. The couple will doublehand. They met at MIT in Boston. He was studying engineering while she was pre-med.

"We have a lifetime of adventures on land and sea," they report, "including technical and high altitude climbing, dive instruction, Burning Man rangering (which requires a libation to get the full story), and a multitude of sailing trips into Mexico along the Pacific and Atlantic coasts. We've also chartered in a lot of locations that start with a 'T'. Tonga, Tahiti, Turkey, and Thailand. Our longest trip was two months, and the punch list

"John helped form and was on the board of OCSC Sailing in Berkeley for over a decade, and has a lot of experience with yacht chartering and the business side of owning, servicing, and providing instruction for sailing vessels. As we've both just retired, and with three daughters now out of the household, we are looking forward to a much-needed break and time to reflect on the next chapter of our lives together."

John has recently graduated from Fuller Seminary with a Master of Theology, so no doubt there will be kingdom-building in their future. 

"Our favorite quote comes from *Ferris Bueller*. "Life movies pretty fast. If you don't stop and look around every once in a while, you could miss it."




Fio - Barbara

Gratitude — Hylas 46 Nina Lesowitz & Martin Eggenberger Los Angeles (2015)



Carol, a left-hander, is retired from the Real Estate World, while Chris, 60, who is "normal", is a retired Engineer.

"Carol and I have been sailing on and off for 15 years," reports Chris. "We don't consider ourselves to be very experienced, but we've had some great and exciting times aboard our boats and those of others.

"We've owned too many boats to list, but most have been sailboats under 23 feet. We have owned *Hoggy* just over two years now. We have not sailed her enough by any standard, but that started to change once I moved aboard, and Carol subsequently joined me.

"The most unusual thing about *Hoggy* is that there is hardly anything usual about her. She's probably going to be the biggest freak in the rally, although that was not my intention or why I bought her.

"My longest passage has been three days, St Augustine to Ft Lauderdale. We hit a storm overnight and got to experience gusts to 30 knots and surfing at 13 knots.

"Our dream destination is anywhere we have yet to go. We believe everywhere has something to offer, even if it's not very much! Carol and I hope to head south toward Panama after the Ha-Ha. From there who knows? But we have our dream boat.

"Lyn Pardy may be my sailing hero. I've met her twice, and she's an amazing woman in so many ways. I'm not sure if she likes ice cream, but we do.

"My favorite sailing quote is 'If it's gonna happen, it's gonna happen out there', and my favorite non-sailing quote is 'It's better to ask forgiveness than permission'."

Hokulani — Tayana 48 Tony Rodgers San Diego / Leucadia

Tony, 56, is a Business Executive. His crew will be Ken Amorosano, 62, a Publisher; and Paul Hendry, 53, a Detective. Dona de Mallorca, Chief of Ha-Ha Security, will want to hear detective stories from Paul Hendry. She's always wanted to be a 'Private Dick'/'Gumshoe'/'Sleuth', and went so far as to briefly attend the Dick Tracy Detective School in Hollywood.

Tony has been sailing for 27 years. Prior to acquiring his Tayana 48 three years ago, he owned a Cape Dory Typhoon. *Hokulani* is cutter-rigged and has a center cockpit, neither of which is the most common configuration.

Tony's longest sail has been from Maryland to Bermuda, which took just over six days.

"I tried to do the 2021 Ha-Ha," says Tony, "but my crew was ravished by Covid in late October. I'm determined to make it this year. I'm not sure what I'll do after the Ha-Ha, but I'm leaning toward returning to San Diego."

New Zealand is the dream destination of Tony, aka'T-Bone', and he'd like to do it on his Tayana 48 because it's his dream boat. John Kretchmer, who leads hands-on offshore sail training, is his sailing hero.

"'If not now, when?' is his favorite quote, while his favorite dessert is pie à la mode.



Hypnautic Crew

Hypnautic — Lagoon 440 Cat Mike and Debra Rosen San Diego / Point Loma (2022)

Mike, 67, is retired after a career in Biotech and Medical Devices. First Mate and Social Director Debra, who identifies as a "Saucy Silican", spent 15 years working in the Newspaper World at the *Union-Tribune*, then spent the last 18 years heading up two non-profits. Both Mike and Debra retired earlier this year. Their crew will include son Jay, a 34-year-old San Diego native who loves the ocean and water-related activities — fishing, surfing, snorkeling — as much as his parents do.

Also crewing on *Hypnautic* will be Frank Colson, 49, a Software Engineer who builds AI systems for the Medical and Financial fields, but who also gets hands-on with electrical systems and diesel engines. The fifth member of the crew will be Tara Cottam Colson, a Medical-Oncology Registered Nurse at Scripps in San Diego. Both Frank and Tara crewed on last year's Ha-Ha. They own a Freedom 39PH and hope to take off cruising soon themselves.

Mike and Debra have been boating for 38 of their 41 years together but only took up sailing in the last five years. Mike obtained a 100-ton Coast Guard license shortly after retiring.

"We've owned four boats," says Mike, "the most recent being *Hypnautic*, a



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stock Lagoon 440 that we bought in Australia on July 4, 2019. We've since cruised her in the Channel Islands, and now get to use her for the reason we bought her—retirement travel." They plan to cruise the Sea after the Ha-Ha.

Together with their lab Cooper, Mike and Debra think of themselves as "an unstoppable team, creating memories and navigating the seas of life with unwavering love and joy." Fabulous champagne helps.

Iguana — Beneteau 411 Michael and Esperanza Eusebio Sausalito (2008, 2009 and 2021)

Do you believe in love at first sight? Esperanza and Michael had their first date on Super Bowl Sunday in 1996 and were married just four months later. "Esperanza was smitten with me," says Michael, "saying she couldn't believe an American would rather go sailing with her and her sister than watch the Super Bowl. But it was the best decision of my life. Honestly, what guy would rather watch a football game than go sailing with a beautiful Colombian hottie?"

Michael, 68, is a Business Owner and Repo Man. The Poobah bets he has some stories. Spouse Esperanza is a retired Business Owner and Repo Woman. The Poobah bets she has some stories, too.

"We lived on our Catalina 38 in Marina del Rey for three years," says Michael, "having our son, Ian, and my daughter, Shelley, four at the time, aboard with us. In 1998 we sailed to Grand Marina in Alameda, where we started our repossession business on May 1, 1998.

"Our crew will be Susan Richter, a retired Accountant who did Ha-Ha's in 2009 and 2021; Simon Holmes, 62, a retired Business Owner and Estate Manager; and Paul Sanden, 64, a retired Flight Captain for Delta. Simon and Susan have been married for 28 years, and I've known Susan for 50 years. In fact, it was her family who got me hooked on sailing in 1973, with a Santana 22 at the Isthmus at Catalina.

"Esperanza, whose nickname is Pucci, and I met Paul through Susan and Simon, who live in Park City, Utah. They are good friends. Since retiring Paul has jumped headlong into sailing and looks forward to building a partnership with Susan and Simon on a 44 to 46-footer."

Michael has been sailing for 50 years during which time he's owned seven sailboats, from a Hobie to their current Beneteau, but also a 1965 Stephens flatbottom boat.

"We bought *Iguana* in 2016 specifically to do the 2018 PacCup. We had a great time even though we were all first-timers crossing an ocean — except for Jack Vetter, who we needed aboard to meet the insurance requirement. He has turned out to be a dear friend. Our trip included our

son, Ian and Simon and Susan. We finished respectfully somewhere in the bottom middle of the whole pack, and 6th in our fleet of 10.

"This will be our first Ha-Ha, and we are so excited we've been talking about it ever since sailing to Hawaii. Our plan after finishing the Ha-Ha is to leave *Iguana* somewhere to be determined in the Sea of Cortez, then return to Sausalito by early spring.

Michael's favorite quote: "I would rather be ashes than dust! I would rather that my spark burn out in a brilliant blaze than it should be stifled by dry rot. I would rather be a superb meteor, than a sleepy and permanent planet. The proper function of man is to live, not to exist. I shall use my time."

With all due respect, the Poobah is not sure about that sentiment, as it could have been expressed by Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin and Jim Morrison, all of whom died at age 27. "We've been sailing since 2003, during which time we've owned two boats," the couple report. "First, a Hunter 466 for 17 years, and now *Iliohale* for two years. Our longest passage has been 26 days from Puerto Vallarta to the Marquesas.

"We can't believe this will be our fourth Ha-Ha. In 2006, after learning to sail three years before, we joined Orange Coast College's *Alaska Eagle* in the Ha-Ha to learn the ropes and build confidence. We then joined the Ha-Ha 2008 on our Hunter 466 *Follow You*, crossed the Pacific to New Zealand, brought the boat back, and did the Ha-Ha again in 2018.

"As a good friend told us recently, "You guys have retired more than anyone I know!" This year we're retiring for the third time in order to sail the Pacific Coast of Mexico for two years, then cross the Pacific again to join up with our daughter Alyssa. She sailed to New Zealand several years ago and has since made it her home.

"Looking at our 2018 Ha-Ha bio, we have to chuckle. If it wasn't for Covid, we would be in New Zealand right now. But Covid chased us home in 2020, and I went back to work as Managing Director of a consulting firm. We sold our Hunter in late 2020 and started shopping for a

catamaran. We found a well-maintained cat whose owner had planned to cruise but fell to an all-too-common circumstance: aging parents and a sense that his window of opportunity had closed. We decided then and there not to wait another year, as we aren't getting any younger either.

"We've also enjoyed becoming grandparents to one-year-old Esmeralda, with Rina providing daycare full-time for the last nine months.

"Fatu Hiva will again be our dream destination. A catamaran is our dream boat.

The great Jeanne Socrates, noted for being the oldest person to do a solo circumnavigation, is our sailing hero. Now 80, she just took off for the South Pacific.

Our favorite quote is based on our now significant amount of cruising experience. "Never sail on a schedule!"

Ha-Ha Factoid. An astonishing 850 Lagoon 450s have been built.



Jambo - Nicole & Jamie

Jambo — CT 44 Jamie Gull Marina del Rey / Aspen, CO

(Two Ha-Ha's)

Jamie, 39, is a Software Entrepreneur. He is a former SpaceX engineer who worked extensively on the Falcon 9 reentry program and then co-founded Talyn Air. Talyn is creating an electric-powered aircraft that can take off and land without runways, and fly without a pilot.

One of Jamie's crew will be his "younger but arguably more mature" brother David, 37, an Architect and Serial Tech Entrepreneur with multiple exits under his belt. He recently started Ogimi, an Algenerated meditation app. David is only mildly upset that Jamie is taking *Jambo* south for a season rather than her staying berthed in Los Angeles.

Another crew will be friend Ryan St. Onge, 40, who like Jamie and David grew up as an Aerialist Skier. Ryan was on the



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US Olympic Team and competed in the 2006 and 2010 Winter Olympics. Rounding out the crew will be Eric Breuhaus.

Jambo is actually owned by Evan Gull, 76, Jamie's father. Evan will not be making the trip.

Jamie's wife Nicole, a Research Scientist at Cedars-Sinai studying the genetic factors underlying cancer, and their 22-month-old son Emerson, were on the original crew list, but have decided to fly to Cabo with the family dog to meet the boat and cruise. Emerson already has 10 overnights to his credit aboard *Jambo*, and Nicole regularly skippers the CT-44 on trips to Catalina.

Although Jamie grew up in Aspen on skis and hockey skates and still likes to get out in the mountains when possible, he has been sailing all over the world since he was three years old. Much of it while a teenager aboard the family's Jambo, including in Mexico. Jamie, who always jumps at the chance to get out on the water, regularly charters around the world with large groups of friends. He's looking forward to spearing some fish while free-diving in remote coves, and to teaching Emerson about sailing. His favorite meal onboard is Tuna Melts, which are burned "just right" on the upper burner of the boat's stove.

Following the Ha-Ha, various Gulls will work their way south to Zihuatanejo for Christmas, then back up into the Sea of Cortez in the spring.

Jamie's sailing hero is his dad, Evan. His dream boat is a Balance 526 cat.

*Jolly Rodger — Catalina 42 MKII Blake Maxwell and Rodger Maxwell Newport Beach / Costa Mesa (2021)

Blake, 38, is an Insurance Broker. His crew will be his dad, Rodger, 67, the boat's co-owner; and one more crew member unidentified at press time.

"I started sailing with my family from birth aboard the family Catalina 27," reports Blake. "We later moved up to a Catalina 38, and more recently our Catalina 42 MKII. She's named *Jolly Rodger* after my dad. After buying the boat in Anacortes, we — meaning Kimberly, our nine-month-old daughter, and me — cruised to Alaska.

"We joined the Ha-Ha in 2021, then Bashed back to Newport the following summer. We had so much fun on the Ha-Ha that we're back doing it again." Nonetheless, their dream destination is the South Pacific and they'd like to sail there aboard a catamaran.

Blake's hero is Robin Lee Graham, who as a teenager in the 1960s became the youngest person to singlehand around the world. He did most of the circumnavigation, which was written about extensively in National Geographic, with the 24-ft *Dove*.

The left-handed Blake's favorite quote

comes from Mark Twain: "Twenty years from now you will be more disappointed by the things you didn't do than by the ones you did. So throw off the bowlines, sail away from the safe harbor. Catch the trade winds in your sails."



K2 - Nancy & Bryan

K2 — Corsair F36 Tri Bryan Martin and Nancy Virostko Santa Cruz (2015, 2018, 2021, 2022)

Bryan, 68, is a Designer/Builder. Girlfriend Nancy is a Psycho Therapist who sometimes practices remotely from Mexico. Their crew will be Jacqueline Annigoni, a Small Business Owner. Bryan has done four Ha-Ha's, Nancy has done three, and Jacqueline has done one.

Bryan has been sailing for 50 years, beginning as a child on his father's boat. His longest passage has been from the South Pacific to Hawaii. Bryan has owned at least six boats, all monohulls, until he bought an F31 in 2006. He is now a committed trimaran owner. Nancy doesn't have as extensive sailing experience as Bryan, but she makes up for it with enthusiasm. Jacqueline is a long-time sailor.

"We bought K2 in Massachusetts in 2021," reports Bryan. "We are often asked the significance of her name. For a short while we had two trimarans. The F31 was called Kailani, and our intention was to name the F36 Kailani II, but we started referring to them as KI and KII, and KII stuck. The name has nothing to do with K2 being the second-highest mountain on Earth.

"We had a great time sailing in the Ha-Ha last year, especially the last night when we had one of our best sails ever. It was double digits all night long. After lots of fun events in Cabo, we headed to Isla Isabella and then over to La Cruz. We spent the next five months cruising mainland Mexico, where we met up with friends that we had made in the 2021 Ha-Ha.

"The unusual thing about our boat is that she folds up and can be towed on a trailer. As in other years, we eventually sailed up to the top of the Sea of Cortez and pulled her out in Puerto Penasco. We decommissioned K2 and had all of her annual bottom work done. We really like the boatyard in Penasco and enjoyed getting to know Salvador Cabrales Jr. and Sr. better. From there we flew home and got our truck and big boat trailer. With our wide-load permit, we had K2 home in two days.

"Our plans for Mexico this year are similar to last year, although we may travel further south than Barra. After Mexico our plan is to transport *K2* to Seattle and from there sail to Alaska."

Bryan's favorite quote comes from legendary multihull designer Dick Newick: "People sail for fun, and no one has yet convinced me that it's more fun to go slow than it is to go fast."

Karma — Baba 40 John Foster and Rochelle LaRose Pleasant Harbor, WA / Brinnon, WA

John, 54, is a retired Software Engineer, while Rochelle is a retired Human Resources Director. The couple will doublehand.

John has worked on projects ranging from video games to government systems. He is a recent graduate of the Northwest School of Wooden Boatbuilding, where he earned his ABYC Master Technician Certificate. He definitely prefers working on boats to working on computer code. Rochelle is retired from her career as the Human Resources Director for an elected official in Washington State. She is pleased that there are no employees to manage aboard *Karma*.

John grew up sailing on Lake Erie, and when 18 he spent two weeks on a 30-foot longboat in Maine with Outward Bound. He is happy to have more comforts, such as a bed and a head, aboard Karma. When he suggested to Rochelle that they retire early, sell their farm, and buy a boat to sail the world, she indulged in his crazy idea. She thought the dream would fizzle out, but it gained momentum instead. She took her first sailing classes in 2019. After an exhaustive search for a boat with enough headroom for John's 6'7" stature, they purchased Karma in 2021, and have made non-stop progress toward sailing to Mexico ever since.


"We plan to cruise in Mexico for a year before heading to Central America, through the Panama Canal, and on to the Caribbean."

Their favorite quote is: 'Do or do not.

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
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

Joe is a Coast Guard certified skipper, with six years of sailing experience in San Francisco Bay, including many single-handed day and night sails, four offshore trips to Point Reyes, two trips to the Farallones, four trips up the Sacramento Delta, and a three-day non-stop passage from Berkeley to San Miguel Island in Southern California. He's been a full-time liveaboard for over two years on *Kitabu*, his third boat.

Alicen has two years of sailing experience and has double-handed with the captain to Point Reyes, the Sacramento Delta, and all around San Francisco Bay on the couple's previous boat, a 1970 Ericson 35. Alicen was formerly involved in the sport of Equestrian Vaulting. "Think Cirque du Soleil, aka gymnastics on horseback," says Joe. "She has discovered there are many parallels between

that sport and sailing, such as occasional moments of soul cleansing terror.

Crew Teena Roshini has five years of sailing experience and was a full-time liveaboard for 2 ½ years, she has multiday offshore experience and has extensive double-handing experience on San Francisco Bay.

"I purchased *Kitabu*," Joe says, "which means 'wide girl' in Hawaiian, during Covid when boats were scarce. The running joke was 'I bought a very expensive anchor windlass with a boat attached to it.' After a year of serious restoration and two additional years of repair and upgrades, she is now a capable offshore machine with decent off-grid self-reliance.

"This will be our first Ha-Ha," reports Joe, "and we plan to continue the adventure around to La Paz and Loreto to hide from the cool winter San Francisco Bay temps. When spring comes or we run out of funds we'd Bash home.

Poobah Tip: Once the first or second Norther blows in early December, the Sea of Cortez becomes too cold for swimming until April or May. The air temps are fine. But if you want warm water, you have to continue south to Banderas Bay.



Lady Anne - Beth & Todd

Lady Anne — Beneteau 473 Todd and Beth Winkler Portland, OR

Todd, 57, retired as a Mechanical Subject Matter Expert/Project Manager for a Social Media company due to MS. He specialized in Emergency Power Systems and water systems including RO and UV treatment. Beth retired from a career as a Medical Records Analyst so they could cruise while still physically able to do so.

Todd's parents joined a sailing club on the Columbia River to learn to sail, after which his dad purchased a Newport 28 new in 1975. The family cruised the Columbia River from the Bonneville Dam to Astoria for years until his father sold the boat in 1981. Then a teenager, Todd was no longer interested in sailing, except for televised Americas Cup races and the Whitbread Around the World Race. But in the summer of 1993, while attending his brother's bachelor party at the Hayden Island Sailing Club, he was once again bitten by the sailing bug.

In 1996 Todd convinced Beth, his non-sailing wife that they needed to join the Hayden Island Sailing Club. To his surprise, she reluctantly agreed. For the next year, Todd formalized his experience with ASA courses and teaching Beth to sail. In the spring of 1997, they purchased their first boat, a San Juan 7.7. Unfortunately, they could only keep the boat until the spring of 1998, as Todd was faced with a career decision that once again pulled him away from sailing.

This time the no-sailing gap lasted until fall of 2015 when Todd coerced Beth into attending a Cruise and Learn course in the San Juan Islands. Beth agreed but was concerned because she never cruised for more than three nights. After the week-long class on a Catalina 42 MKII, she was ASA Bareboat certified and in love with cruising. All Todd could do was smile because his gamble had paid big dividends. They began to charter boats in the San Juan Islands as well as the BVI's.

Fast-forward to February 2019, when they found their current boat, a 2006 Beneteau 473 named *Lady Anne*. Due to Todd's diagnosis of MS in 2017, and the COVID shutdowns, Todd and Beth's cruising plans had to be delayed and modified. This year the couple and their cat Tigger are ready to venture into warmer waters and new experiences in Mexico.


L'avventura — Catana 471 Scott and Jill Stephens Channel Islands / Studio City (2009, 2011, 2015)

Scott, 60, is a Filmmaker. He'll be sailing south with spouse Jill; son Julian, 31; and Dino and Jeannie di Pasquale, crew he poached after their many years aboard Profligate. They will have two other crew members.

"After 25+ years, 150+ episodes of television, and a handful of films, I am done with Hollywood!" reports Scott. "It's time to move on and live a different life, one that involves more sailing, more cruising, and more living. After three Ha-Ha's as crew on *Profligate*, I think it will be a blast to be part of the fleet and experience it from the cruiser side. And yes, my cruising dreams are a result of doing the 2009 Ha-Ha aboard *Profligate*.

"Jill and I started sailing in our early 20s. When you are young and broke, a friend with a sailboat is a great thing. L'avventura is our fourth sailboat, not counting Sabots and dinghies, and our second Catana catamaran. We purchased her in France in 2019 and took her to Sicily. Then Covid hit and we brought her





back to California. Now we want to take her back to the Med, our dream destination, and Sicily in particular. Anchoring in the lee of a castle with French wine and cheeses, with cheesecake for dessert, never gets old.

L'avventura is our dream boat. She is everything we want and need. What's sort of unusual about her is that she's only had two owners in 23 years.

"Our sailing hero is Bernard Moitessier, a sailor, poet and vagabond. His prose is a love letter to sailing.

"Jill and I have made our way across the Western Mediterranean together and made numerous shorter multi-night passages. Our longest continuous passages have been the Ha-Ha's I've done. After the Ha-Ha we'll do the mainland coast of Mexico, then the Sea of Cortez after the weather warms."

Let it Be — Lagoon 450 Cat (W) Sebastien and Julie Robert San Diego

Sebastian, 47, is a Trader, while Julie owns a Retail Shop. They will have three crew. Sister Lucie Herrmann, a Photographer; brother Benoit Herrmann, 45, a website designer; and Sylvain Lacante, 40, a painter.

Sebastian has been sailing his whole life, but *Let it Be* is the first boat he's owned. This French family has been sailing their cat for five years, many of them in the Eastern Caribbean from the British Virgins to Curacao. "The weather is way too cold for our boat in San Diego," they say. "She loves sailing in clear and warm seas, so it's time for us to head south again! We plan to cruise the Sea of Cortez for a year or two, then continue on to French Polynesia."

Their longest non-stop passage has been 500 miles. Papeete is their dream destination, and their dream would be to do it with a Gunboat catamaran.

Eric Taberly, the soulful father of French sailing is their hero. Taberly did it all, with style and grace. If you ever get to Lorient, France, you must visit the excellent Taberly Museum.

""La vie est trop courte pour boire du mauvais vin", is Sebastien and Julie's favorite saying. It means 'Life is too short to drink bad wine.' "But considering the quality of the California wine," Sebastian says, "I am not sure it really makes sense in English." The Poobah is not sure if he's criticizing or praising California wines.

Libertad 3 — Oceanis 41.1 Alejandro Garcia San Diego / Irving, TX

Alejandro, 72, did not specify a career. He'll have two crew: Len Shaw, 68 a retired CPA and Robert Guajardo, 59. Alejandro reports that he's been sailing for 30 years, during which time he's owned seven boats. He's owned *Libertad 3* for three years, but in his dreams would have an Outremer 55 performance cat that he would sail around the Marquesas, his dream destination.

Alejandro, whose nickname is Alesandro, sailed from Valencia, Spain to Croatia in 2008, his longest passage to date. It was there he probably indulged in his favorite dessert, Cheesecake Malbec.

The right-hander's favorite quote is, "If you fail to plan, you're planning to fail."

That wouldn't be true of his sailing hero. Robin Knox-Johnston, who won the first Golden Globe Non-Stop Singlehanded Around the World Race with his 32-ft Atkins design Suhaili after leader Bernard Moitessier famously decided he had better things to do than finish the race. Knox-Johnston donated his winnings to the family of Donald Crowhurst, the contestant who faked participating before committing suicide. Teaming up with Sir Peter Blake, Knox-Johnston won the second Jules Verne Around the World Race, and then at the ripe old age of 67 became the oldest person to do a solo non-stop around the world race. Truly a sailing hero.

Life is Short — Catalina C350 (W) George Poe

Santa Barbara / Goleta (2020, 2021)

George, 66, is a retired Systems Engineer who retired in part in order to be able to do the Ha-Ha. His spouse Silvia is a retired Software Engineer who will join the boat once she is safely tied up at the dock in Nuevo Nayarit (formerly Nuevo Vallarta). The *Life Is Short* crew will include Mike Haden, 67, a retired Software Engineer who did the 2021 Ha-Ha with George as crew; and Alan Harper, 71, a retired Mechanical Engineer who George says "will be well known by the time we get to Cabo."

"I have owned three boats over a 27-year span," reports right-handed George, "but *Life is Short* is our first sailboat. Silvia and I have owned her for 11 years.

"I have participated in one-and-a-half Ha-Ha's. I crewed on *Tranquilo*, a veteran of many Ha-Ha's, in 2020 and 2021.

The Poobah wonders if George and Silvia know that for over 100 years their hometown held the record for the highest temperature ever recorded on earth. 134 degrees. Google it.

Ha-Ha Fun Factoid: George and Silvia's hometown is also very closely associated with the reason the Japanese were interned during World War II. Here's the story. This year's Ha-Ha will serve as a fantastic adventure and a relocation cruise for the boat. *Lightning* will find her permanent home in and around Baja, with primary moorage being in Puerto Vallarta.

When he isn't playing with boats, Kirk is busy selling and delivering them. Kirk owns Following Sea Marine, which is a yacht brokerage located in Portland.

****Lyrae — Outremer 49 Cat Mike and Laura Jean Miller Orcas Island. WA

Michael, 47, is a Physicist, while Laura Jean is both a Geologist and a Mom. They have two sets of twins to crew for them. Forrest and Sierra, a boy and a girl who are both nine; and Aurora and Coral, two girls who are six. A couple has one chance in 70,000 of having two sets of twins.

Laura Jean, aka LJ, grew up circumnavigating in the 1980s with her parents out of Falmouth, ME, aboard a 42-ft ketch. She instilled the love of sailing in her husband Mike. Now they live on the water on Orcas Island, WA, where they've owned a series of five boats, culminating in their current cruising catamaran.

Like all Outremer cats, *Lyrae* is a high-performance cruiser that will sail circles around typical charter cats. Mike and LJ have spent the past three years refitting their cat for extended cruising. It will be interesting to learn how they do with four little ones.

"We have sailed down the coast from the Pacific Northwest and plan to cruise the Sea of Cortez into the spring, and then cross for French Polynesia on an extended cruise that may last 1-4 years.

"After the Ha-Ha is over we plan to sail or trailer back up to San Diego," says Steve, "and hopefully be home by Thanksgiving. I look forward to meeting everyone and the company of other boating folks on the trip south to Cabo."

Mambo is named after Chris' favorite style of salsa music and dancing. It's a symbolic combination of his two favorite pastimes, sailing and salsa dancing!

Mañana — Dix/Harvey 550 Cat (W) Jay Prince Seattle / Yuma, AZ

Jay, 55, is a Software Developer. His crew will include Bryan Wingo, 34, a Carpenter; Jon Raney, 71, a retired Lawyer; Steve Schwartz, 72, a retired Film Maker / Computer Engineer / Trike Business Owner; and Bowen Walker.

"Mañana is a 55-foot catamaran built with Phil Harvey. He was the original builder of Gunboat cats, who teamed up with Dudley Dix to design this 'Gunboat for family cruising'. Mañana has similar proportions to the Gunboats of that era, but vastly less carbon fiber. There was

hope that this would be a commercial line of cats, but only four were built before the endeavor failed. Subsequently, several more were built by various yards during the past decade.

"About the name. When being built, Phil Harvey's boat took priority, so *Mañana* was a 'nights and weekends' project. Everyone kept asking when she would be finished. The answer was always 'mañana', so that became the cat's name."

"After a year in California for a refit," says Jay, "we're eager to get back to the Sea of Cortez and continue exploring."

We all need to remember what John Lennon said, "Life is what happens when you are busy making other plans".

Maserra — Freedom 45 Lorraine Willgress and Jack Spriggs Victoria, B.C. / USA

Capt Lorraine is retired from British Columbia Hydro, an electrical company. She's also a RYA/ISPA certified Sailing Instructor. Jack, spouse and co-captain, is a yacht broker. Kurt Gurtunca, 69; and Deborah Canon are their two crew.

The couple have owned *Maserra*, a Gary Mull design that features a freestanding mast, for 20 years awaiting retirement. And now their time has come. This will be their first extended sail. Their dream destination is not a place, but a state of relationship, specifically "getting somewhere without keel-hauling each other". Only well-adjusted people would say something like that.

Both Lorraine and Jack have had the privilege of sailing with their sailing hero John Guzzwell. In fact, Lorraine, aka LoLo, saw the green flash for the first time while sailing with Guzzwell off the west coast of British Colombia.

For younger sailors not familiar with Guzzwell, he was a maintenance carpenter in Victoria for the Canadian Pacific Railway in 1953 when he decided to build the 21-foot Laurent Gilles yawl. He used hand tools in a rented shed behind a fish & chips joint. At the time it was the smallest boat anyone had gone around on.

"We've only been sailing for two years," says Paul. "It's been a really crazy learning experience so far, but very rewarding and satisfying. *Memento Vivere*, launched in 2019, is our first and only boat. We have Starlink on her and I regularly work from the boat.

"We got into sailing as a result of need-

Annette's dream destinations are small tropical islands. "We had our honeymoon on Bora Bora, which really cemented our love for those islands. Between the perfectly clear water, beautiful wildlife, and amazing reefs, it's hard to imagine a place better. Too bad French Polynesia is so hard to get to, but I guess that's where some of its appeal comes from."

Paul grew up in the mountains of Colorado, so naturally, he watched a lot of ski films. His favorite quote comes from Warren Miller: "If you don't do it this year, you will be a year older when you do."

Jefferson, 67, who crewed on a previous Ha-Ha, is a retired Graphic Designer. His crew will be Josh Blublitz, 36, a Machinist and Rigger. The other two crew will be Jeff Anderson, 51, and his wife Marie-Eve Laroche of Boise, who trailer sail their Columbia 23 on the lakes of Idaho.

"I learned to sail as a kid, first in Redding, then on Puget Sound with my family after my dad purchased a new flush deck Islander 33. The eldest of five kids, I was always Dad's first mate. As Mom and my siblings slowly lost interest in sailing,

Dad and I continued to have many sailing adventures around Puget Sound and Vancouver Island. In 1975 Dad downsized to a Bayfield 25 full keel pocket cruiser but became so busy as the Editor of the Seattle Post Intelligencer that I was using Scrimshaw more than he was. I made several trips up into BC on my own with friends.

"When Dad retired in 1991 he single-handed *Scrimshaw* to Alaska. My sister Sarah and I flew up to Ketchikan and joined him, and sailed into the Tonga National Forest and the Misty Fjords. What an adventure that was! Dad continued to cruise Alaska for a couple more years, but when he returned home Mom insisted he sell *Scrimshaw* as it was not within their retirement budget. That was when I decided to look for my own boat in SoCal.

"I found a used MacGregor 22-2 trailer sailor for \$1500 that was in rough shape. I restored her and sailed out of Oxnard for a couple of years — until I got my ass kicked sailing back from Santa Cruz Island in Santa Ana conditions. It was gusting to 45 knots, but my crew and I survived.

In 2002 I upgraded to a 1973 Ericson 27 I named her Pride Of Cucamonga after an old Grateful Dead song. I made my home port San Pedro. The Ericson 27 was much better suited for sailing to Catalina and the Channel Islands. I owned her for 14 years and made more Catalina trips than I can remember. I can't say enough about how great that boat was! Over the years I had restored her to bristol condition, with new standing rigging, new sails, radar, new electronics, a rebuilt Yanmar, new upholstery, and more. I organized a gathering of Ericson yachts at Catalina in 2009 and became the Facebook administrator of the Ericson Yacht Owners group and the Ericson 27 Owners group. I sold my Ericson in 2016 to save up for a liveaboard that would be my retirement

"In 2020 I was laid off from my job of



18 years as Graphic Designer with Packaging Corp. of America. I kind of freaked out at first as I wasn't ready to retire. But then I looked at my investments and decided I could retire, so I went boat shopping. I had been looking at Pacific Seacraft yachts for years, mostly 34s, never thinking I could afford a 37. That's when I found *My Fair Lady*.

"She's a very custom early 37 that was finished from hull and deck by owner Robert Dozie. In December of 1981 Robert and a crew of three cast off on an adventure that took them to Mexico. Hawaii, French Polynesia and ultimately New Zealand. What is custom about My Fair Lady is that she is keel-stepped vs. deck-stepped. She also had a midship Beta Marine 38 hp with only 330 hrs. The windows are much larger than the production models. Since purchasing her I have replaced the standing and running rigging, added furling staysail, all new electronics, an inverter/charger, solar panels, new batteries, a chart plotter, radar, depth, wind and AIS. For the Ha-Ha I have added a six-person life raft and water-maker.

"I've now owned My Fair Lady, my dream boat, for 2 1/2 years. My plan is to cruise the Sea of Cortez and mainland Mexico, although I'd love to cruise Southeast Asia."

The right-handed Key Lime Pie lover has a favorite quote from Actor/Adventurer Sterling Hayden who played Brig General Jack Ripper, who set off World War III in the great 1964 black comedy *Dr. Stragnelove:* "I've always wanted to sail to the South Seas, but I can't afford it," people say. What these men can't afford is not to go. They are enmeshed in the cancerous discipline of 'security.' And in the worship of security, we fling our lives beneath the wheels of routine — and before we know it our lives are gone."

Mykonos — Swan 44 Myron and Marina Eisenzimmer San Francisco / San Geronimo

(11 Ha-Ha's!)

Myron, 71, is retired from the world of Finance. So is Marina. "We're both left-handed, both Scorpios, both have the initials MJE and are both married — to each other."

Over the years Myron and Marina have had great success getting crew from the Ha-Ha Crew List, and this year will be sailing with crew they'd previously selected from the Crew List. "We'll be sailing with Karen Miller, who is both a repeat offender and Baja Basher; and Jim Painter, 65, another repeat offender from Stockton. Also joining us will be my niece, Sarah Stenson, a first-timer from Horace, North Dakota. Ask her about her forced landing in Uzbekistan.

"We're somewhat older than when we did our first Ha-Ha in 2000," say Myron and

Annie, also 34, is also Self-Employed in an unspecified career, but she was a college hockey player and an RN. "Right now it is just us and our dogs, but we may be open to crew later."

"Narnia is a 49-year-old Westsail 42, hull #8, that we bought in June of 2020 after selling our home in Spokane and most of our possessions. Not only is Narnia the first boat we've owned, she's the only boat we've ever sailed. We bought her from an awesome group including Ha-Ha alum Randy Mathers of Bainbridge Island.

We harbor-hopped down the coast with our longest passage being 47 hours. This will be our first Ha-Ha, and we plan to eventually head towards Panama, the Caribbean, and beyond.

In the summer of 2021, we purchased *Natasha*, a 1969 ketch, and we've spent the past two years refitting the boat and sailing her around the Bay. *Natasha* completed a four-year circumnavigation in the early '70s with the Bercaw family and has participated in several previous Ha-Ha's.

"Our trip down the coast to San Diego will be our longest passage with *Natasha*, our dream boat. We plan to explore the Sea of Cortez and continue further south into Mexico after the Ha-Ha. Our dream destination is anchorage hopping in the Mediterranean.

"Our new sailing hero is Kirsten Veuschäfer who is the first woman to

Neuschäfer who is the first woman to win the Golden Globe, completing the around-the-world race, minus modern electronics, in under 235 days.

Emma's favorite quote is Henry David Thoreau's "Most men lead lives of quiet desperation".

Zelix's favorite dessert is mango sticky rice. Since you are wondering, Zelix means unpredictable, adorable, and confident.



Noctiluca - Jessica & Ben

*Noctiluca — Tayana Vancouver 42 (W) Benjamin and Jessica Eberle-Erwin Half Moon Bay

Benjamin, 43, is a Pilot for Deep Sea Remote Operated Vehicles and for Drones. Jessica, 30, is a Marine Biologist, George Constanza's imaginary occupation. Son Finnegan, 2, is a Snuggle Master Student of Life.

The two of us have been associated with boating and sailing most of our lives, but we've only been sailing a bluewater cruising boat for about six months. Prior to buying our Tayana, we had a Catalina 27. The most unique thing about *Noctiluca* is that she transforms into a large talking alien robot named Noctilus Prime.

"Our longest passage to date was from Half Moon Bay to Long Beach, four days and three nights on our Tayana. So we are extremely excited to meet and learn from the many experienced sailors in the Ha-Ha.

"After the Ha-Ha we'll continue sailing to sharpen our skills, then cross oceans. Our dream destinations would be the South Pacific and the Med, aboard *Noctiluca*, our dream boat.

"Our sailing heroes are YouTubers who are living at sea as cruisers. We don't think we'll be YouTubing ourselves. Much. Maybe Only Fans. Just kidding. Come on, just kidding!

Our favorite quote is from Lin Pardey: "Waiting until you can afford to live in the style you'd like to become accustomed to is a curse against setting sail for distant horizons."

"Ben is left-handed, I'm not, but we both love chocolate cake with marzipan. And more chocolate."

Odysea — Newport/Lancer 40 Scott Fortner Channel Islands / Rogue River, OR

Scott, 44, is retired from the United States Marines. He will have three crew Katie Hamlyn, John Dame, 47; and Joe Kovacs, 61.

"I plan to sail around the world, beginning with the Ha-Ha," says Scott. "I've been sailing passionately for about two years now, and I bought *Odysea*, my first boat, in November of 2022.

"I've been retrofitting her for the last year, and will likely have the only fully electric boat in the Ha-Ha. I repowered with a 20Kw electric motor and got rid of the propane for cooking. The only fuel I'll carry is for the dinghy motor and the backup portable generator.

"The Ha-Ha will be my longest passage to date, but I'll have experienced crew with me. My goal on the Ha-Ha is to learn as much as I possibly can and to enjoy the company of positive people.

"I wish I could afford something like an Island Packet 55, but I'll do with what I have

"Capt Ron is my sailing hero, of course, and 'If it's gonna happen . . .' is my favorite quote.

"For dessert, I prefer peanut M&Ms or whiskey. Homer was my call sign in the Marines."

Okisollo — Island Packet 485 Dan and Jeanne Blair Edmonds, WA

Dan, 51, is a mortgage banker who is shifting work to his partner so he'll only have to work when he feels like it, yet still be able to pay the bills. For five years prior to retiring, Jeanne was in the Tech World. "As Chief of Staff in Human Resources, my job was to be a 'fixer' for tech execs who got into Human Resources trouble during the COVID crisis."

The couple will doublehand with their cat Leia. "So far she's gotten seasick every time we go on the ocean, and thus has been useless except to keep our feet warm at night. We have no idea what her purpose will be in Mexico. The couple will not be joined by their son because they believe he's in college. "All we know for sure is he says he's attending and we're paying for it."

Dan and Jeanne have been sailing together for 30 years, during which time they've owned at least six boats. When they were young and restless they sailed from Seattle to New Zealand on a Swan 44. Dan also did a 30-day delivery from New Zealand to French Polynesia. "It was epic," he recalls, "and Jeanne spent a lot of time with the New Zealand Coast Guard. It's a good story."

Still restless, most recently they moved aboard their Island Packet 485 *Okisollo* and set off for a summer in Alaska. But hopefully, the Ha-Ha will show them the way to winter in warmer places.

"We've been sailing since college, and have owned many dinghies and six boats. We bought *Okisollo* in 2021, and she checks all our boxes. *Okisollo* is much more modern than the Swan was, although our dream boat would be an Oys-

ter 885. After the Ha-Ha we'll figure out if we do another South Pacific run or go to the Caribbean."

Either the Caribbean or South Pacific are fine with Jeanne, who loves anchoring where there's sun but no mosquitos. Dan's dream destinations are "the Northwest Passage or anywhere it's cold".

Jeanne agrees that not all who wander are lost, while Dan doesn't like dessert.

The Poobah presumes *Okisollo* is named after the Okisollo tidal rapids near Quadra Island in British Colombia, where in the right conditions a tidal wave is formed that can be ridden for hours with a board or kayak.

Charles, 57, is a retired Automation Project Manager, while Barbie is a retired Property Manager. The residents of Kaaawa — which is on the Kam Highway in northeast Oahu and is correctly spelled with a vowel three times in a row — plan to doublehand.

Charlie is an avid North Shore surfer, and Barbie has been racing outrigger canoes with Kailua Canoe Club for the last 10 years. They are ocean lovers looking forward to sailing adventures.

"We are new to sailing, having taken lessons during Covid, as we were looking for a new way to enjoy the ocean. We purchased *Ola Nani*, our first sailboat, in Chula Vista a year ago. Since then we've been sailing her up and down the Southern California coast. We are hoping to spend some time in the Sea of Cortez after the Ha-Ha, then continue south and see where the wind blows us.

"Our dream destination is to the Med, but we're not in a rush and will take it one anchorage at a time. We have recently left our jobs and are taking a break, hoping to ride this sailing adventure into retirement. We have three grown sons and are

ready to enjoy the empty nest."

Ola Nani means 'beautiful life' in Hawaiian, sort of like mooi leven in Dutch; bella vida in Catalan, bella vita in Corsican; belle vie in French; and hermosa vida in Spanish.



One Eyed Jack

One Eyed Jack — Express 37 Suzie Grubler Lahaina / Maui, HI (2010, 2013)

Suzie is retired from an Unspecified Career. Her crew will be First Mate Kati Hedden, a School Teacher; Mariana Lowy-Gerstmar, a Lawyer; Chad Gerstmar, 41, a Boat Captain; Jenna Caplin, a Landscape Architect; and Brian Lewis, 66, a 'Man of Mystery'.

Suzie has been sailing for more than 30 years during which time she has owned six boats. For the last five years, she's owned her dream boat, the Carl Schumacher-designed Express 37. But unlike most Express 37s, which remain popular racing boats after all these years, hers has a windlass and a radar arch.

Suzie has done multiple Pacific Cups to Hawaii and sailed through the South Pacific to New Zealand. After the Ha-Ha she plans to sail back to Maui.

Suzie is a right-hander whose dream destination is Scotland, and agrees with Capt Ron that 'If it's gonna happen, it's gonna happen out there'.

Curiously, Suzie's sailing hero is her ex-husband, the semi-legendary architect, cartoonist, and sailor, Jonathan 'Bird' Livingston.

Paikea — Jeanneau 49 Steve Berl Alameda / Piedmont (2017)

Steven, 65, is a retired Software Engineer who put in time with Cisco and Apple for a total of 30 years. He'll have three crew, including younger brother Neil, 62, a retired Financial Consultant who splits his time between Portland and Skamania County, Washington. He'll be the fishing

coach. Another crew will be Justis Fennel, 66, who not only built Moore 24s back in the day on 'the Reef', but has sailed the Bay and Delta his whole life. He also did the 2017 Ha-Ha aboard *Taliesin Rose*. A rigger, he lives aboard his Beneteau 423 in Alameda. And last but not least, Lance Berc, 62, a retired Software Engineer and an active Bay racer since the mid-'80s. He likes weather routing and navigation.

Steve started sailing at age 12 with an O'Day Daysailor on the south shore of Long Island, New York. He can remember owning six boats. A Sunfish, a Hobie 16, and since moving to the Bay Area, a Searunner 31 trimaran, the Soverel 33 Good & Plenty, and now the Jeanneau 49 Paikea, which he bought during Covid in September of 2020.

"I have also sailed a bit in the South Pacific on other peoples' boats," reports Steven, "and visited Hawaii, Fiji, Vanuatu, New Caledonia, Australia, and New Zealand. My longest passage was 21 days from Oahu to San Francisco.

"I eat almost anything, but not uni, beets or oatmeal. I love chocolate ice cream and chocolate cake for dessert, and just about anything else chocolate. My favorite desert is the Mojave. My favorite band has to be The Grateful Dead, but I listen to lots of different music. I like dogs, but cats make me sneeze.

"After this, my first Ha-Ha, I plan to commuter cruise the Sea of Cortez and the mainland coast of Mexico. After that, who knows? But my dream destination is the South Pacific. Of course, I also love the Caribbean and the Med.

My favorite quote was written by a pilot but applies to sailors as well: "A superior pilot uses his superior judgment to avoid situations which require the use of his superior skill."

"I'm left-handed, and lots of people call me by my last name 'Berl', when I was a kid it seemed like it was rare to be the only Steve in the room".

Pendragon — Valiant 40 Scott and Jennifer Brigham Ventura / Whitefish, MT

Scott, 60, is the retired Vice-President of Sales for a food company. Jennifer is a retired Dermatology Medical Assistant. Their crew will be Karl Freienmuth, 70, who is retired from the Jet Leasing field; Mary Beth, Freienmuth, a Yoga and Wellness Studio Owner; and brother Walter Smith, 62, a Commercial Real Estate VP.

There will be a lot of racing experience on *Pendragon*. Starting in Minneapolis, Scott and Jennifer have raced continually for over 20 years with a Mirage 24, J-22, J-24, and finally a Mumm 36. And Jennifer has participated in a Women's Rolex Regatta. In addition, they have eight Chicago to Mac's between them, have done a Caribbean 1500 Rally, and crossed the Atlantic as part of an Atlantic Rally for

Cruisers. Oh yeah, Scott did the 2016 Pacific Cup on the class-winning Cal 40 *Redhead* owned by Jennifer's brother.

The crew doesn't lack sailing experience either. Karl and Merry Beth, also from Minneapolis, own a Pearson 39.9 and sail her on Lake Superior. Karl is a pilot, a licensed Coast Guard Captain, and an expert radio operator. Merry Beth has raced J-22s, J-24s and Mumm 36s, and has participated in a Women's Rolex Regatta. Both Mary Beth and Karl have participated in an Atlantic Rally for Cruisers and the Caribbean 1500 aboard Pendragon. Walter Smith, from Fresno, is a lifelong sailor who has raced his Cal 40 Redhead in numerous major offshore races. He took the Navigator Award in the 2016 Pacific Cup when his Cal 40 took 1st in Division and 3rd overall.

Scott and Jennifer purchased *Pendragon* in Puerto Vallarta in 2004. They then Bashed her up to San Diego and put her on a truck to Lake Superior for a refit and inland cruising. In 2011 they transited the Great Lakes to the Erie Canal to New York. They participated in the Caribbean 1500 Rally to Tortola and continued as far as St. Lucia before heading back to Tortola and Key West.

They shipped the boat home to Lake Superior from Tampa and trucked her to Ventura when Scott retired in January. Scott and Jennifer now live in Whitefish, Montana, and split their time between Montana and Ventura.

The couple's plan is to stick close to Cabo, La Paz and the Baja side of the Sea of Cortez. Jennifer is going to practice her ever-more fluent Spanish and Scott is going to learn how to kiteboard at Los Barillas. They are hoping for at least one ski trip home to get some turns through the white stuff on Big Mountain!


"Our dream boat is our Valiant," the couple say. "We've owned her for 20 years now, and know every screw, nut, and bolt on the girl. We've sailed her through some very serious weather on our trip to Tortola, and she took the waves with ease. Our kids believe *Pendragon* is their home since we've owned her longer than any of the houses we've lived in.

Scotty and Jeno are our nicknames, and we're also known as Belts and Suspenders. If anybody needs a certain bolt, nut or wire, come by our boat, which is known as 'The Chandlery'.

Pennyann II — Fantasia 35 Joe Miller and Anna Berger San Diego / Sparks, NV

Joe, 51, is in the Trucking business. His sweetheart, Anna, 35, fishes commercially in Alaska! Their crew will be Helder Romero, 33.

"I started sailing at age six," reports Joe, "racing Sabots and Lasers off San Diego for the Coronado Cays YC. I have owned too many boats to count, from jet













boats to cabin cruisers to sailboats to river driftboats. *Pennyanne II* is new to me this year, but I also have an Islander 36 in La Paz.

Bruce Bingham designed the Fantasia 35, and 75 were built starting in 1976. One unique feature of the center-cockpit boat is that she has 7-ft headroom.

"I've never done a Ha-Ha before," says Joe, "but I have done the trip to Cabo a couple of times, and Andres has done it professionally countless times.

"After the Ha-Ha I plan to base out of La Paz and sail the Sea of Cortez, then haul the boat for a refit. I'm a Mexican citizen. I spend about half the year in Mexico, where I own Del Marco Yacht Services, a charter and boat services company.

"My dream destination is the South Pacific, and I will sail there in the future. My Fantasia 35 is my current dream boat, and with the help of my crew in La Paz, I will restore her to better than new.

"I am left-handed and Dennis Conner is my sailing hero."

Perception — Lagoon 42 Cat Jim and Melinda Hall Boise, ID

Jim, 53, is an unspecified type of Engineer. He'll be sailing with Melina, who is retired from Campaign Management. Their crew will be Grace Hall, 22, their daughter. She is a Student.

Jim and Melinda have been sailing for eight years. *Perception*, which they've owned for 2 ½ years, has been their only boat. Their longest passage has been from Seattle to San Francisco, where they likely encountered more weather than they'll see in the Ha-Ha.

The couple own their dream boat and would love to sail her in Europe, their dream destination. Their heroes are a couple of legendary singlehanders. Josh Slocum for being the first person to sail singlehanded around the world, and Sir Francis Chichester, who not only was the first person to singlehanded around the world non-stop but who came up with the Hall's favorite quote: "Any damn fool can navigate the world sober. It takes a really good sailor to do it drunk.

The couple are fond of chocolate coconut pie.

Pooino Roa - Kelly Peterson 44 Jerry and Kathy McGraw Newport Beach (1999, 2004)

Kathy is the Captain and husband Jerry, 76, is a retired Deputy Sheriff of the Harbor Patrol. They have both done two Ha-Ha's. Janet Griebel, a retired Real Estate Broker who cruised Mexico on and off for nine years "and loved it", will be their crew.

"We have been cruising for 23 years," reports Jerry, "and before that Kathy raced and taught sailing. Our first boat

was an Ericson 32, and we did one season in Mexico with her. The rest of our cruising has been aboard *Pooino Roa*, a Doug Peterson classic that was launched in 1979. Our boat's name means 'very crazy in the head' in Tahitian.

"We did the Ha-Ha in 1999 with our Ericson, then did it again in 2004 with our Kelly-Peterson.

"Our longest passage has been from Pohnpei, Micronesia, to Long Beach. It took 62 days of non-stop sailing to cover 6,000 miles." The Poobah is going to guess that's the longest non-stop passage of any sailors in this year's fleet.

"After the Ha-Ha we plan to end up in Barra for the winter," the couple report.

Jerry is the only southpaw, but we both like ice cream.

Profligate — Surfin' 63 Catamaran Richard Spindler and Doña de Mallorca Riviera Nayarit Marina, La Cruz, Mexico (27 Ha-Ha's)

Richard, 75, was the founder of *Latitude 38* and the Editor/Publisher for 40 years, and was the founder and has been the Grand Poobah of the event for its entire history. Doña is a Captain and Registered Nurse who has done 26 Ha-Ha's and 23 Baja Bashes. An eight-year former resident of Mallorca, Spain, Doña has sailed across the Atlantic twice, while Richard has only done it once.

Richard and Doña met very briefly during an Antigua Sailing Week in the 1980s and were so enamored with each other that they didn't meet again until 10 years later. After a 24-year courtship they got married a few years ago, although neither can remember exactly when or why. They live three months a year each on boats in Paris, St. Barth, La Cruz, and Southern California. Hey, it's less expensive than owning a house and living in Coastal California, and the scenery is always changing.

The *Profligate* crew will include Jim Drake, 65, a retired Professional Captain and Yanmar Dealer, who helped finish *Profligate* and who was the Captain of the Ocean 71 *Big O* from California to Turkey and back to the Caribbean. Jeanette, Jim's wife, is retired from Facebook and other Silicon Valley companies and doublehanded across the Pacific to Australia with Jim after the 2021 Ha-Ha.

Chris Hunt is a Contractor in Sacramento who has done 20 Ha-Ha's on *Profligate*; Chuck Skewes owns Ullman Sails in San Diego and Seattle, and has done five Ha-Ha's along with countless races to Hawaii; Paul Ludgate, from Newport Beach, owns a 44-ft cat, leads llama tours in Colorado, and has done five Ha-Ha's. Christian Holm Bombs Forest Fires from jets and has done five Ha-Ha's; Lynn Ringseis, a former Charter Cat Owner/Operator in the Caribbean, and currently a Socialite,

has done 15 Ha-Ha's aboard *Profligate*. Steve Mueller, retired as a Fire Chief from Cal Fire is a Ha-Ha virgin, although he's done two Bashes aboard *Profligate*. Kris Mueller, a former helicopter Medic who is about to retire as a Registered Nurse, and is a vet of a Bash on *Profligate*, will be doing her first Ha-Ha.

There may be other crew, but that's all the Poobah can remember at this time.

Profligate was built by DENCHO in Long Beach in 1996. She is based on a Kurt Hughes 60-ft charter cat but stretched three feet and the interior modified tremendously by the owner. Profligate is basically an ocean-going day cat that can sleep 14. She has done 25 Ha-Ha's as well as a trip through the Canal to the Eastern Caribbean and back. She's mostly made of Divinycell and Vinylester resin. Before she got loaded down, she hit 25 knots on both San Francisco Bay under white sails, and again under spinnaker on the Ha-Ha.

Richard has owned 19 boats over the years, including three Olson 30s and an Ocean 71 that he kept in the Caribbean except for a trip across the Atlantic and Med to Turkey and back. Having done six Antigua Sailing Weeks back when it was a huge week-long international event with over 200 entries, he's inordinately proud of his Ocean 71 *Big O* being declared 'Party Boat of the Week' three times in a row by legendary Joel Byerly, the 'Voice of Antigua'. The Poobah has since matured.

Richard and Doña are both proud to be 'regular people'. While they have been very fortunate to have been able to do a lot of things over the years, they don't consider themselves any different than anybody else.

Richard's motto: 'The reason I was put on earth was to try and help others have a little fun before departing this vale of tears," says the Poobah.

Rampant II — Cal 9.2 Eric Taylor Channel Islands / Somis

Eric, 69, is in the Real Estate business. He'll be sailing south with Mark Hamlin, 71, a retired Software Developer and Lawrence Abele. 59.

"I've been sailing for 55 years," says Eric, "first in the New York/New England area then. After college, I built cruising sailboats in Costa Mesa, during which time and sailed and raced my own small boats. I had a 39-foot wooden sloop in San Diego in the 1980s when I met a woman carrying a grinder across a boatyard. We got married, and two kids and a long hiatus later we bought our current boat. That was five years ago and I've been doing a refit ever since. I've upgraded Rampant II for longer cruises with more tankage, a rebuilt mast, new rigging, modern electronics, and safety gear.

"I haven't done a Ha-Ha before, but I'm familiar with much of the course from



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being on fishing pangas. My longest sailing passage to date has been Dana Point to the Cojo anchorage and back via the outside of San Miguel Island. And I did it solo.

"My wife will meet me in Cabo after the Ha-Ha, and we'll cruise up in the Sea of Cortez for about a month. Then I'll Bash home.

"The Ha-Ha and the Sea of Cortez are my dream destinations. Over many years I've traveled along both sides of Baja, but never in my own sailboat."

Refuge — Pearson 37 Jerry Aberle Brookings, OR / Falbrook

Jerry, 58, is an Aircraft Business Owner. He'll be sailing with Gordy Cox, 60, who is a Helicopter Pilot; Brad Ihde, 72; and Clifford Webb, 62.

"I've been on the water all my life, on boats with and without sails," reports Jerry. "I've owned quite a few boats, which is probably why I'm not retired. I've owned *Refuge*, designed by Bill Shaw, for two years. She was built in 1982 by Pearson Yachts, one of the most respected names in the industry.

"My dream is to retire and sail around the world, but I still haven't found my dream boat."

Jerry is his own sailing hero. Why? "We survived the Boxing Day tsunami in Southeast Asia because I stopped our boat four miles offshore. We caught a sail-fish and a huge dodo that ultimately got away."

For those who don't recall, the Boxing Day tsunami, which was the result of a 9.1 quake off the northern tip of Sumatra, Indonesia, is believed to have been the most deadly natural disaster in history. It's estimated that 230,000 people in 14 countries lost their lives. In many cases, the difference between life and death was a matter of 100 feet or less. If you were on a boat in deep enough water, you weren't affected. If you were in too shallow water, the tsunami broke and you didn't have a chance. The Poobah is not sure if Jerry stopped four miles offshore to catch the sailfish or some other reason.

'Get 'er done' is Jerry's favorite expression, and would apply when someone is preparing Crème Brûlée, his favorite dessert.

RMantaSea — Manta 42 MKII Cat Brian Stanton and Monique Cordray Channel Islands / Oxnard

Brian, 62, is retired from the IT world while spouse Monique is a retired Lawyer. Their crew will be Gordy Cox, 60 and Clifford Webb, 62.

Brian has been sailing for over 40 years, during which time he's owned four boats. He and Monique currently own two multihulls, their Manta 42 cruising cat and their more performance-oriented

Corsair F-28R trimaran.

"We've owned the Manta since 2020," reports Brian. "Under the previous owner she was a buddy-boat for 14-year-old Laura Decker during her record solo circumnavigation with *Guppy*. Our boat can even be seen in *Maidentrip*, the documentary about Dekker's adventure.

"This will be our first Ha-Ha. In fact, our longest offshore journeys to date have been Newport to Ensenada races. After the Ha-Ha we'll head up to La Paz, then figure out what to do next.

"Our dream boat would be any Gunboat over 50-ft, and our dream destination would be Fiji, where we celebrated our honeymoon.

"Live Your Life with No Regrets' is our motto. So we both enjoy a good glass of wine.

"Neither of us have nicknames. Monique is left-handed, but I haven't held it against her in the 15 years we've been sailing together.

"To show you how important sailing is to me, my first question to Monique when we met was not if she had any kids, but whether or not she got seasick.

"The Ha-Ha will be our first extended journey with our Aussie dog Bandit. We're all looking forward to the adventure."

Rocinante — Catalina 36 (W) Joe Cowan and David Henry Moss Landing / Palo Alto (2021)

Joseph, 80, is a retired Deputy Sheriff. Friend David Henry, 66 will be the Skipper. The three crew will be William Pigors, 67, who did the Ha-Ha in 2021; Michael Sullivan, 69; and Betsy Sullivan.

Joe's dream destination is Palau in Micronesia, where he learned to sail canoes as a kid. His dream boat is his old Solvieg, which is either an auto-correct or a design the Poobah is not familiar with.

"Tm not left-handed," says Joe, 'but I'm surrounded by those types. My brother, my daughter, my grandkids — lefthanders are everywhere!"

Known to his family as 'Papa Joe', he's a proud Texan "who grew up traveling the world, who served in Vietnam as a Marine, who was a Deputy Sheriff, and who moved back to California after living in Hawaii for 30 years.

Skipper David, who is known to some as "Meatsss" (Meatass?) because he owned a butcher shop until last year, learned to sail at the Olympic Circle Sailing Club in 2016. Since then he's gotten many certifications, chartered countless boats to 40 feet on the Bay, has done many cat charters in the Caribbean, and raced from Oakland to San Diego on a 52-footer. The owner of an Olson 25 and a member of the Singlehanded Sailing Society, he and his wife are looking to move up to a 38 to 45 footer.

"We almost did the Ha-Ha last year," report Joseph and David, "but at the last minute one of the crew got sick and we didn't think three was enough to safely sail to Cabo.

"It's better to reef early when you first think about it, than when you really have to," is their favorite quote." And good advice.

After the Ha-Ha Joseph plans to keep the boat in Mexico, where he hopes to find soft chocolate cookies.

Rode Trip — Catalina 36 MKII (W) Dennis Staggs San Diego / McAlester, OK

Dennis, 68, is a retired Physician. His crew will be cousin Ernest Staggs, 60, a Lawyer; and Blair Monhollan, 68.

"I have been sailing inland lakes for 30 years," reports Dennis, "during which time I've owned a half dozen small power boats and four sailboats. The boat I currently have was purchased in 2007 and moved to San Diego from Lake Eufaula, Oklahoma in late 2021.

"I have not participated in the Ha-Ha before, but I was crew on a boat from Cabo to San Francisco that did last year's Ha-Ha. That trip from Cabo to San Francisco last year was the longest passage I have made. My plans for after the Ha-Ha are to keep the boat in Mexico for about a month, and then sail her back to San Diego.

"My dream destination is the BVI's. My interest in sailing started when I was a kid reading about Robin Lee Graham's solo sailing adventures in the *National Geographic* magazine." For younger sailors who may not be familiar with Graham, in 1965 the then 16-year-old Orange, CA native left California on a 24-ft sloop for what would become a five-year circumnavigation. At the time he was the youngest solo circumnavigator. A book and a movie, both called *Dove*, soon followed.

Salty Dancer - Jeanneau 44 DS **James Mills** Incline Village, NV (2006)

James, 70, is a Marina Industry Consultant. Given that his full name is James McVicar Mills IV, no wonder his friends call him 'J'. That comes from "a strong Viking heritage". His crew will include Tim, 65, and Sally Mueller, who have been sailing together for 23 years and pre-Covid spent four years living aboard their Jeanneau 52.2 at Emery Cove. During Covid, they moved from the Bay Area up to Vancouver, Washington where they subsequently retired. The last crewmember will be Blair Hake, 60, an avid boater and part-time sailor who hails from Stockton, California where he is a Financial Advi-

J has spent the past 25+ years designing, developing, and managing coastal and inland marinas across the western United States. So we're going to ask him where the berths are going to come from for all the big multihulls that are taking over the sailing world. And what can be done about all the sub-30-foot slips, now that most people buy 35-footers and up for starter boats?

"A recovering/escaping workaholic, I purchased my new-to-me Jeanneau 44 DS this winter in Seattle," says J, "and spent the winter months adding a new asymmetrical spinnaker, a watermaker, and other cruising comforts as well as a life raft. I also renamed the boat. Salty Dancer is a homage to the first boat I did an ocean passage on. We tagged along with the 1980 TransPac from San Francisco to Hawaii, and I've been hooked on ocean sailing ever since.

"This will be my second Ha-Ha. My first was in 2006 with my Catalina 470 Seventh Heaven, which led to several years of juggling work and commuter cruising to La Paz, and then a year sailing around the Sea of Cortez and down to Costa Rica. Ultimately I Bashed singlehanded back from Puerto Vallarta to Newport Beach.

The boat had been struck by lightning the month before, so all I had for instruments were a handheld GPS and a satphone. The Bash only took me 47 days.

This time I'm retiring for real. I sold my home in Lake Tahoe, am retiring from work, and aspiring for life. It's going to involve new friends, new experiences, new horizons - and maybe even a circumnavigation.

"At this writing, Salty Dancer is cruising the Puget Sound for the month of May, with me getting acquainted with a new boat and systems, and polishing up on my sailing skills. We'll be rounding Cape Flattery in June and heading south, first stop San Francisco Bay and the Delta. Then SoCal and the Channel Islands before posting for the 2023 Baja Ha-Ha.

"My favorite dessert is dark chocolate cake and a glass of port.

"My dream destinations are Tahiti, Thailand, and the Med. My sailing heroes are Gardner McKay and Ulysses - although Gardener had more fun in Adventures in Paradise.'

For you young pups, Adventures in Paradise was a television series created by noted novelist James A. Michener. It ran from 1959 to 1962, and there were 91 episodes. The series starred handsome Ĝardner McKay, who played a Korean War vet who took to tramping around the South Pacific for passengers and cargo with the big schooner Tiki III. The Tiki was the John Alden-designed schooner Pilgrim that had been built for American yachtsman/adventurer Donald C. Starr, who sailed her around the world. McKay ended up owning the schooner, which was tragically lost off Bequia during Hurricane Allen in August of 1980.

Seabiscuit - Watson 48 PB William Blumlein and Debbie Lyman Yuma, AZ / Oregon (2019)

William, 67, is a retired Glazier, while spouse Debbie is a retired Printer. Their

crew will be Mike Levesque, 58, retired from Construction; and Tiffany Levesque, an active Flight Attendant.

"I have been sailing and boatin' for 40 years," says William, "on four boats I've owned and on friends' boats. Dan Brenny, Mike Levesque and I did the 2019 Ha-Ha aboard my Hylas 44 Scout. Debbie and I have owned Seabiscuit, our 2006 steel-hulled powerboat, for six months. The most unusual thing about her is that I haven't been able to find her sails yet.

"My dream," says William, would be sailing off the Philippines and Thailand on a crewed sailing yacht with Fletcher Christian and Bob Seger, living on sevenlayer chocolate raspberry cake and beer, hoping to bump into Jimmy B, and helping him go see the lizard. Life is awesome!"

William's longest passage to date has been three days.

William and Debbie's boat may or may not be named after the champion thoroughbred racehorse in the United States in the 1940s when horse racing was the most popular sport in the country. Although Seabiscuit was small in stature, he beat the 1937 Triple Crown winner War Admiral by four lengths in a two-horse special at Pimlico. The unlikely champion was a symbol of hope to many Americans coming out of the Great Depression.

Seaquester — Beneteau 423 **Bill Leone** San Diego / Denver, CO (2022)

Bill, 66, is an Attorney who will have a

crew of four including Chris Huggines, 50; Ric Geiman, 60; Michael Pinkerton, 45, a Business Owner; and a to-be-determined 'J World' Coach and Professional Sailor.

The crew are avid sailors and lead the Lake Pueblo Sailing Club in Colorado. They all have significant sailing experience and each has some overnight and offshore experience. They have always had the Ha-Ha on their bucket list and were anxious to do it, especially if this might be the last year for the event. "Because we did it with our boat last year," says Bill, "and are fully equipped for the trip, and successfully Bashed back to San Diego last year, I agreed to use our boat and do the 'Last Ha-Ha. In addition, the crew is anxious to improve their sailing skills, so we are bringing along a coach from J/World in San Diego.

This crew is a really interesting group. They are committed to the sport of sailing and volunteer countless hours to make sailing more accessible to people and grow the sport in the landlocked State of Colorado. Lake Pueblo is an inland manmade lake that is about 9 miles long and 3 miles wide. The crew organizes races on behalf of the Lake Pueblo Sailing Club every other week and conducts training and seminars. They sail practically all year round despite the Colorado weather. They are hosting a trailer sailor regatta there the first week of October. They are adven-

turous trailer sailors and participated in the Sailish 100 in the Northwest in 2023. One crew member cruised the SOC with his spouse for several years. Another has participated in the Chicago to Mackinac regatta. This all Colorado crew was very sad to learn that this could be the last Ha-Ha and feared they would never get a chance to experience what for them had been a sailing bucket list item. Always willing to help dreams come true, and wanting to amortize all the improvements I paid for to do last year's Ha-Ha, and appreciating these guys for all they do for the sport, I was happy to help.

"I have been actively sailing for the past 16 years," reports Bill, "and have owned a Capri 18, a 1947 Chris Craft (a beautiful thing), and the Beneteau 423 for the past three years. I purchased the boat in San Francisco, and she's already been down to Puerto Vallarta and back to San Diego.

"But I have quite a bit of other off-shore experience. I have completed four long-distance races to Mexico, the 2019 TransPac, a Newport to Bermuda Race, and a Palermo to Monte Carlos race. We prepared the boat for the 2022 Ha-Ha and did it. Then we continued on to Puerto Vallarta (La Cruz) where we spent the winter. This year, we plan to do a quick turn and return to San Diego for Thanksgiving.

My nickname is Billy. Seems right for sailing. I know it is politically incorrect, but I still celebrate the Italian-American holiday of Columbus Day! There is no dessert but chocolate...and maybe torcetti.

Segue — Island Packet 485 Mike and Norma Bongiovanni Spearfish, SD

Michael, 62, a Mechanical Engineer by training is now a Business Owner. He and Norma, who retired from the Software Industry, currently run a Software Consultancy from their boat. They will have son Chris Betsill, 27 along as crew.

Having grown up on the Jersey Shore, Mike has been a lifelong boater. He's owned both powerboats and sailboats since he was 11 years old. He started sailing with a Hobie Cat 16 and has sailed various boats ranging up to a 39-foot Pearson.

Norma, a lefty, has been on power boats her whole life. She fell in love with sailing after she and Mike cruised Italy's Almalfi Coast last fall.

"Our Island Packet 485 is our dream boat," they say. "We bought her in December 2022, sailed to Mexico in January, and have been getting acquainted with her ever since. We'll be living aboard for the foreseeable future as we explore the coastal waters of the United States, Mexico and Canada. Our dream destination is anywhere our sails take us, but we'd love to take her across the pond. After the Ha-Ha, we'll be exploring the Sea

Kerri has only been sailing for one year, but Steve has enjoyed it for eight years. Their Hylas 44 is the only boat they've owned, and they've had her for two years.

the World Races, which led to becoming President of North Sails, which led to being the skipper of Jim Clark's J Class *Hanuman* and his 100-ft *Comanche*.

In addition to Mexico, Christa's dream destinations by water are the South Pacific, Alaska, and Thailand. Christa's favorite dessert is "... oh, there are so many." Colin zeroes in on ice cream.

Loreto until the cold northerly winds finally knocked some sense into my head. So I headed south to Mazatlán, where I enjoyed Carnival and made a lot of new friends. After shanghaiing some crew in Mazatlán, we stopped at the Isla Isabella Nature Reserve to look at the blue-footed boobies, then continued on to Puerto Vallarta

While in Vallarta I assembled a great crew, and we had a fun time in the Banderas Bay Regatta and making trips to Punta Mita, Yelapa, and prepping the boat for the trip to Hawaii. "I answer to 'Joker', love a spinnaker up with a light breeze and a gentle swell, and believe the journey is more important than the destination. I love any dessert with rum, and believe I'm living the dream."

Joseph Conrad's *Victory* is the source of Joe's favorite quote: "Woe to the man whose heart has not learned while young to hope, to love — and to put its trust in life!"

Ha-Ha History: When Joe did that first Pacific Cup aboard Axel Heyst, he raced against Andiamo, later to become his Swan Fun, but at the time was owned by a very young Tom Harney. "I was on the USC Sailing Team in college," reports Michael, "and since then have competed in seven TransPacs and have about 100,000 miles at sea. Barbara has raced in six TransPacs, each time being voted Most Valuable Crew Member. She and I have done five TransPacs together, three on Traveler, including a First-To-Finish trophy in the Cruising Class in 2019.

"This will be my second Ha-Ha," says

Michael, "as I did the 2019 with friends Bill and Owen on *Moonlight Lady*. This will be Barbara's first.

"Back in July of 2010 Barbara and I completed a three-year circumnavigation with *Traveler*, sailing a westabout through the Suez and Panama Canals. We visited 64 countries on six continents. *Traveler* is a North Wind 47 built in Barcelona in 1985.

"Before our fortuitous meeting at the Hawaii YC following the 2005 TransPac, Barbara lived aboard a Peterson 44 for five years while cruising the Caribbean.

"After the Ha-Ha we plan to cross over to the mainland, taking a slip at Marina Mazatlán for a couple of weeks. Then we'll continue on south as far as Acapulco before slowly working our way back up into the Sea of Cortez. We'll spend about eight months cruising Mexico altogether before doing the Bash back to Newport Beach around the first of June."



Trinity - Suzanne, Sue, Greg & Gary

Trinity — Spencer 1330 (W) Sue and Gary Stephens Bainbridge Island, WA (2003)

Sue is a retired Legal Assistant, while Gary, 69, is a retired Diver. In addition to both doing the 2003 Ha-Ha, they "unofficially" did the 1993 'Some Like It Hot'

rally, a loosely semi-organized precursor to the Ha-Ha.

The Stephens' two crew will be friends Suzanne and Greg, 65, Fults, who did the 2003 Ha-Ha with their three kids aboard their Newport Beach-based Beneteau 444 *Lemuria*. After becoming fast friends with Sue, Suzanne and Greg are returning for another Ha-Ha, sans children, to help Sue and Gary sail south. Also along for the ride is Sammy, Gary and Sue's two-year-old kitty.

Gary and Sue have lived aboard sailboats for the last 36 years. After buying their first fixer-upper, *Niord*, a Traveller 32, they promptly moved aboard to spend the next six years getting her ready to go cruising. Their no-sailing experience has morphed into 36 years of living aboard and two long cruises.

The Stephens' first cruise was aboard *Niord*. It started with the 1993 *Some Like It Hot* rally and resulted in a two-year Mexico and South Pacific cruise. Their second cruise was in 2003 aboard the Cheoy Lee Offshore 40 *Pegasus*, with seven-year-old daughter Amy. It started with the Ha-Ha and included time in the Marshall Islands and even Midway.

The Stephens' current boat, *Trinity*, launched in 1976, will be one of the older boats in the Ha-Ha. The Poobah is a big fan of properly-maintained older boats.

Gary is anxious to get back to warm water diving, which is his passion. He's always looking for diving companions, and notes he has a compressor aboard.

The Stephens plan to spend winters aboard in Mexico and summers RV-ing the Western States.

The Poobah wonders if the Stephens have read *The Wrecker* by Robert Louis Stevenson. It takes place in Paris, Edinburgh, England, San Francisco, Sausalito, Sydney, Hawaii — and Midway, the atoll they've already visited. It's not the easiest book to read, but it's the Poobah's all-time favorite.

Ventana — Beneteau 46.1 Gary and Kelly Troxel Richmond / Lafayette

Gary, 68, is a Business Owner. Unfortunately, his wife Kelly will not be making the Baja Ha-Ha but will meet the boat in Cabo. Gary's crew will be friends Nora and Phil DeGaa, 64.

Gary and Kelly have been sailing since 1978, and have a lot of offshore experience. Having raced in five Pacific Cups to Hawaii means more than 10,000 challenging offshore miles for both.

The couple have owned six boats, including *Ventana* for just the last four months

After the Ha-Ha they plan to cruise up to La Paz. The weather is normally excellent there right after the Ha-Ha, except that by early December the water often becomes too cold from comfortable swimming. To the surprise of many, the water

doesn't really warm in the Sea again until May.

Their favorite destination? "Our next venture after our current mooring."

The couple "really enjoy" their Beneteau 46.1. They aren't the only ones, as between France and the U.S. over 500 have been built since 2018. Pascal Conq is the naval architect, and Nauta Design did the rest.

"May your joys be as deep as the ocean, and your sorrows as light is its foam." If they made that up, it's a pretty good quote.

'Cap't G' notes that port is not just a place to bring your boat in from the sea, but is also their favorite dessert.

Walden — Passport 40 Chuck Gottfried and SusanJo Lorincz Port Hadlock, WA / Eugene, OR (2017)

Charles, 72, is retired as a Project/ Construction Manager for local government while SusanJo is a retired ER Nurse and Charles' Domestic Partner and Supervisor. They'll have Cindy Darling, a Business Owner as crew. All three are experienced coast cruisers from Washington to Alaska during the last 25 years. In addition, Cindy owns a 33-ft sloop she often singlehands.

Chuck and SuzyJo have sailed the Pacific Northwest together for 10 years, and separately for several years more. Chuck has owned close to a dozen boats, including seven he built himself. Truly a hobby run amuck. Most recently they've owned a Channel Cutter and Pacific Seacraft 34.

"We've sailed *Walden* for three years, and anticipating traveling to Mexico and points beyond, we started an extensive re-fit last winter. Changes in family life and retirement mean we now have more time to cruise.

"We're both new to the Ha-Ha, but our crew Cindy did it in 2017. But we all have some offshore experience in the Northwest, including to Alaska. Our trip to Alaska and back was 1,500 miles. We've also spent our summers cruising the San Juans and Canadian Gulf Islands.

"After the Ha-Ha and a winter in Mexico, where we hope to get some work done, we'll strongly consider a Puddle Jump to Tahiti, our dream destination. We already own our dream boat, although we'd rather own a Pacific Seacraft 40.

SusanJo's favorite quote is, 'What's the worst that can happen?' That makes Chuck nervous.

"I'm left-handed," admits SusanJo, "but don't be jealous. We both love Tiramisu, although we enjoy it best when in Tuscany accompanied by a glass of red."

Wanderer — Outremer 51 Cat David and Ellie Walsh San Francisco / Alameda

David, 57, is the CEO of an unspecified company, as is Ellie. They will be joined by David's two talented sailing sisters Ger Walsh and Deirdre Reffell.

Originally from Cork, Ireland, David has been an avid sailor all his life. His love of the ocean was passed down from his parents, who owned a range of boats throughout their lives. Having made his way to Southern California for graduate school, and being taken by the West Coast lifestyle, David ended up staying in the Bay Area to kiteboard, mountain bike, and sail. He has done a number of offshore races and is looking forward to his first Ha-Ha.

Ellie is originally from Southern California, then moved to London for graduate school. After working in Boston for a few years, she found her way to San Francisco. A lover of nature and being outdoors, sailing became a natural extension of her lifestyle after meeting David. Having taken numerous ASA courses and spent many hours offshore, she is looking forward to her first Ha-Ha.

David and Ellie met at a mutual friend's wedding. They didn't remember much about the wedding, but they remembered everything about each other. The rest is history.

"We cruised the Caribbean and East Coast of U.S. for a few years pre-pandemic," the couple report, "but have been land-locked for the last few years. We are ready to get back out again. From now until the start of the Ha-Ha we'll be diligently working on improving our limited knowledge of Spanish — even though our dream destination would be French-speaking French Polynesia."

Wanderer is one of the modern breed of French-built Outremer catamarans, which are on the high end of the performance spectrum. Look for her to be near or at the front of the Ha-Ha fleet.

Wayfinder — Jeanneau 53 (W) Chad Bremner and Adam Bremner Vancouver, B.C. / Calgary, Alberta

Chad, 50, is an Engineer. Chad's two sons, Adam, 18, an Engineering Student and Taliesin, 21 will be crewing along with friend Peter Henning, 44.

"I have been sailing for 30 years," reports Chad, "but I only bought my first boat, *Wayfinder*, two years ago. The unusual thing about her is her gold-colored hull. She's easy to pick out.

"My longest passage to date has been 2,882 non-stop nautical miles San Francisco to Panama City when I participated in a leg of the Clipper Round the World Race.

"We have many dream destinations but

no end goal. We plan to travel and let our short-term decisions drive our next adventure. In my dreams, we'd be doing it aboard a high-performance catamaran.

"I admire sailors who have decided to convert their passion for sailing into other adventures, whether it be circumnavigating the world, coastal cruising, or offshore racing. I participated in the Clipper Round the World Race and admire founder Sir Robin Knox-Johnston for creating an organization that enables people from around the world with different skill and experience levels to participate in extreme offshore ocean racing in a relatively safe environment.

"I'm right-handed," reports Chad, "don't have any nicknames that are safe in public, and like Sex In A Dinghy for dessert, which is a popular item at the Dinghy Dock Pub in Nanaimo, B.C.

"My favorite line comes from Milton Berle: "If opportunity doesn't knock, build a door".

"After the Ha-Ha we'll sail down the Pacific Coast, through the Canal, and complete our cruise in Grenada by April of 2024."

Weebles — Willard 36 PB Peter Pisciotta & Cheryll Buchynski San Francisco / St. Petersburg, FL (2005)

Peter, 62, is a retired Management Consultant, while spouse Cheryl is a retired Project Manager. Both did the 2005 Ha-Ha. They will doublehand.

"We have owned our Willard 36 trawler since 1998. We originally planned on taking off for good in 2003, but careers interrupted us until now. Weebles will eventually make it to Florida, where we have retired. We will cruise for as long as it's fun."

A past USCG 100T Master, Delivery Skipper and OCC member, Peter has multiple 1000+ NM passages. Together he and Cheryll have cruised the West Coast as far as Ensenada non-stop from San Francisco. Weebles was just given an extensive refit and restoration to breathe another 50 years of life into the venerable William Garden designed trawler.

"We are recovering sailors who got tired of being cold, wet, and eating dinner from pet food bowls," they say.

"Cheryll is a voracious reader," they report, "while I am a tinkerer who keeps weird hours."

The Poobah thinks Cheryll is probably too young to remember, but in 1966 there was a fine hit by Al Kooper and The Blues Project called *Cheryl's Going Home*. It had the epitome of the Sixties Sound at the Fillmore Auditorium on Market Street in San Francisco, and some pretty decent lyrics:

The thunder cracks against the night

"We did the Ha-Ha last year with our 8-year-old son on crutches," Josh reports, "so he saw limited duty. As if that wasn't bad enough, Mama Natasha somehow threw one of his crutches overboard at Bahia Santa Maria. So he was crutchless up until La Paz. But it turned out fine. We're healthy and ready to give it another go.

"We've been sailing for 10 years and have owned *Wilder* for almost two years now. After last year's Ha-Ha, we made it all the way down to Barra de Navidad."

Winsome — Discovery 37 Ricky Conway and Jeff Conway Santa Cruz

Richard, 37, is a Boat Scrubber. His crew will be his brother Jeff, 27, a Financial Planner.

Richard has been sailing for three years, during which time he's owned two boats, including *Winsome* for the last year. The most unusual thing about the 1971 fiberglass boat is that "she was free". There's an old sailing adage that goes, 'Nothing is more expensive than a free boat'. Only time will tell.

Richard's longest passage to date has been Port Townsend to San Diego. He's planning on doing a circumnavigation, but right now his dream destination is Mexico. And his dream boat is *Winsome*.

Ricky's sailing hero is Bernard Moitessier, his favorite dessert is Coffee Affogato, and his favorite quote is, "Wherever you are, there you are."

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
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
